HAVE A LAUGH . . . A minister was completing a temperance sermon. With great emphasis he said, 'If I had all the beer in the world, I'd take it and pour it into the river.' And then finally, shaking his fist in the air, he said, 'And if I had all the whiskey in the world, I'd take it and pour it into the river.' Sermon complete, he sat down .. The song leader stood very cautiously and announced with a smile, nearly laughing, "For our closing song, let us sing Hymn #365, 'Shall We Gather at the River.'"

Pastor's Note: Courageously bearing

witness ... Jesus has been with the Apostles for quite some time now, and they have personally witnessed the activities of Jesus. Now is the time to test their understanding of who Jesus is, and he starts with a non-challenging question first. 'Who do people say that I am?" was an easy one for the disciples to answer. They tell him what others have said about Jesus. And then comes the hard part. He asks them what they think of Jesus. And, as usual, Peter is the one who speaks up. His answer that Jesus is the Christ, as we see soon enough, does not come from a perfect understanding of Jesus and his mission. Peter expected Jesus to be the glorified Messiah, who demonstrated his command of the situation with acts of chivalry. Therefore, to his shock, Jesus tells them that he was going to be arrested, tortured and killed, and that on the third day he would rise again. They did not understand the meaning of what Jesus just told them, and Peter objects to this. That is where Jesus tells them that the ways of God are different from the ways of human beings. God showed his power through utter humility, and this is because the power that Jesus God acts with, is the power of love. Love, as we would see all through the life of Jesus, is not about violent and brutal display of strength. Power of love is about one's willingness to do what is right, even when that involves suffering and being humbled. Jesus is the suffering servant who, described in the first reading from the book of Isaiah, willingly takes upon himself the suffering of others, lovingly carrying their load. When Jesus tells them that he is going to suffer greatly, he is not throwing in the towel. His willingness to suffer is a deliberate and courageous act to stick with doing what is right and truthful. Since Jesus is led by love, he does not mind being tortured for the sake of speaking the truth and caring for the marginalized. It is this same courage to live our faith as disciples, who stand for truth, justice and love, which is advocated in the second reading from the letter of James. To be faithful to Jesus is to be faithful in doing the right thing and treating everyone with respect. Such acts demonstrate that we belong to Christ, just as the loving act of Jesus showed that he fully belongs to God and his ways.
