### HAVE A LAUGH ...

Never criticize someone until you have walked a mile in their shoes. That way, when you criticize them, you'll be a mile away, and you'll have their shoes.

Pastor's Note: Feeding from a generous **heart...**When Jesus looked at the crowds, he felt compassion for them, because he did not see them as mere numbers, but as individuals who had their own personal struggles and strife. He did not want to be a mere spectator to their plight, giving them mere advice and then move on. He wanted to personally intervene to bring comfort to them. Today what we see is this personal concern of Jesus for the people, which indeed is a manifestation of the care God shows for his people. 'The hand of the Lord feeds us', says the Responsorial Psalm. And what we see in the Gospel passage is this reality getting revealed in and through the person of Jesus. What we see significant in that episode is God intervening to grace the generous act of human beings and creating a miracle that brings comfort and consolation in the life of people. Jesus knew what he was going to do to bring relief to the afflicted people who had come to listen to him, and he, indeed, is capable of doing it all on his own. However, he wants people to be a part of his miraculous deed and, therefore, he asks his disciples to do something to feed the people. And they respond by spotting a boy who has some food. The willingness of the boy to share what he had, becomes instrumental in a miracle being performed by Jesus. Jesus wanted the generosity of the people to be an element in the miraculous works of God. God is a compassionate and merciful person, and that is what we got to experience in the incarnation. God, himself, comes to the aid of people, and he takes human form to change the plight of humanity that had lost its way. As a human being, Jesus becomes a perfect example of what we, as human beings, are called to do. Jesus feels for the people, and he does not stand as a mute spectator to the sufferings of people. Jesus, in turn, feels with them, and this compassionate outlook of Jesus is what we see getting revealed in the miracle of feeding the five thousand. God will always be able to see our sufferings, and he will never be deaf to our pleas for help. God is able to change things for the better, and what he wants from us is to use our individual blessings to transform the lives of others. When we play our part, God will do the rest. God often acts in and through the instrumentality of people who are willing to co-operate with him.
