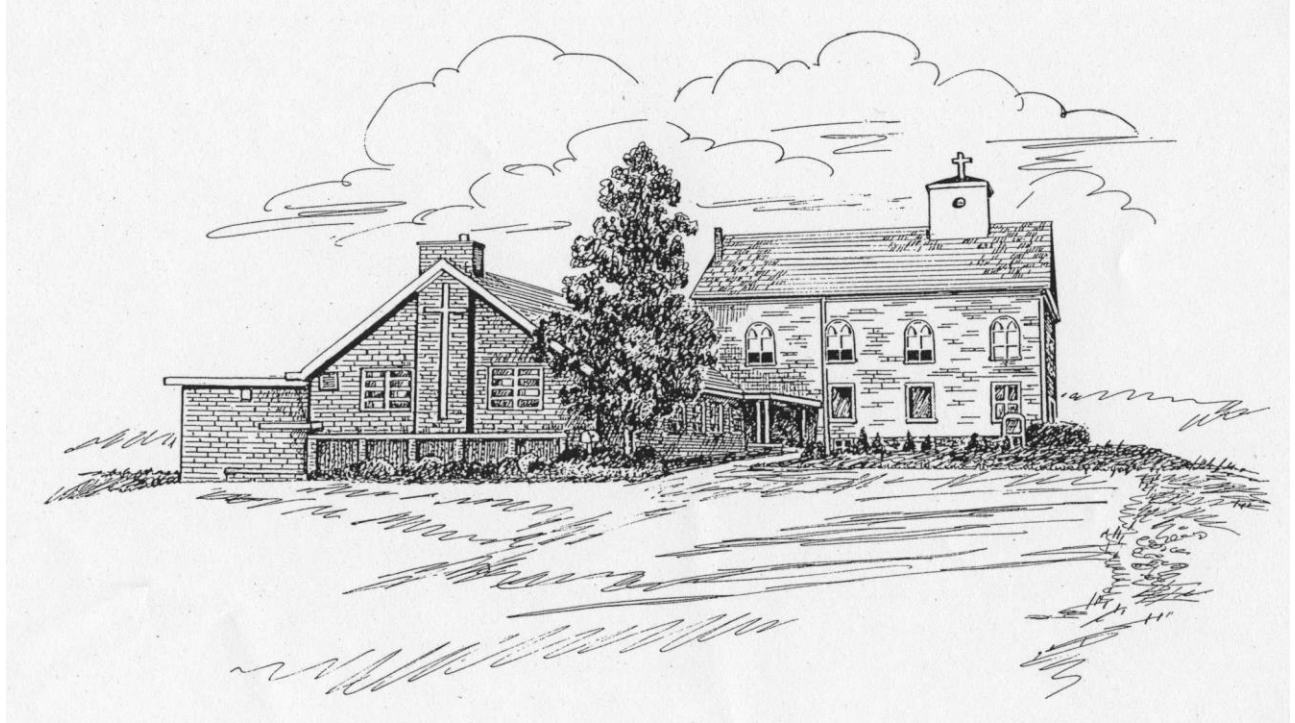

From the Pastor's Desk

Waiting to Breathe

When I was in the candidacy for ordination process, I attended several Southeast Pennsylvania Candidacy Committee retreats. In one of the sessions of the one retreat, each candidate was asked to extemporaneously come up with an image or metaphor for resurrection. I shared a story from my high school days. The main thrust of the story was that I and a bunch of friends were swimming one time and my best friend (at that time) thought it would be fun to dive below the surface of the water, grab my ankles and pull me down. Never being a strong swimmer, this sent me into a panic. As I struggled to get away from him, I could feel the pressure building in my chest. I had visions of finally having to exhale only to inhale water and drown. Finally, my friend let me go. As fast as I could, I swam to the surface. As soon as my head broke the surface of the water, my exhale exploded out and I drew in as much oxygen and fresh air as I could. It was that feeling of knowing I was going to live, that surge of fresh clean air into my lungs, and the warm sunlight driving away my terror of drowning that brought this to mind as an image for resurrection.

Over the last few weeks, God has provided me with another image: the little shoots that will become tulips, and hyacinths and crocuses in our yard. They started in mid-February. Little, pale green stems pushing up through the leaves that had blown into the flower bed. Over time, the stems have thickened and some of the crocus have even bloomed. You can see the very beginning of a flower cluster bud if you look down into the hyacinth. I look at those little stems several times a day as I come in or out of the parsonage. Little stems pushing past the decaying leaves that surround them. Little stems being strengthened by the late winter snow fall we have had. Little stems of new life in the midst of cold and death and decay.

And as I thought about those little stems, I thought about a favorite Easter hymn: *Now the Green Blade Rises* (LBW #148, ELW #379). The lyricist, John M. C. Crum (1872-1958) uses the image of the new green blade as a metaphor for resurrection. I particularly resonate with the first and last verses:

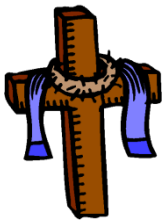
*Now the green blade rises from the buried grain,
Wheat that in the dark earth many days has lain;
Love lives again, that with the dead has been;
Love is come again, like wheat arising green.*

*When our hearts are wintry, grieving or in pain,
Your touch can call us back to life again;
Fields of our hearts that dead and bare have been,
Love is come again, like wheat arising green.*

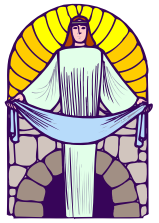
For some reason, these lines really touched me. This has been a difficult winter in many ways, and my heart was "wintry, grieving [and in] pain." And while I don't feel the old panic of being held under water, I do long for the fresh air and new life that comes with Easter. I need to hear the Easter proclamation: "He is risen! He is risen, indeed!" I need to be reminded that no matter what losses I experience (rest in peace, Betsy; Mom possibly not going back to my childhood home); no matter what disappointments I encounter (our political, religious and social leaders succumbing to rancor, divisiveness and polemic); no matter what hurts I receive (or inflict); no matter what fears nag at my soul or doubts that hobble my spirit, Jesus comes and conquers all that would separate me from God, from others or from myself. No matter how many days my heart has been in the dark earth, His touch will bring me back to life again.

And how about you? Do you have losses, griefs, sorrows, fears, pain, disappointments, rejections, or betrayals you would like to be rid of? Is the field of your heart dead and bare? Then hear THE Good News which is Easter: ***"Love is come again, like wheat arising green!"*** Come have your own experience of resurrection. Come together with your brothers and sisters and hear this Good News, taste and see that the Lord is good, and sing your praises. And when you do, you will feel that wonderful rush of breathing again!

Holy Week & Easter Services



With the Shared Ministry Agreement in full effect, we have a full yet different schedule for Holy Week. We each have before us the opportunity to experience some of the Holy Week services in a different place, with different brothers and sisters in Christ. How wonderful that we can gather in a different place than we might be accustomed and let the freshness of the locale mix in an exciting way with the familiarity of those with whom we will worship.

+ Sunday, March 25th, we will celebrate Christ's triumphal entrance into Jerusalem as we wave our palms, sing and shout Hosanna on Palm Sunday. But we will also be reminded of our participation in the rejection of Jesus by reading the Passion Narrative according to Mark. Each congregation will worship at the normal time.

+ We will come together as one community **Maundy Thursday (Mar. 29th) at Grace, at 7:00 pm.** There are three important elements of this service: holy communion, the washing of feet, and the stripping of the altar. Worshippers may participate in all three. Those who desire to have their feet washed are encouraged to wear easily removable footwear. There will be directive assistance for those who want to participate in the stripping of the altar. Again, this reminds us, "I crucified thee."

+ **Good Friday, (March 30th) at St. James at 7:00 pm,** we will come together and feel the gut-wrenching sadness, grief and despair over Jesus' flogging, crucifixion, and death as we nail our own sins to the cross. Experience the silent darkness as the Christ candle is removed from the sanctuary, and we spend a moment "in the tomb."

Saturday night, March 31st at St. James, at 8:00 pm, we will celebrate an Easter Vigil, **beginning outside (weather permitting).** In this powerful service we recall God's plan of salvation stretching over a very long span of time. Beginning in the beginning with Genesis, we will span thousands of years of God's saving activity. The vigil is about waiting, reflecting and experiencing the dawning realization of the empty tomb as we enter the dark sanctuary which is illuminated by the Christ candle as it, too enters the sanctuary and we are greeted by the beauty, life and fragrance of the spring flowers. Hear how God's promises have been brought to fruition as we hear the words of Scripture. Declare and rejoice in Christ's resurrection with the sound of ringing bells. Anyone who would like to attend, but would prefer not to drive at that time should contact the church office and we will joyfully provide transportation. Worshippers should bring a small hand bell to ring at the Easter proclamation.

+ The experience of the empty tomb and risen Christ continues as we meet at **6:30 am on Easter morning for a brief, sunrise service in the St. James Cemetery.** Witness the return of the light of Christ as the sun peeks over the horizon to greet us.

+ The joyous celebration continues in each respective church building. St. James will host a festival Easter service at **8:30 am (NOTE THE CHANGE IN TIME)** and Grace will host a festival Easter Service at **10:30 am (NOTE THE CHANGE IN TIME).**

Be sure to make plans to attend as many (even all, if you want!) of these services as possible. The surest way to taste the sweetness of Easter is to taste the bitterness and gall of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, and to be reminded that this is part of God's plan of salvation in the Easter Vigil.

First Holy Communion is scheduled for Sunday, May 13th, (Mother's Day).

There will be two classes, at least one parent and the students are expected to attend **BOTH** classes. The first class will be held **Sunday, April 29th, from 3:30-5:00 pm** and the second on **Sunday, May 6th, 3:30-5:00 pm**. **Together**, we will learn about God's great gift of grace and rejoice in His love! In the second class, we will bake bread which will be used in worship on May 13th. These classes will be held in conjunction with our brothers and sisters at Grace, and will be in the parsonage: 481 Barrymore Street, Phillipsburg.

Sexton's House Improvement Project

We are very excited and anxious to start this project. All planning and preparation seems to be going very well and we are convinced God is with us on this endeavor.

Home Depot has donated \$100 for start-up safety items such as gloves, safety glasses, dust masks ear plugs etc. We are working with several stores for cost reductions.

The plan is to start work ASAP. We will begin with **Demolition Day** when we will strip down the bathroom and kitchen to bare studs. It will be a **Safety First** day of slowly and deliberately removing everything possible from both rooms. The walls are old plaster and lath which will be a very nasty mess. Wear old cloths (no sandals). We will need many empty 5 gallon buckets, if you can bring some. Gloves, safety glasses, dust masks and ear plugs will be provided or bring your own if you can.

Demolition Day will begin Saturday March 24th, 2018 at 9:00 am. Thereafter normal work days will be every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm. These are the times you may drop in and help for an hour or two or all day if you like. The pace of the project will depend on the number of volunteer hours worked. Schedule changes will be announced in advance.
