Sermon

"Christmas Preparations"

Rev. Stillwell

Before you begin anything you must prepare. Before I begin preaching my sermon I begin writing it, but before that I read the scripture, read the commentaries, look up information and pray. I often use stories and illustrations from things that I have read, maybe last week, maybe last year, maybe ten years ago, and I often find that the things to which I have been listening and conversations I have been having find their way into my sermons. The point is that there is a lot of preparation that goes into a 15 minute sermon. The same is true of anything you might do. If you want to paint you don't just throw paint on a wall. You look at samples and choose a color. You gather your supplies, move the furniture, cover the floor, and then you paint. When my daughter wants to help me make pancakes, I found out quickly that this did not include gathering the ingredients. She let me do all that and call her in when it came time to really put the batter in the pan. In all things it is true as they say that failure to prepare is preparing to fail.

Well now we are in the season of advent, which is a season of preparation, and we have been getting prepared by decorating our church and getting ready for the Christmas celebration. I do this as a minister, but I do it in my own life as well. Today I will put out my Christmas decorations, after getting them down out of the attic last week, sorting them into the rooms that they will go, putting away the fall decorations, and cleaning the house, not to mention the lights I put outside when we had nice weather days in November. A lot of preparation goes into being prepared for the season of preparation.

I know I am not alone in this. You have preparation to do as well. For instance, I bet you all have some baking to do for Christmas. Of course you must get your recipes and your ingredients, and you must prepare your baking space and pre-heat the oven before you can even begin. Likewise, we all know that no one just gives presents. There is making a list, checking it twice, scouting the stores and finding the best price, wrapping and tagging, and then, only when all has been prepared are you finally ready to give the gift.

If it is true that preparation comes before anything and indeed everything, then how much preparation comes before God is ready to give the world the greatest gift, the long awaited Messiah?

Quite a bit you would think, which is why our story from the gospel of Luke, the first story in the gospel of Luke, is one of preparation. Luke begins the gospel, a story about Jesus, with the birth of not Jesus but of John, because the world has to be prepared for the great thing God is about to do, and that will be John's role as a child and later as an adult.

Luke tells us of a priest named Zachariah and his wife named Elizabeth, and the momentous day in which God answered their prayer of a child and answered their nation's prayer of a messiah, but, first, Zachariah had to prepare himself and the room for God.

The priests of that time had been divided into 24 divisions each responsible for the conduct of temple worship for one week twice a year and then one was chosen by lot to burn the incense which means that a

priest might never have this honor. This time Zachariah was chosen and he prepared himself by doing his duties, saying is prayers, and gathering the assembly to pray outside of the holy of holies. Then clothed in his priestly garments and equipped with the incense that would prepare the room for God's presence he entered the room and encountered something for which he was not prepared.

He encountered God, or the presence of God, in the form of a messenger from God, an angel who said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard. Your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you will name him John. ¹⁴You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth." No one can be prepared for this. Some mark his fear as a sign that he had little faith, but that is not fair. Every time an angel appears in the Bible they start by saying, "Fear not" and do you know why? Because they are scary. They are shocking; no one is prepared to see them. Even Mary will soon be told to fear not because no one can be prepared for an angel to show up and make an announcement.

But that is what happens and the angel came to prepare Zachariah for the birth of a child that he had likely no longer expected. Not only that, but the angel goes on to say:

"He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be filled with the Holy Spirit. ¹⁶He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. ¹⁷With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

So he hears this and his wife, Elizabeth, conceives, and for five months she remained in seclusion. She said, ²⁵ This is what the Lord has done for me when he looked favorably on me and took away the disgrace I have endured among my people.' When Elizabeth gives birth she reaffirms the angel's message saying:

"And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High;

for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways,

to give knowledge of salvation to his people

by the forgiveness of their sins.

78 By the tender mercy of our God,

the dawn from on high will break upon us.

to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.'

This, then, is the story of preparing the world for Jesus' birth, and, as an adult, John will be used to prepare the world for Jesus' ministry. To look at it quickly it appears that not much preparation is needed at all just a few verses in fact that cover all of nine months But if we look again we see that, although the angel's message was about what would happen in the near term future, much of the story reminds us of the long ago past.

Zachariah and Elizabeth's circumstance should remind us of Abraham and Sarah. They were both a childless couple who believed they were long past the childbearing years. Luke describes them as "⁶Both of them were righteous before God, living blamelessly according to all the commandments and regulations of the Lord. ⁷But they had no children, because Elizabeth was barren, and both were getting on in years." Change the names and this is a description that could have come for the book of genesis to refer to Abraham and Sarah,

Abraham and Sarah prepared the way for Jesus by coming to Israel, the land that God showed them, and by giving birth to the nation of Israel. That is not the only echo of the past that we see in our story for John was to be like Samson and Samuel who were Nazirites. The angel said of John, "15for he will be great in the sight of the Lord. He must never drink wine or strong drink; even before his birth he will be

filled with the Holy Spirit" Samson was a judge and Samuel was a prophet and it was Samuel who played a part in preparing the world for Christ by choosing David as the second king of Israel, according to Gods instructions.

John's role will be like Samuel's in that he will be a prophet, but he will not help choose or advice kings. Rather, John will resemble Elijah as written in the book of Malachi, the last book in the Old Testament which speaks of the day that:

"I will send you the prophet Elijah before the great and terrible day of the Lord comes. He will turn the hearts of parents to their children and the hearts of children to their parents, so that I will not come and strike the land with a curse."

The resemblance is so strong that many people believe John to be Elijah returned fulfilling what the angel said previously to Zechariah, "¹⁶He will turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God. ¹⁷With the spirit and power of Elijah he will go before him, to turn the hearts of parents to their children, and the disobedient to the wisdom of the righteous, to make ready a people prepared for the Lord."

Luke gives us just a few verses to prepare us for the coming of Christ, but what we see in them is that all of the history of Israel was a preparation for what God was going to do. There is not that much in the Hebrew Scriptures about a messiah. The word is Hebrew for "anointed one" and refers to many things and people including, Cyrus of Persia, the only non-Jew named messiah by the prophet, Isaiah.

Traditionally a messiah was someone anointed to do something for a period of time, but starting in Isaiah the term begins to be associated with a descendant of David who will be not a messiah, but the messiah, and from that point on the people had been preparing for him to come. Luke shows us that all of Israel's history was one of preparation. God gave the people the law to show them their sinfulness, and Paul argues that Jesus fulfilled the law, and Hebrews explains that Jesus fulfilled the sacrificial system.

In just a few verses Luke has set the table, he has gathered all the ingredients, he has checked his list of things to include, he has prepared us for what will be an incredible story. Let us take the time of Advent to prepare ourselves to hear it, and respond to it.

Even though we receive some income from rents, royalties from mineral rights coming from property gifts from former members, and other gifts, the **preponderance** of our budget comes from members' contributions. Together we will survive and prosper.

Please also consider whether you would be willing to give your time and talent to become an elder or trustee. We still need two elders and a trustee to fill our 2022 slate of officers.

As we are in our Advent season preparing for celebrating the birth of Jesus, the one who saved us and created our religion, may we all help each other in whatever way we can to remain a vibrant force in our community.

As we make preparations for our Christmas celebration perhaps the one that takes up most of people's time is Christmas shopping. I have come to enjoy purchasing presents for others almost as much as I enjoy receiving them because, knowing that I have the perfect gift that will make someone happy is a wonderful feeling. Giving the gift of a present feels so right that I have no doubt that it is in the spirit of the Christmas story, but it is not actually in the letter of the Christ story.

Jesus received a few presents from the wise men after his birth, but that's about it. During his life Jesus receives only few gifts that we are told of, and Jesus, himself, gives very little in the way of material things to the people that he meets. Apart from loaves and fish we can say that Jesus gave hardly any gifts at all.

Instead, he gave the gift of his personal presence, and gifts that were treasures of the heart: self-belief, inner peace, dignity, healing, compassion, and forgiveness. All of these gifts are represented here in the communion meal. At this table we are given a very little material gift, but the personal gifts we receive are numerous, for here we receive grace, mercy, forgiveness, encouragement, and renewal. Above all we find ourselves in communion with each other and with our Lord as we experience the very real presence of Jesus Christ in our midst.

This Advent as we spend time and money looking for the perfect physical gift, let us not forget to give the gift of presence as Christ did. For so many, gifts of kindness, compassion, warmth, and forgiveness, are the greatest gifts of all. These are the gifts we receive when we share this meal. Let us also share them with others that may receive Christ's presence as well.
