Did you know about the Saints: Saint Kateri Tekakwitha whose feast we celebrate on July 14, was the first indigenous American to be canonized as a saint. Known as the "Lily of the Mohawks" she is the patroness of ecology and environment. St. Kateri lost her family at the age of four due to a smallpox epidemic and suffered greatly from the disease herself. She learned about the Gospel from a group of Jesuits and, after converting, was disrespected and persecuted by her own community for being a Christian. She consecrated herself as a virgin and was known for spending most of her youth and young adult years in adoration with the Lord. She is a model of purity, chastity, and the New Evangelization. She embodied both the Gospel and her native culture. St. Kateri is an inspiration to all World Youth Day pilgrims who come on pilgrimage carrying the weight of suffering, anxiety, and persecution.

Pastor's Note: Creating a world of **compassion....**St. Paul sets the stage for this weekend's readings, when he says, "Christ is the image of the invisible God". Understanding who Christ is, is important, because it is then we will be able to fathom the depth of his life and teachings. Since during this Ordinary time of the Liturgical Season, we focus on the teachings of Jesus, it is imperative to keep in mind that he is the visible expression of the heart of God. Since God is the one who gave the Law, the presence of Jesus with him, from the time of the creation, is established by Paul to remind us that the words and actions of Jesus are in accordance with the wish and will of God the Father. The First Reading focusses on the importance of the Law, as Moses is presenting them to the Israelites. The Commandments of the Lord are to be listened to and observed. The commandments of the Lord are not some remote things that we ought to reach out for. As Moses puts it, the law is near to us, and in fact in our hearts. The Commandments of the Lord are given as a means to restore our true existence as human beings created in the image of God. What we are asked to do is actually a call to be alive and active as images of God. The Responsorial Psalm reminds us, therefore, to turn to the Lord in order for us to live. The Lord is the source of life, and it is to honor God that we are given the Law. Honoring God has been the greatest desire of the people of Israel. It is with this desire that the scholar of the law approaches Jesus to ask about the way in which one can inherit eternal life. Even though he is someone who has been practicing the law as a faithful follower, he lacked a proper understanding of what it means to love one's neighbor. The Jewish community, in those days, had a very restricted understanding of the term neighbor, because for them, it was limited to loving only their own. Jesus expands this understanding of neighbor. For Jesus, the true meaning of loving our neighbor is a call to be compassionate. Compassion, according to Jesus, is not something that we feel and use selectively. Nothing can and should come in the way of expressing our compassion. It is a means by which we truly reflect the love of God, who shows compassion to everyone alike. We are called to be like him.

Let us pray for the victims and families in Highland Park, Illinois.
