**Did you know about the Saints:** On November 11, we celebrate the feast of Saint Martin of Tours (316 – 397). Martin was born in Hungary, raised in Italy, was forced to serve in the army at 15 years old. He was raised by pagans but through God’s grace was baptized at the age of 18. At the age of 23 he refused a bonus by stating, “I have served you as a soldier but now I wish to serve Christ.” Eventually he was discharged which allowed him to be ordained a priest, become an exorcist, and eventually be consecrated Bishop of Tours, France. Martin was one of the first Saints to be canonized without being a martyr.

**Pope Francis says:** Today, the Lord reminds us that death comes to make truth of life. The Gospel explains how to live out the wait: we go to meet God by loving, because He is love.



**Pastor’s Note: Living a life leading to its fullness....**There has always been questions raised about what follows death in every religion. In Judaism, there were different belief systems connected with life after death. Sadducees were a sect within Jewish Religion that denied that there was life after death. There were no prior references, except some random ones, to this aspect of their faith, in their Scriptures. Hence the confusion about what happens after death. Maccabees was one Book that made references to life after death and the need to pray for the dead. Today the readings focus on the fullness of life that awaits us and the need for us to live faithful lives, in order for us to experience its fullness in our afterlife. The first reading is from the second Book of Maccabees. Here we have the story of seven brothers who remain faithful to the God of Israel even to the point of sacrificing their lives. Their refusal to go against the requirement to abstain from eating pork, as laid out in their Scriptures, they proclaim that they hope to have their lives restored by God, even after their death. For them, faithfulness to God in this life leads to a fuller life in the next. That our joy will be full, when the glory of God appears, is stressed in the Responsorial Psalm. It further goes on to describe what leads to experiencing this joy in its fullness, a life of faithfulness to God. The second reading from the second Letter of St. Paul to the Thessalonians, is an encouragement to live lives in accord with God’s ways and remain faithful to him, who brought us life, through Jesus Christ. In the Gospel, we see a group of people coming to question Jesus, with regard to his teaching on fullness of life, so that they could trap him into saying something that will contradict the Jewish faith and practices. The Sadducees are the ones who challenge Jesus with a tricky question, since they do not believe in the resurrection of the dead. Jesus, refusing to be entrapped by their vile and silly outlook on life, leads them to a deeper understanding of life, both here on earth and the one after. God, as Jesus describes, is not one who would forget the faithfulness of people, but one who would lead them to fullness of life, since he is ‘not a God of the dead, but a God of the living’. We are called to live lives worthy of our calling, to be faithful to the God of life, by living meaningful lives.
