HAVE A LAUGH... Time and Eternity

A man was taking it easy, lying on the grass and looking up at the clouds. He was identifying shapes when he decided to talk to God. "God", he said, "how long is a million years?"

God answered, "In my frame of reference, it's about a minute."

The man asked, "God, how much is a million dollars?"

God answered, "To Me, it's a penny."

The man then asked, "God, can I have a penny?"

God said, "In a minute."

Pastor's Note: A God who wants us to be with him....The parable Jesus presents today could be quite confusing. Here is a person who lets people who do not seem to be of his stature, into a wedding banquet. However, this is a true reflection of who our God is. We are called to be part of his banquet hall, not because we are of any particular social status, or part of a group, or because we belong to a specific race. We are called to enjoy the riches of God's love and mercy, because he is generous and understanding. The first reading talks about this goodness of God. People who are in need will find a savior in their God, who comes to their rescue. He not only reaches out to them, but also wipes their tears away and prepares a feast for them. Nobody will be outside the reach of the caring hands of God. The Responsorial Psalm also reminds us of the caring aspect of God. He is the shepherd who leads his sheep into green pastures. He sets a table of plenty for them to sit in company with even our enemies. And the second reading reminds us that the God of love will always bring us consolation, when we place our trust in him. And the Gospel passage is a reminder that everyone, not a select few, will enjoy the generosity of God. People were invited for the wedding banquet in advance. And since Matthew is writing the Gospel for a Jewish audience, he wants to tell them that they were the guests God invited initially, to join his banquet. However, many of the Jews refused to accept Jesus and thus rejected the invitation of God to enjoy the banquet. That is when, the host invites everyone to the wedding feast. Matthew wants to drive home the fact that, God's mercy is open to everyone who is willing to respond to him. Just like the host in the parable who is able to see the plight of the poor and outcast, who are invited to the feast, our God is able to see our situations and understand our needs and respond to us with generosity. What we need to have is an open mind and a trust in the generosity of God. God is so loving, that he want us to be with him always and enjoy his generous mercy.
