Did you know about the Saints: On November 13, we celebrated the feast of Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini (1850 – 1917). Mother Cabrini made her vows in Italy in 1877 and wanted to be a missionary to China. However, Pope Leo XIII sent her to New York along with six other sisters to work with orphans. Over the next 35 years, she established 67 institutions dedicated to caring for the poor, the uneducated, and the sick. Mother Cabrini stated, "I will go anywhere and do anything in order to communicate the Love of Jesus to those who do not know Him or have forgotten Him." Her efforts positively impacted many regions throughout the United States. Mother Cabrini is the first United States Citizen to be canonized. The national Mother Cabrini Shrine is located near Chicago and there is also a beautiful shrine to her dedicated in Golden, Colorado (mothercabrinisrine.org). Saint Mother Cabrini Pray for us!

Pope Leo XIV said: Our humanity is best fulfilled when we exist and live together, when we succeed in experiencing authentic, informal bonds with the people around us. If we close in on ourselves, we risk growing sick with loneliness, or even narcissism, which leads us to care for others only out of self-interest.

Pastor's Note: To new beginning....

As we approach the end of the Liturgical Year, the readings focus on the end times and the prospects of a new world and new way of being that is in store for us. It is by our faith and faithfulness that we will secure our lives. A lot of things might be happening around us, but we need not fear, because the Lord is in control, and we only need to be with him and strive to remain faithful to him and his ways. The first reading, taken from the Book of the Prophet Malachi, consoles us, even as it warns the evil ones, that the day of the Lord is going to be here, and there is going to be justice done when the Lord will put an end to all the evil and evil doers. While this is happening, all those who are striving to walk in God's ways will experience the consoling presence of the Lord. The Responsorial Psalm reaffirms this newness of God's creative action, because the Lord comes to rule the earth with justice. It goes on to rejoice with the Lord in this personal intervention of God on behalf of his faithful people. In the second reading, St. Paul urges the people who are remaining idle, expecting for the end of the world to happen soon, to get off from their idle ways and be involved in carrying out the will of the Father. There is no room for complacency when it comes to being involved in carrying out the will of God. He urges his followers to be involved and be productive, rather than being lazy. Jesus stresses this need for his followers to be faithful and active. It is through our perseverance that we will experience the newness that the Lord will bring to the world and its inhabitants. Our faithfulness has to be toward Jesus and his promises, and we have to make sure that we are not being led astray by those who try to instill fear in us. There might be a destructive action taking place around us, but that is only to put an end to the evil in the world and to establish a reign of justice and peace, which Jesus promised us. We have to trust him alone.
