





- The Guam National Guard was officially created on July 21, 1981, through a federal law signed by President Ronald Reagan. It's one of the youngest National Guard units in the U.S.
- Many service members are Chamorro, Guam's Indigenous people, and proudly incorporate their cultural heritage into service traditions and ceremonies.
- Guam's location in the Western Pacific makes its Guard unit especially important for regional stability and disaster response throughout the Pacific islands.
