## HOUSEKEEPING ITEMS:

**TUITION:** Tuition is due by the  $9^{th}$  of the month. Please be mindful of the days your child attends class so your check is in our possession and <u>ready to process</u> on the  $9^{th}$  of the month. Patty, our accountant, makes her deposits on the next closest Tuesday or Thursday to the 9th. Tuition is considered late if we receive it on the  $10^{th}$ . There are 3 tuition boxes, one close to each entrance and one in the back hallway. If we do not have your check/cash by the 9th, please add a \$25.00 late fee to your deposit.

LATE PICK-UP: We keep a running log in the school office regarding late pick-ups. Everyone gets 5 minutes of grace ONCE, due to unforeseeable circumstances. However, <u>once</u> your name has gone up on the log sheet, future late pick-ups will be charged at a \$1.00/min as stated on page 4 of our Parent Handbook. You should be prepared to pay this amount at the time of pick-up.

ILLNESS: First, thank you to all the parents who have kept kids home with runny noses and bad coughs. Children this age are incredibly contagious making not only their classmates sick, but also their teachers. I know it is difficult to say no to a child who really wants to come to school but shouldn't. But, please for everyone's sake, use good parental judgment here and keep them home until they are feeling better.

PARENT CORNER THOUGHTS - The children have been in school for 7 weeks and the teachers are starting to get a sense of the children's school personalities, their strengths and areas that they individually or as a class are struggling. Periodically I add a Parent Corner Attachment to the newsletter. The purpose of this is to give parents some insight to various issues surrounding the raising of children. Over the past few years, for reasons we don't fully understand, we along with other professionals, have seen an over-all decrease in certain skills. Specifically we have seen a decline in fine motor skills, focus, patience and self help skills. If we want our children to be successful in school and life, schools and parents need to work in tandem to help children master skills. Right now children spend the majority of their time at home. In our classrooms we address developing skills daily in many different ways. However, a few hours a week is insufficient to master a skill if it isn't also continually worked on at home. This month's Parent Corner attachment speaks to the developing skills we expect to see in children between the ages of 3-5. There is so much for them to learn, their brains and bodies are changing every day. Hopefully this attachment will shed some light on how important the school and home partnership is, in helping children master developing skills.

HOLIDAYS: Over the years our school has become more diverse in the population it serves. This diversity has opened up many doors for all of us to learn from one another and to share the unique and special celebrations that take place around the world. We invite families to share any customs or holidays that they celebrate through out the year with the children in their child's class.
