

Sunday, November 3







The month of November is the season of Thanksgiving. During the Civil War, in an attempt to bolster the morale of the nation, President Abraham Lincoln declared the fourth Thursday of November to be a day of Thanksgiving, and ever since we have kept this tradition. In addition to being a day to give thanks, it is also a day to eat lots of food. At our table there is the requisite turkey, stuffing, and mashed potatoes. In Texas we also ate cornbread stuffing and oysters. In Puerto Rico the table was covered with rice and plantain. Every family has different food traditions for Thanksgiving, but what is common at every table is a spirit of thankfulness that is the reason for the holiday's existence.

Giving thanks is nothing new. In the New International Version of the Bible, Jesus gives thanks fifteen times. Each and every time he gives thanks it comes before a meal. Therefore, it seems that eating and thanking God have always gone hand in hand. These meals never resembled the meals that we have on Thanksgiving. There was some bread, some wine, maybe some water. A few of these meals had some fish as well, yet Jesus had no trouble in finding a reason to thank God for all that he had been given.

He had no trouble being thankful for the food, but perhaps he was most thankful for the people with whom he shared the meal, for at each meal that Jesus gave thanks he was joined by others. Sometimes he ate with as many as five thousand people, while at other times he ate with twelve. Regardless of the number of people he was thankful for the food that brought so many people together and the presence of God at the meal that made everyone like family.

The Thanksgiving Day meal has the power to bring people together as well. Originally, many southerners saw the new holiday as an attempt to impose northern customs on them and refused to observe it. However, in the late 19th century Thanksgiving's emphasis on home and family appealed to people throughout the country. As a distinctly American holiday, Thanksgiving was also considered an introduction to American values for the millions of immigrants then entering the country.

As we prepare to give thanks to God this year let us first give thanks to God not for the food or the abundant material blessings that we have received, but for the spirit of the meal that brings people together. The Thanksgiving Day meal brings families together from all over. It causes people who do not normally talk to one another all year to do so. Indeed, it has brought an entire nation together over the years, and, in a time of often deep division over so many things, it is a meal that brings the nation together once more. Above all let us thank God for this.

You do not have to attend every session. Just join on Zoom when you can and we will gather together to give thanks for God's blessings.

If you have any non-perishable food items you would like to donate to the Community Circle Food Pantry, you can continue to bring them in and place them on the table by the coffee station in the front entrance of the church. Rev. Chris will take them to the pantry at the beginning of each month. Items needed most at this time are: Gravy (Jar or Packets), Canned Vegetables (specifically corn and green beans), Corn Bread Mix, Pie Crust, Instant Mashed Potatoes, Stuffing (boxed), Canned Pumpkin, Canned Sweet Potatoes, Cranberries (canned), Jello/Pudding Mixes, Evaporated Milk, Cake Mixes, Frosting. If you or someone you know would like to volunteer or are in need of the Food Pantry's services, they distribute the food every Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 9-12. 
If you have left over Halloween candy, the Children Worship & Wonder center can always use small/miniature candy to give to the children on Sundays. Thank you!
