
STAFF APPRECIATION!

Congratulations to this year's class, and we wish them the best of luck as they enter Weber next year!







Jump into a Story! That's exactly what our students experienced this past week!

It started on June 10th when our students were treated to a virtual storytelling experience by Long Island writer/storyteller Cory Levine, of Submerge Storytelling.

Then a few days later the Fourth Graders were treated to a week-long fully virtual story realm created by Cory. In the past Cory would set up a classroom at Sousa to mimic the room of the main character in his story and the kids would have to use deductive reasoning and critical thinking skills to solve problems and understand the character better.

This year Cory came up with a fully virtual experience. The children were able to access the realm through their Chromebooks and look through over 30 photos of the "room" and still get clues everyday to help them with their solving skills. Cory Zoomed every day with them for daily check-ins.

Another big shout-out to Mr. Dooley and Mr. Robilotto for adapting Field Day to Covid restrictions without sacrificing any of the fun of this popular event.






Mindful Kids NY returned to Sousa, virtually this year, to teach the art of mindfulness to students in every grade!

Mindfulness, which teaches students to be present in the moment, has been linked to benefits in children such as lower stress and anxiety, emotional regulation, and increased resiliency, attention and empathy. In these trying times of Covid, this program was a welcome complement to our RULER program.





Holocaust Museum



Last week, the 5th graders experienced two virtual programs presented by the Holocaust Memorial and Tolerance Center of Nassau County.

They engaged in a one-hour virtual tour of the museum. Led by a museum facilitator, the students learned the history of the Holocaust through exploration of primary source documents, artifacts and the museum's six galleries.

In addition, students heard testimony from a Second Generation Survivor. A "2G" Survivor is the child of a Holocaust survivor. When parents are no longer able to share their story, their children may continue to share their experience. These powerful programs were originally suggested by the 5th grade teachers in order to supplement the grade's historical fiction unit.

In the wave of anti-semitic incidents that hit all too close to home this spring with the defacement of Sousa property, these programs are all the more timely and important.

Thank you to our teachers for incorporating programs like this into the curriculum, and to the HSA for funding them.
