Did you know about the Saints: On December 12, we celebrate the feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. In 1531 at the hill Tepeyac about three miles from Mexico City, our Mother Mary appeared to Saint Juan Diego four times. Our Mother requested that he go to the Bishop and inform him that a church should be built. The bishop requested a sign and our Mother directed Juan to bring the bishop roses which she provided. Upon delivery of the roses, Juan's tilma was also found to have a brilliant image of Mary. The image on the Tilma is smooth and feels like a modern-day photograph, still has shown no evidence of deterioration, does not have any paint brush marks, consistently defies exact reproduction whether by camera or brush, has Juan Diego's image in the reflection of Mary's eyes, and the stars on Mary's Mantle coincide with the constellation in the sky on December 12, 1531. Our Lady of Guadalupe pray for us!

Pope Francis says: I wish you all a good Advent journey made up of many small gestures of peace every day: welcoming gestures, gestures of understanding, closeness, forgiveness, and service... Gestures from the heart, like steps towards Bethlehem, towards Jesus, the King of peace.

Pastor's Note: The joy of being touched by

God....What happens in our lives when God intervenes is what we reflect on this third Sunday of Advent. God, who created everything and took delight in everything that he created, when he found them to be good, cannot leave his created beings to be destroyed by selfish interests. Everything that afflicts them will be defeated and replaced by the transforming power of God. The first reading sets the stage for this divine intervention, when we hear Isaiah continues his prediction and promise for the people of Israel, who have been forced to live in sorrow, brought about by the evil invasion of a foreign nation. Suffering had become part and parcel of their very existence, and people were indeed heartbroken. Isaiah promises them that all of this gloom and doom was going to change and that the Lord God will personally intervene in their lives and that their suffering and sorrow will be transformed into healing and joy. The presence of the Lord truly transforms the lives of the people; it will turn their sorrow into joy. Responsorial Psalm reminds us to call upon the Lord to come and save us. It further goes on to describe the transformation the Lord can bring to our lives, and is similar to the promise of God through Isaiah, in the first reading. He will wipe the sorrow from the faces of those who are hurting and will fill them with joy. The second reading is a passage from the letter of St. James, where he urges the faithful to be patient in waiting for the Lord. This patient waiting has to be marked by a faithfulness to God and graciousness towards others. Like the prophets who endured the suffering with hope, we are called to wait, because all the sufferings will turn to joy. The Gospel presents John the Baptist trying to be reassured of the Messiahship of Jesus. Jesus assures him, through his disciples, when Jesus asks them to go and report all that was happening through the actions of Jesus. This is a fulfillment of the promises made through Isaiah, where people who are hurting are experiencing the comforting presence of the Lord. Their suffering is removed, and they experience the joy of being embraced by the loving presence of God. Jesus transforms their sorrow into joy. He goes beyond the past promises, when he even raises the dead to life. Let no suffering deter our enthusiasm, because the Lord has come to embrace us with his transforming love and give us joy.
