Did you know about the Saints: On August 25, we celebrate the feast of Saint Louis XIV of France (1214 -1270). Louis was crowned King at the age of 12 in 1226. As King of France, he exhibited great zeal as a devout Catholic. Louis commissioned the construction of the Sainte-Chapelle (Holy Chapel) within the Royal Palace to accommodate relics of the true cross. He also built cathedrals, churches, libraries, hospitals, orphanages, and oversaw the completion of the Cathedral of Notre Dame. He would serve meals to the poor and invited thirteen guests to dine with him each day. Louis also reformed the French legal system to allow petitioners to appeal judgements. Multiple crusades were led by Louis to liberate the Holy Land and to protect Christianity. There are many cities throughout the world named after Louis including the city of Saint Louis, Missouri. Canonization Countdown: 14 days until the canonization of Frassati and Acutis at Saint Peters on September 7<sup>th</sup>.

### Pastor's Note: A God who loves every-

one....Our faith has a bearing on our outlook on life and our interpersonal relationships. We become new creations in Christ, by virtue of our baptism, is a reminder of this fact that, we acquire a new vision, in conformity with Jesus' experience and understanding of God. Jesus, through his life and his preaching, always demonstrated that our God is someone who always reaches out to, and cares for all kinds of people. This weekend we are reminded of the care and concern of God for all people and are invited to trust this God who loves everyone equally. The first reading is from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah. In the passage, the Lord makes a promise to bring together all the people and promises that he would treat people of other nations as equals to the people of Israel. There is a convergence of the people, brought about by the Lord treating with love and compassion. This loving embrace of the Lord is also an invitation to 'go out to all the world and tell the Good News', as the Responsorial Psalm reminds us. In the second reading, taken from the letter to the Hebrews, the love of the Lord is emphasized. This love may not seem a bit tough in the beginning, because it is an invitation to correct ourselves, so that our lives may be in conformity with the ways of the God of love. This exhortation to change may not be seen as easy by us, but it is the path that leads to life. In the Gospel passage Jesus stresses that mere lip service to the Lord, will not give us an assurance of a place in heaven. An effort to follow the Lord will not be easy, because it is an invitation to open our hearts to everyone around us. Our efforts to live lives of love, as a reflection of God's love that invites everyone from all over the world, is what is going to help us enter through that narrow door to heaven.
