Did you know about the Saints: On January 13, we celebrate the feast of Saint Hilary of Poitiers (315-368). Hilary was the Bishop of Poitiers, France during the time of the Arian heresy when many were questioning and even denying the divinity of Christ. It has been stated by his biographers that Hilary fought against error with both his pen and his words. At this time, Athanasius was a great defender of the faith in the East and therefore Hilary was often referred to as the “Athanasius of the West”. Pope Pius IX declared Hilary to be a Doctor of the Church particularly because of his written theology regarding the Holy Trinity. In one of his writings Hilary wrote, “There is no space where God is not; space does not exist apart from Him. He is in heaven, in hell, beyond the seas, dwelling in all things and enveloping all. Thus, he embraces, and is embraced by the universe, confined to no part of it but pervading all.” Saint Hilary, Pray for us!

Pope Leo XIV said: In order to be a truly missionary Church, one that is capable of witnessing to the attractive power of Christ's love, we must first of all put into practice his commandment, the only one he gave us after washing his disciples' feet: "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."

Ordinary Time

Ordinary Time begins after the feast of the Baptism of the Lord, which marks the closing of the Christmas season. The first few weeks of Ordinary Time occur during the winter, until it is interrupted by Lent and the Easter season. After the Easter season closes with Pentecost, Ordinary Time resumes and carries on through late spring until early winter with the beginning of Advent.

Not only does Ordinary Time represent a quieter period between the Church’s major solemnities and more “intense” seasons, but the proper liturgy for a particular day in Ordinary Time is often replaced by various other feasts and commemorations.

Still, just because Ordinary Time might be “ordinary” in more ways than one, this does not mean that we should see it as boring or unimportant. Like all liturgical seasons, Ordinary Time calls us to reflect on particular mysteries of the faith in a more focused way than we would in other seasons. As the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops notes: “The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversions. This is living the life of Christ. Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ.”

During the brief period of Ordinary Time between Christmas and Lent, we can remember the hidden years of Jesus with his family in Nazareth prior to the beginning of his public ministry—a ministry that began with his forty days of testing in the desert, which we recall during the season of Lent that immediately follows.

Pentecost calls to mind the birth of the Church and the commission of the Apostles to go out to the whole world to spread the Gospel; and the subsequent return to Ordinary Time reminds us to “get to work” in the normal, daily task of evangelizing in the course of our everyday lives. The green vestments used in Ordinary Time further remind us of life and fruitfulness during the long summer growing season.

During the autumn, when the days grow shorter, the reading of Ordinary Time takes on a more apocalyptic tone, reminding us of Christ’s second coming at the end of all time. Ordinary Time thereby appropriately culminates in the feast of Christ the King. Then the Church’s reflection on Christ’s second coming as Judge flows seamlessly into a sense of joy at his first coming as a humble infant during the Advent season. And so the whole cycle begins again.
