

Pastor's Note: Called to belong and to **proclaim....**Baptism of Jesus is a very important event in the life of Jesus. Until his Baptism, Jesus lived a life commonly known as the hidden life. This does not mean that Jesus was hiding away somewhere from the people. What it actually meant was that Jesus was leading a normal life as a son and as an ordinary Jewish young man. However, with the experience of his Baptism at river Jordan, Jesus begins his public ministry. This means that Jesus had a very personally transformative experience at his Baptism. All his doubts and concerns about his ministry seems to have been cleared and answered, that he is now ready to launch his mission. What Jesus experiences at his Baptism is a manifestation of God's love for him, as is hinted in the First Reading from the book of Isaiah. The 'one with whom he is well pleased', is the one God is sending into the world to transform it for the better. A person so loved by God is definitely someone who is called to represent God. Jesus is that person loved and sent by God into the world. Jesus experiences this tremendous love of God the Father from him, when he himself hears, during his Baptismal experience, the all assuring words of God the Father. Yes, Jesus is assured of the love of his Father. He is indeed the one in whom God is well pleased. It is important for Jesus to be assured of the love of God the Father. Jesus now is certain that he belongs to God the Father, and therefore the life that he is about to begin has to truly reflect the values of God. He is sent on a mission, and his words and actions have to truly reflect the values peace, love and joy. With the assurance from God the Father, Jesus continued to live a life of commitment to bring to fruition, the values of God and his Kingdom. The Baptism of Jesus is a reminder to all of us that we are also called to belong to God and represent his values here in this world. By virtue of our own Baptism, which made us members of the household of God, we belong to God, and it is his values that we should proclaim and uphold. That is how we belong to God.
