Notes from Dr. Meoli

It was snowing last Thursday morning when I started my run. I go early, before the sun comes up, so the inch or so that had fallen was untrodden and gave a satisfying, muffled crunch with each stride. As I headed south down the Bay Walk, the lights in and around Manhasset Bay were bright and clear in the cold air and showed random clouds of falling snow on the land and the water.

As I passed the bench that the Sousa class of 2008 had created as their 5th grade art project, it occurred to me that those

students would be well into their college careers by now; did any of them run or walk this path, or come back to visit the legacy they had left the community? I headed west passing Sunset Park and the Sousa Band Shell and thought of how crowded it had been only a few months before with concerts and ball games and farmer's markets and fishing. Now, I was alone and all was still except for the slowing flakes and a halyard tapping an unseen pole somewhere in the direction of Inspiration Wharf.

I turned and headed east and, as I approached Shore Road, another runner passed me (not so hard these days...) and left sneaker impressions on the snow as he pulled away and headed up Main Street. The motion startled me and the prints were annoying, stamping out my reverie and ending my solitude.

Suddenly, I was not alone. The footprints of hundreds, thousands, and millions of Port Washington/Cow Bay/Sint Sink residents and visitors appeared before me in the soft white blanket.

I saw the ghosts of students heading to and from Main Street School, younger ones from when it was an elementary school, and older from when, even farther back in time, it was a high school. I saw workers from the now forgotten transfer pier and storage tanks for Lewis Oil going about their work, sand miners loading trolleys where King Kullen fairly recently stood, Maestro Sousa astride Aladdin, heading towards the post office, Dutch traders and English farmers, and families of Matinecocks, all looking up as I passed, squinting into the precipitation and

returning to their business. Oblivious of me. Oblivious of the present.

I slowed as I approached Sousa, half expecting to see Jacob Marley's ghost greet me at our newly installed River of Kindness. But the ghosts were gone. There was only silence and—snow.

Holidays are one way that humankind marks time. How blessed we are to share the same few beautiful square miles of Earth with those who came before us and those who will inhabit these shores when we are but

So, in the words of my predecessor, Dr. Richard Barry, whether you celebrate Christmas, or Hanukkah, or Kwanzaa, or the Winter Solstice may you have time to be with family and friends, and may you have time to reflect on your past, enjoy your present, and think about your future.

Easy Apple Sauce Muffins

This is the time of the year when it smells particularly good in the cooking lab... Students are enjoying baking fall and winter theme recipe. Here is an easy Applesauce Muffins recipe that you should try during the break:

Ready in 25min / Serves 12

Ingredients:

2 cups flour

3/4 cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon salt

1 large egg, beaten

1 cup unsweetened applesauce

1/2 cup butter, melted

Directions

Heat oven to 375 degrees. Spray muffin tins with nonstick spray. Mix flour, sugar, baking powder, cinnamon, and salt in a bowl. Mix in beaten eggs, applesauce and melted butter. Evenly scoop mixture into muffin pans. Sprinkle crystal sugar sprinkles on tops of muffins. Bake for 18 to 20 minutes. Test to see if toothpick comes out clean. Enjoy!

The students exemplified a sense of pride, respect and sheer enjoyment as they whirled around the dance floor. In between dances, students read their own personal stories about their experience with Dancing Classrooms and shared how social dance has affected them and cultivated their essential life skills. Wonder

Our fourth and fifth graders walked over to Soundview Cinema to see Wonder, the movie adaptation of the book by R.J. Palacio. Wonder follows a year in the life of Auggie Pullman who was born with a genetic abnormality that makes him look very different from all of the other kids at his new school. We see how Auggie deals with bullying from kids who can't accept his differences, and how ultimately true friendship, understating, compassion, support & loyalty prevail. This movie speaks volumes about being Sousa Strong!



Winter Concert

This year's Winter Concert was filled with holiday cheer as Sousa's 4th & 5th grade students performed for their friends and families. The concert began with the Orchestra and String ensemble led by Ms. Burke, and Mr. Viavatine directed the band as they performed 3 songs. Sousa's esteemed Music teacher, Ms. Berberabe led the students in both grades as they sang a number of seasonal songs and of course, the Sousa Song to close the show. 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Teachers Update

Kindergarten - The students really had a great time learning about Pilgrims, Native Americans and how we celebrated Thanksgiving past and present. In December the children celebrated and learned about some of the holidays that come in the winter months.






First grade students went to the Nassau County Museum of Art to observe the trees, leaves and the seasonal changes. In December, the students made gingerbread houses in connection with all the gingerbread stories they read in class.

Second graders learned how to add numbers within 1,000 and how to regroup in the ones and tens place. They also learned the steps to problem solving. Students continued to grow as readers by focusing on being "active" readers by stopping and jotting our thinking while we read. They are finding evidence to support their thinking. As readers, they are using clues to help us solve tricky words and are focusing on reading their books with fluency, expression, and meaning. Finally, each class created a food-filled Thanksgiving basket to share with Sousa families.





Third graders focused on North America and the United States in Geography. They read Flat Stanley and learned about all of the places he travels as they sent out Flat Stanley's of their own! The brand-new science standards about forces and interactions will continue to engage the students through experimentation.





Each fourth grade class read the story Wonder and we enjoyed the newly release movie version. In science, they have moved to learning about the water cycle and the importance of water conservation in our community. The CAPS program from Nassau County came in for a two-day program on how to deal with bullying. They have been working to improve their touch-typing skills through the use of the Ultra Key program.





The fifth grade was very excited about the Dancing Classrooms Culminating Event. The students have been working hard as they have learned the Waltz, Tango, Swing, Merengue, Rumba, and the Fox Trot. They are learning new concepts, such as adding and subtracting with unlike denominators, as well as multiplying, dividing and simplifying fractions. In Social Studies they started their study of European Explorers and their expeditions to explore new land. The Science unit continues with the engineering process as they read, discuss, and take part in hands on activities. Lastly, the students are continuing to work through the writing process and they are excited to write their memoirs.

ART: Kindergarten just finished glazing their nature plates which can been seen on display in Sousa's lobby.

- First graders just finished making their ceramic animal pots and are in the process of glazing them.
- Second grade students are making observational drawing of animals from photos. This helps students understand the overall shape of the animal they will soon be making with clay.
- Third graders are making beautiful tempera paintings of a place they know well. They are focusing on brush strokes and color mixing.
- Fourth grade students have taken a break from windchime creation to make giant winter concert murals.
- Fifth graders will shortly start the bodies of their puppets and, once the project is announced, start making idea sketches for their fifth-grade project.





Teachers Update

LIBRARY:

- Kindergarten has moved on from Mother Goose nursery rhymes to folktales. We'll visit the classics such as Goldilocks, The Three Little Pigs, and The Billy Goats Gruff before moving on to fairy tales.
- First Grade is exploring different templates of books (ABC, 1-2-3,) and how the author/illustrator purpose affects the story. We will also look at wordless, special graphic designing, and paper engineered books to see how these forms are used to convey a story or information.
- Second Grade is learning about literary genres. We are using picture books to identify various fiction genres.
- Third grade is beginning country research using our subscription database, Worldbook Online and the library's Chromebooks.
- Fourth Grade is exploring Eve Bunting's picture books for older readers which deal with societal issues and events.
- Fifth Grade is creating a "Guess this Book" online game using Caldecott award books, Google slides, and our 3-D printer.



PHYSICAL EDUCATION:

Students began their exciting gymnastics unit the week of Thanksgiving and continued all the way up to the winter break. In the beginning, students focused on their tumbling skills including forward rolls, backward rolls, handstands and cartwheels. They progressed to performing on various different pieces of equipment that include climbing ropes, balance beams, uneven bars, rings, and the vault.





CAPS presentation

For over 35 years CAPS (Child Abuse Prevention Services) has been Long Island's leading Non-Profit Organization dedicated to preventing bullying and child abuse. Director of CAPS Alane Fagin and State Senator Elaine Philips, who love our Sousa Strong Initiative, visited our fourth graders to talk about the importance of the CAPS Steer Clear of Bullies program. Students created calendar pages to enter in the CAPS calendar contest.





Snow Globes

It's that time of year...a chill in the air, mittens & hats are coming out of storage, and everyone is getting ready for the holidays. What a perfect time to make personalized winter snow globes. Each of our fifth graders got bundled up in their coziest winter accessories to take pictures of themselves which were then laminated and placed (along with rocks & winter greenery) as the center of their very own snow globe!
