June marks the launch of many vacation plans and a season of relaxing for many people, but we should always remember that "EVIL NEVER SLEEPS" ... especially in Sacramento.

AB 727, a California bill, has been passed in the Assembly and is currently in the Senate. It aims to add The Trevor Project's suicide hotline and text line to student ID cards in grades 7-12 and higher education, along with updating resources on the State Department of Education website for LGBTQ+ students facing discrimination. The bill passed the Assembly on May 23, 2025, with a vote of 11-3.

On the surface this appears to be a benign attempt to protect our youth who might be being bullied or otherwise put in harm's way because of their gender choices. What they are not telling you is that is supports chat rooms and meet ups for like-minded LGBTQ+ kids without verifying their appropriate ages or if they might be actually talking to adult predators. In addition, it promotes pushing an LGBTQ+ Agenda without parental consent, notification, or involvement: The state once again attempts to make decisions about a child's well-being without input from their parents. We must encourage everyone to speak up against this bill. It is as simple as contacting your assembly member by phone (they NEVER answer) and leaving this message: "Please vote against AB 727. We will be watching and remembering your choice when it comes time for us to vote again." Unless we remain vigilant about things like this and go after them at their onset, the tide will sweep us into a direction we claim we never saw coming. Our voices were heeded over the furnace replacement issue. It can work here too.



Flying Officer Redmond Barnett, JR Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve Squadron 681 Born: 8 May 1916 Missing In Action 13 February 1943 India

Redmond Lewis Barnett, Junior, was born in Orange County, California on May 8, 1916, the second child of Redmond L. Barnett, Senior and his wife, Caroline Eleanor Yoch. He was welcomed by his older brother, Joseph and later a younger sister, Constance arrived.

Caroline Yoch and Redmond Barnett married in San Francisco in 1912. The three children came quickly after the marriage, but it was short-lived. The 1920 Census shows Caroline living with her parents and the three children, all under the age of five. Caroline sued for divorce under the grounds of desertion and non-support. They were divorced in 1925.

Redmond, Sr., was a Private during World War I, serving with the United States Marine Corps. By 1930, Redmond is living at the Sawtelle Veterans Facility in Los Angeles and in 1933, he passes away after an illness of several years' duration.

Redmond, nicknamed Junior, attended Tustin High School, graduating with the Class of 1933. He excelled in mathematics, was the Sophomore Class President and member of the Spanish Club. He would graduate the same year that his father would pass away.

Junior's maternal grandfather was Orange County pioneer, Joseph Yoch. The Yoch family would reside in Santa Ana for more than 50

years, arriving in 1872. Joseph Yoch was a real estate developer, owning property in Laguna Beach and Glendale. At one time, in the County's early years, he was an Orange County Supervisor, with his brothers owned and operated mines in Black Star Canyon, owned a brick making company, invented a transportation system to move coal across the Mississippi, was the owner of the Hotel Laguna, was instrumental in changing the town name from Lagona to Laguna Beach, instrumental in building the first road cutting through Laguna Canyon, was on the board of directors for over 25 years of the First National Bank of Santa Ana and owned the very first automobile in Orange County!

After graduating from Tustin High, Redmond attended the University of California at Berkeley, received his pilot training and had accrued over 100 hours of flight time by age 23. He was the staff writer for the Albuquerque Tribune newspaper, assigned to the Federal Building and Courthouse beat for three years. Just prior to enlisting, Redmond left his position at the Albuquerque Tribune. He would enlist in the Royal Canadian on June 6, 1941, 6 months before the United States would enter World War II. He took a 11-week pilot refresher course at the Clayton Knight Corporation in Bakersfield, California. By the time he had completed his course, graduating on October 3, 1941, he had logged over 200 hours of flying and would depart for Ottawa, Canada with four classmates. He would receive his combat training in Scotland, was transferred to the Mediterranean and then assigned to a British squadron to defend Egypt before advancing to Gibraltar.

On February 13, 1943, he was shot down by an enemy fighter plane during a photo reconnaissance of the Japanese controlled Ragoon Docks and Harbor in Burma, India. He was declared missing in action and declared dead in 1945. He is listed on the Tablet of the Missing at the Kranji War Cemetery in Singapore, the final resting place of 4,461 allied soldiers, including 850 graves of unknown soldiers. Redmond Barnett, Jr. was 26 years old and is the recipient of two British citations.

One additional note: Redmond's older brother Joseph, attended Pomona College, the University of North Carolina and Harvard University. He became the Assistant to the Secretary of the Interior, Harold Ickes, from 1940-1942. In 1942, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps during World War II, rising to the rank of Major. He was wounded in Okinawa and later became completely paralyzed. He would die in 1951 at age 36 and is buried at Arlington National Cemetery. His widow, Muriel, would remarry to George Beadle, who would become the President of the University of

Chicago and would win the Nobel Peace Prize for his work in genetics and medicine.



30 Second Tustin History



Mayor Lucien "Lou" Bone 1937-2025

If any Tustin political figure deserves more than a 30-second history, it would be former Mayor Lou Bone.

Lucien Armint Bone, Jr. was born in Downey, California on September 28, 1937, to Lucien Bone, Sr. and Rose Bernard Bone. His brother Robert would join the family 9 years later.

Lou attended Downey Junior High School (where he achieved perfect attendance as a seventh grader), Downey High School, Compton College and California State University, Long Beach. In 1969, he married Carol Smale in Los Angeles and the couple moved to Tustin shortly after.

Lou was a Tustin Chamber of Commerce President, a Tustin Planning Commissioner, on the Base Reuse Task Force, the Tustin Area Man of the Year in 1998 and a founding member of the Tustin Community Foundation's Pride Committee. In addition to the still existing judging of Tustin's holiday lighting, the Pride Committee, handled graffiti, cleaning of the flood control channels, shopping cart abatement, landscaping awards and residential sandbagging program. Lou was the person we all contacted to take care of this!

In 2000, Lou won a seat on the Tustin City Council and served until 2008. He was our 29th Mayor, serving in 2005 and 2007. He encouraged his fellow councilmembers to engage in county and regional governance. Since that time, Tustin's councilmembers have been represented on many county wide agencies. Lou served as Chair of the California Highspeed Railway















Authority, Orange County Council of Governments, Santa Ana Flood Protection Agency, Water Advisory Board, Orange County Vector Control and others. Lou represented all 34 Orange County Cities at the State level serving on the California League of Cities and on the California Transportation, Communication and Public Works Committee.

Lou's passion was Tustin, and he recognized the need for a solid city infrastructure, with well maintained roads, water resource development and transportation planning especially with the planning and development of the Tustin District and Tustin Legacy after the closure of the Tustin Marine Corps Air Station.

Lou and Carol moved from Tustin to Carlsbad in 2010. Former Mayor Jerry Amante recently recalled that although Lou had left the city, he was always keeping a watchful eye on what was happening and what the City Council was doing. His dedication to the people of Tustin, mentorship of his city council peers, passion for all things Tustin continued until his passing.

On June 6, 2025, the Tustin Corporate Yard and Public Works Facility was dedicated and renamed The Lou Bone Tustin Corporate Yard, affectionately known as "the Bone Yard" in Lou's memory. Tustin Unified School District Report

After attending seven graduations in May I witnessed what an impact the CTE (Career and Technical Education) pathways are making on students' futures. Some are using their knowledge to get better paying jobs while pursuing a college education and some are using their CTE experience to pursue careers right out of high school.

This month Tustin Unified School District was awarded \$737,000 through the K-12 Strong Workforce Program to support the expansion of the C's of the Career Education Project. This initiative focuses on Career Awareness, Career Exploration, and Career Preparation by enhancing access to high-quality CTE pathways and strengthening transitions from high school to college and career.

At June's board meeting the 25-26 budget was reviewed and will

be open for public comments for the next two weeks until June 23^{rd} when it will come to a vote. As I have learned through my mere 6 months on the board, we develop our budget based on the California's budget as well as the Federal budget. This can lead to uncertainty as our Governor and our Legislature negotiate the budget for Education. As the commencement season winds down, I feel honored to have been a part of celebrating the beginning of our students' futures. I feel great pride in knowing that our future looks bright because these students have received an excellent foundation for their individual success in the future.






