After recognizing the status of the two men involved he said, "How fast would you say he was going when he backed into you, Father?"

Pastor's Note: A shepherd who truly

cares...Jesus was not just a faithful Son, who always sought to do God's will for him, but also a person who was able to inspire others to do the same. Last Sunday we saw how he trusted the Apostles and sent them on a mission. This mission was not an easy one, as they were sent to a people who were often not receptive to them and, in some cases, hostile to them. Jesus knew that his work did not end with him sending the Apostles on a mission. Because he is a caring person, he is concerned about their wellbeing. After they return from faithfully carrying out the mission entrusted to them, the Apostles report what they did during their journey. We see in today's Gospel the sensitive nature of Jesus. He knew that they were tired from their journey and mission. Jesus leads them to a place for them to take rest and relax. A caring person is able to see the pain and suffering of others, even if they do not express it vocally. Jesus is that Good Shepherd, who is able to understand every sheep and care for them individually. In the first reading, we see how God promises shepherds who will truly care for the people of Israel. This was required, because the leaders of those days cared mostly for their own wellbeing. Jesus becomes that shepherd and the 'righteous shoot to David' who is able to transform the lives of the people for the better. The second reading reminds us that the concern of Jesus for the people is what prompted him to sacrifice his life for them, so that they could be reconciled to God once again. We are that people who have been brought closer to God. by virtue of this loving act of Jesus. Jesus cared more for the wellbeing of the people, and not so much for his own safety and security. This was because he felt compassion for the people, as they were like sheep without a shepherd. The people of his time are able to see the compassionate love of Jesus, and that is why we see them flocking to him, and Jesus looks at them and treats them with mercy. With a shepherd like Jesus, we need not worry about our lives, as he is the one who was willing enough to give his life for our safety. The Lord is our true Shepherd and we shall not want.
