The first reading, taken from the Book of Sirach presents before us, the connection between our faith and our respect for the family members. This reading extolls the virtues of family life and the necessity of abiding love for a proper conduct of each person’s role in the family. It is love that binds the family together and their reverence of the Lord enables them to be respectful of each other. In the second reading, taken from St. Paul’s letter to the Colossians, we read of the qualities that we are called to develop, in order for us to live a happy family life. When we have those qualities, we will walk in God’s ways and there will be joy in the family, as reminded by the Responsorial Psalm. In the Gospel we see the manifestation of the qualities needed in a happy family, as we see the struggle of Joseph and Mary to protect child Jesus.
