We are so grateful to be able to meet the academic needs of our district elementary students through the expansion of the

Integrated Co-Teaching (ICT) program. Currently, we offer an ICT class in grades 2,3 and 4 at Sousa. This program offers students with disabilities the opportunity to be fully included with their peers rather than being segregated or pulled out of their classes for services. In just a

few short weeks. our students are learning, growing and demonstrating their individual success both in and outside of the classroom.

Since March of 2020, the word "why" has been at the forefront of just about every conversation I have engaged in both professionally and

personally. So much so that this year, the Sousa staff has committed ourselves to the process of "Remembering our Why." On convocation day, "Remember your Why" became the foundation for being deeply reflective of why we were called to education, why we commit ourselves each day to positively influencing our academic community and why we need to work closer than ever before in the coming months and years to ensure that we are

meeting the diverse needs of our students and families.
