Louisiana: Supporting Families on the Homefront

Louisiana's Teen Panel members—Reed, Emma, Brianna, and Bentlie—answered the call at one of the largest Yellow Ribbon events in recent memory, supporting the 256th Infantry Brigade as over 1,200 attendees gathered, including special guest Louisiana Governor Jeff Landry, a former LANG member himself. The Teen Panel assembled deployment bags for every family, filled with resources from United Through Reading, deployment calendars, Operation Gratitude bears, and more. They also shared their own experiences as military youth, providing encouragement and even recruiting new campers for summer programming!



New Mexico: Lifting Leaders and Curiosity to New Heights

In New Mexico, the Teen Panel is finding creative ways to lead and serve both on the ground and in the air. At the ESGR Bosslift event, panel members guided groups, captured photos, and hosted lunch for over 80 attendees, including 39 supportive employers of Guard members. Their professionalism showcased the strength of the Guard family and the bright leadership of its youth. They are also taking STEM outreach to new heights—literally—with Dandelion's Journey, a 25-foot model hot air balloon! Teen panelists are learning the science of balloon flight and will be sharing their knowledge at Yellow Ribbon events, schools, and community gatherings, sparking curiosity about aviation, engineering, and National Guard service.



Texas: Young Heroes Grow Stronger Together

Texas hosted its much-anticipated Young Heroes Summer Camp, blending traditional summer camp fun with a strong focus on mental health and resiliency. Campers developed and shared a special mantra reflecting their military life experiences, while the Texas Youth Leadership Council stepped up to help facilitate resiliency training, team building activities, and even shelter-building workshops. The week was full of growth, connection, and confidence-building.



Oklahoma: Virtual Connections, Real Impact

Oklahoma proudly hosted the Region 6 Teen Panel Symposium virtually this year, with 14 teens participating. SFPD LTC Clay Fees delivered a keynote address, and the group focused on MRT topics such as goal setting and character strengths. Free Entry to Museums, Zoos & Gardens

Through the Blue Star Museums program, active-duty military families (including National Guard on active orders) receive free entry to over 2,000 museums, botanical gardens, and zoos all summer long. Just show your military ID at participating locations. It's a great way to turn a hot afternoon into a cool, educational adventure!

Embrace the Great Outdoors

Whether you're kayaking at a state park or camping under the stars, nature is an affordable escape. America the Beautiful National Parks Passes are free for military families, and some states offer additional discounts at parks or campgrounds. Want to keep it close to home? Build a backyard obstacle course or have a glowstick scavenger hunt at night — easy, low-cost, and unforgettable.

Military Deals on Amusement Parks

Theme parks like SeaWorld, Busch Gardens, and others participate in the Waves of Honor program, offering free or discounted tickets to military families annually. These outings create lasting memories — and big savings.

It Wasn't Actually Signed on the 4th: The Continental Congress officially adopted the Declaration of Independence on July 4, 1776—but most of the delegates didn't actually sign it until August 2!

Fireworks Are a Tradition That Dates Back Centuries: The first Independence Day fireworks were set off in Philadelphia in 1777.

It's a Big Day for Hot Dogs: Americans consume about 150 million hot dogs on July 4th alone—that's enough to stretch from D.C. to L.A. more than five times!

Presidents Thomas Jefferson and John Adams both died on July 4, 1826—exactly 50 years after Independence
Day. President James Monroe also died on July 4, in 1831.
President Calvin Coolidge was born on July 4, 1872!
