

Sermon "The Least We Can Do"

Have you ever been hungry? I don't mean missed lunch hungry, I mean really hungry. So hungry that you thought that your stomach might eat itself for want of food. So hungry that even if there was food before you, you do not know if you would have the energy to eat it? Have you ever been so thirsty that you thought even a few drops of water would make a difference? Or maybe you have been cold. Not chilly but freezing, because you wore the wrong clothes and you found yourself out in a snowstorm wearing old tennis shoes so that the snow filled up every crack and crevice in the toes and the heels. You walk so long that you begin to lose feeling in your toes. You lose feeling so long that you fear that you might lose your toes all together.

But then you find your way home. You summon the energy to climb those last steps. As soon as you enter your home the heat hits your toes and feeling, slow and painful, but wonderful feeling begins to return. Before you were not sure you could take another step, but the heat, and the sight of the sink gives you the energy you need to pour yourself a nice glass of water to quench your thirst. After that it is no problem to open that refrigerator and eat the leftover pizza that cures your hunger.

How good did that first blast of heat hitting the tips of your blue and wet feet feel? What was the relief like when those first drops of clear, clean water poured over your lips and raced down your throat? How incredible did the food taste when it filled your empty stomach? Did it feel like a blessing given to you by God himself?

And how much did you take these things for granted when you had them before? Well, if you are like me, you probably didn't notice the heat on your feet before it was gone. Maybe you even complained often that there was too much heat. Maybe you hardly ever drank the water because it wasn't fun to drink. It's not that it tastes bad it's just that it isn't nearly as enjoyable to drink as a can of Coke that has sugar, caffeine, sparkling bubbles, even if it does not hydrate you. Maybe that pizza wasn't the best, and the reason it was leftover is because it was burned, dry, and had mushrooms on it instead of pepperoni.

Of course, there are millions of people throughout the world who would love to have any of the things that you and I often take for granted, and it was just these people to whom Jesus referred when he taught his disciples about the Kingdom of God in the 25th chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew.

First, if we read the whole chapter, we hear about the wise and foolish bridesmaids and learn from this parable that we should prepare ourselves for the time to come when we will meet Christ since we know neither the day nor the hour. Then we hear the parable of the talents and learn that we must use the gifts that God has given us to enter into the joy of our master. But how can we use our gifts to prepare ourselves for the day in which we meet Christ? According to this last story if we share our gifts with those in need we will not need to wait any longer for Christ to return, for we will be meeting him face to face.

34Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; 35for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, 36I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."

The righteous were astounded to hear this and they asked him when had they done these things. He answered them: "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

This is what God's judgement ultimately looks like. There is nothing said about correct belief or right doctrine. There is no mention of an emotional conversion experience or a sufficient spiritual life. There is no mention of these things because they are ancillary to the good news of Jesus Christ.

Make no mistake, it is important to understand who Jesus Christ is and what he has done for us, but what good does it do to have correct belief but not feed the Hungry or give a drink to the Thirsty?

Of course, turning your life over to Christ's will is the first step to be a Christian, but how faithful can a person truly be if they welcome Jesus into their heart but show no hospitality to a Stranger?

God has given us the gift of prayer to help us in need and deepen our faith along the way, but what use is a person to God who prays everyday but does not clothe the Naked?

We want to share the good news of Christ but how successful will our evangelism be if we invoke Christ's name but do not minister to the Sick, or visit the Imprisoned?

There are 2 billion Christians in the world. 2 billion people who claim to follow the teachings of Christ and yet there are 852 million people across the world who are hungry and do not have clean water to drink or sufficient clothing to wear.

But we tend to think of hunger as a global issue in third world countries or war and famine ravished lands. Hunger of course is real right in our own country. 36.3 million Americans—including 13 million children—live in households that experience hunger or the risk of hunger. This is equal to more than one in ten households in the United States (11.2 percent).

Making matters worse is that inflation, food scarcity, and cutbacks on programs that help the needy have only seen hunger increase. The result of this increase in poverty is that America's Second Harvest, the nation's largest network of food banks, reports that 23.3 million people turned to their food banks last year, and forty percent of these people were from working families.

Add to these numbers the amount of people who are sick in our country and in our world, and the number of people who are imprisoned, and the good news of Jesus Christ that he who cares for the least of these does so also to him becomes a hard teaching.

I do not believe that Christians do not care or do not take Jesus' teaching seriously. Instead, I believe that it is such an overwhelming command to tackle such significant problems that we tend to think we are powerless, and perhaps we worry that we may be seen as goats rather than sheep. But remember that Christ did not tell us that we had to feed all the hungry, clothe all the naked, or heal all the sick. Christ said, "Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

In the midst of Christ's sometimes hard words to hear comes some truly wonderful news. In as much as we share what we have with one person we share it with Christ. Therefore, for Jesus, the only distinction between men that ultimately matters seems to be not whether they are churchgoers or non-churchgoers, liberals or conservatives, Catholics or Protestants or Jews, but do they or do they not love - love not in the sense of an emotion so much as in the sense of an act of the will, the loving act of willing another's good even, if need arise, at the expense of their own. "Hell is the suffering of being unable to love," said Father Zossima or, as John puts it in his first epistle, "He who does not love remains in death."

As you did it to one of the least of these, you did it to Christ. Just as Jesus appeared at his birth as a helpless child that the world was free to care for or destroy, so now he appears in his resurrection as the pauper, the prisoner, the stranger: appears in every form of human need that the world is free to serve or to ignore. Remember always that you cannot love Christ in the church if you do not love him in the street, the homeless shelter, or the refugee camp.

In the midst of such dreadful statistics that we have heard, provided by the organization, Bread for the World, there is also some good news, and that is hunger does not exist because the world does not produce enough food. We have the experience and the technology right now to end the problem. The challenge we face is not production of food and wealth, it is the will to distribute it.

There is no doubt that when the cause and the solution of a problem have been known and yet it has still persisted for years, the will to solve it is lacking, but I do not believe that the will is lacking here. I do not believe that the members of this church are afraid or unwilling to give food to the hungry or a drink to the thirsty.

We have, just since May, donated 264 items to the Community Circle Food Pantry which includes 55 jars of peanut butter, 36 jars of jelly, 18 packages of toilet paper. It is the least that we can do for the least among us.

But I believe that we will find that the even the least things that we do will go much farther than we think. Even as far as the Kingdom.

Hear these words from a hymn entitled, "Look Who Gathers at Christ's Table!" written by Thomas H. Troeger in 2000, and copyrighted in 2002 by Oxford University Press. As is noted at the bottom of the hymn in a Presbyterian hymnal, "this text celebrates the radical hospitality that characterizes Christ's welcome, which transcends time and reaches in all directions (Matthew 8:11/Luke 13:29). Saints of old are, like us, people in need of forgiveness, and the response to such pardon is 'thanks and praise.'"

Look who gathers at Christ's table! Hear the stories that they bring. Some are weeping; some are laughing; some have songs they want to sing. Others ask why they're invited, burdened by the wrong they've done. Christ insists they all are welcome. There is room for everyone.

Clouds of light surround the table; ancient followers appear, Saints confessing how they wrestled with their guilt, their doubt and fear. Peter tells of his denying Christ was ever in his sight; Paul relates his fruitless efforts to obliterate the light.

Their sad stories are repeated in a thousand different ways, But they share one thing in common: they all end with thanks and praise For the host who has invited north and south and east and west To converge around this table, where all life is fed and blest.

Bring your joy and bring your sadness, and prepare to be surprised By the host whose hands are wounded, who will open wide your eyes When he blesses bread and breaks it – truth and manna from above! And then passes wine that wakens in your heart the taste of love.

Come. You are welcome to this table as we share the bread and pass the juice. This is Christ's table and you are welcome here.
