Did you know about the Saints: On July 25, we celebrate the feast of Saint James. "He walked along a little farther and saw James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John." (Mark 1:19) James along with John and Peter, were with Jesus during the Transfiguration and at the garden of Gethsemani. The brothers, James and John, were described by Jesus as the "sons of thunder." James was the first Apostle to be martyred and his remains are in a tomb at the Cathedral of Santiago, Spain. There is a traditional pilgrimage to the Cathedral that is 120 miles long and is referred to as the "Way of Saint James". When James' feast day falls on a Sunday, it is referred to as a Jacobean or Compostela Holy Year and a special east door is opened by the Bishop at the Cathedral of Santiago.

## Pastor's Note:.... Compassion of God is calling us....

Today we praise God using the most famil-

iar Psalm, "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want." We go on to stress the effect of this in our lives, and proclaim, "Only goodness and kindness follow me all the days of my life." This Psalm sums up God's relationship with us humans. Shepherding is not an easy task. It involves risking one's life for the sake of the sheep, trying to keep it safe from wild animals. That is why God uses the imagery of a shepherd to describe his love for the people. Jesus himself used this imagery of a shepherd to convey his commitment to the people, when he described himself as the Good Shepherd. When it comes to God, it has been our experience that he does not use words loosely. When God describes himself as the Shepherd, it is an expression of the reality we experience from him. During this ordinary time of the Year, our effort is to learn from God, and especially from the teaching and preaching of Jesus, and more so from the way he conducts himself, to be true disciples of Jesus. Today, on this Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, all the readings for the Liturgy talks about the compassion of our Lord, and they further challenge us to reflect the same compassion in our lives, as we strive to live as true disciples of Jesus. In the first reading, through Prophet Jeremiah, God condemns the leaders who failed to care for the people and promises to send them leaders who would care for them with compassion and love. The second reading, from the letter to the Ephesians, we are reminded that Jesus, with his blood, brought us nearer to God and to those from whom we were estranged.

This compassion of Jesus also united the people who once were divided on the basis of religion. In Jesus, we have all become one, one Shepherd and one sheepfold. It is the compassion of Jesus that made this possible, as is manifested in the Gospel passage. Jesus does not use people for his power, he uses his power for the good of the people. That is the compassion we are called to live with.
