Empowering the Laity to Care for Pastors

Presenter: Rev. Greg Alexander

Pastors and their families are human, too! They have the same realities to deal with in their lives as do the members of their congregation. This webinar will explore healthy and unique ways laity can help meet the needs of their pastors.

The Rev. Greg Alexander is the General Minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Kentucky. He has been working with congregations and pastors as a member of the CCK staff for over 25 years and brings that experience to this webinar. In addition, he is an adjunct faculty member of Lexington Theological Seminary as an instructor in Congregational Systems.

Using Congregational Assets to Strengthen Community

Presenter: Rev. Dr. Joe Blosser

Does your congregation have a building that sits empty most of the year? Do you have a large plot of land around the church? Are there local leaders, key influencers and great storytellers in your congregation? Do you have cooks, seamstresses, contractors and grandmothers? This webinar intends to help pastors and lay leaders explore the ways the various assets of their congregations could be put to more intentional missional use. We will consider charity and volunteer work and also think of systemic changes congregations can support through grassroots coalition building, policy and structural change and racial reconciliation.

Rev. Dr. Joe Blosser is the Robert G. Culp Jr. Director of Service Learning and Associate Professor of Religion and Philosophy at High Point University. He is an ordained minister in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). He joined the HPU faculty in 2011 after teaching at the University of Chicago and DePaul University. He primarily teaches Business Ethics, Educational Ethics, Christian Theology and Civic Responsibility and Social Innovation.

Children's Message*

Do you ever make art (like coloring, drawing, painting, writing poems or stories, crafts)? Why do you make art? What do you enjoy about it? Do you ever make art to show how you feel? Why does making art help with that?

One of today's scriptures is a psalm (Psalm 114) that celebrates God's deliverance of the Israelites from slavery in Egypt. Do you remember how we talked a couple weeks ago about how the pharaoh in Egypt forced the Israelites to do hard, dangerous work without pay, or any human rights, to build his empire? Many countries have enslaved people to build up wealth and power— including the United States—even though it is unjust. It isn't right.

Do you remember the baby Moses? And God talking to Moses from a burning bush? God used Moses to free the Israelites from Pharaoh's hard labor. Pharaoh didn't want to lose all the work they were doing for free, but God kept making it harder and harder for Pharaoh to keep them. Eventually the Israelites were able to flee, and God divided the Red Sea so they could walk through the waters to freedom.

Psalm 114 is a poem that uses art and creative expression to depict God's wonder, strength, and loyalty toward the Israelites. In the poem, God even taunts the mountains and the seas—which should be immovable forces or objects—saying that they trembled and fled.

Art like this psalm can be a way to resist (push back against) mighty powers and oppressive forces that hurt people. Look around this week for art that resists mistreatment and unfair practices in your community—here at church, in your schools, public spaces, at home – maybe even something that you have made!

Dear God, thank you for art and all the ways you give us to express ourselves. Thank you for caring for your people. Thank you for calling on us to resist things that aren't right and work together to find a better way. Amen.

Sermon*

“Beware Your Limits of Forgiveness”

Oh, I do love Peter! He made life so much easier for his fellow disciples...and even generations later for us in turn. You see living in relationship, whether in families or among friends...or even among members in the church does create some uncomfortable situations...hurt feelings, jealousies, times of tension that leave us upset with one another. The disciples wanted to know what was expected of them...we want to know what is expected of us! So, Peter, boldly steps forward and no doubt feeling somewhat sure of himself comes to Jesus to ask for clarity of how often should they forgive one another in those uncomfortable situations.

I have a belief that by this time in their travels with Jesus that they have learned that their teacher goes beyond what the normal expectations and requirements of faithful Jewish devotees would recommend. So...in place of forgiving once or twice...why not say 7...you know once for each day of the week. Now that's generous and compassionate. And just as he was prepared to pat himself on the back, Jesus corrects him by saying not 7 but seventy-seven times...or it also can correctly be translated as 70 times 7. Please don't get hung up on the precise number...Peter didn't, he well understood that what Jesus was truly saying was this is not a question that deserves a definite number. Like saying a kagillion...it's endless.

Forgiveness for Jesus had much more to do with the quality than the quantity. Forgiveness for one who wishes to live like Christ is a way of being, a way of living and relating to others...even those we do not know. And to those for whom we have no responsibility.

Consider how Jesus clarifies this concept of forgiveness. In this remarkable story of the king and his servant. Now how this servant ever accumulated the debt to the king, I can't imagine...for it was a sum of 10,000 talents...might as well have been that kagillion. As great as a national debt. For a denarii was the equivalent of a day's work and a talent consisted of 20 years of a day laborer's wage...or 200,000 years of wages. No Jesus was exaggerating for a purpose.

And the purpose was to correct our understanding of the importance of forgiveness. Without forgiveness relationships would never be mended, families would disintegrate into loneliness, and most importantly, without it we have no hope. Among the ways we approach life from our common sense is to repeat that old adage, “Fool me once, shame on you, fool me twice shame on me.” To forgive, especially if it is a limitless number of times makes us look foolish, look weak. And for us who want to be like Christ the answer to that is...and your point is?

Not to forgive is to hold a grudge, to feel wounded and angry leads to seeking revenge or to getting even. All these responses lead to a continuation of separation and hurt. We all have our stories of hurt and

offense...and we live in a time when the world seems so angry and divided...forgiveness is our Christian response to all of this. But as C. S. Lewis wrote in *Mere Christianity*, “Everyone says forgiveness is a lovely idea, until they have something to forgive.”

So much of the time we look for alternatives...some avoid the ones who have offended them, or seek revenge by criticizing them to others, some seek revenge, some just sulk in the darkness feeling paralyzed.

With all these methods the relationship is not healed, the pain doesn't go away, we are stuck in the past...forgiveness is the way of Christ...it's the banner that rises above the cross...it's the only solution that lasts and brings peace and reconciliation.

Oh, it doesn't mean that we condone what was done or forget or ignore it, it just means that we refuse to allow past hurts to infect and darken our future. Forgiveness creates room for us to breathe, to make new relationships. Forgiveness is a matter of the heart and spirit, for it is something that must be learned, it does not come naturally for us. We must rise above our instincts.

Thankfully, we have examples of when forgiveness was practiced...it was 2006 in Lancaster County where a man by the name of Charles Carl Roberts took 10 young Amish girls hostage in their one room schoolhouse. Tragically he shot 8 of them, killing 5 before he committed suicide. What followed that seemingly unforgivable event, shook the world as the Amish community in their profound grief reached out to the family of the shooter to offer their forgiveness and grace. Only forgiveness could heal that chasm.

And the most powerful dynamic of forgiveness is that **we** can't create the power to forgive...it originates with God...for we can only share the forgiveness that we have already received...forgiven, and so how many times should I forgive others....
