"Why Are You So Afraid?

This summer we have been discussing the questions that Jesus asks us, so, today, let's get right to it and ask, why are you so afraid? When I was young I had a strange fear. I saw in the bathtub that the water all went down the drain, and when I asked my brother where it went, he said that it went out to the ocean and never came back. Well, I didn't want to go out to the ocean and never come back, so I stood as far away from the drain as possible while taking a bath, if my mom could get me to take one at all.

I might have been the filthiest person ever if I hadn't seen a Mr. Rogers episode in which he sang a song that explained that no matter what my size I would never go down the drain and that fear was quickly conquered. As silly as that fear was most people have a fear of something that is irrational. We all know the word phobia because it has been attached to so many things.

You don't have to know Latin to know that claustrophobia is the fear of enclosed places, agoraphobia the opposite, fear of open spaces, and arachnophobia is the fear of spiders as well a cheesy horror movie based on that fear.

I can't think of the word phobia without thinking of that great part in "A Charlie Brown Christmas" when Charlie Brown is consulting with his psychiatrist, Lucy, about why he is unhappy at Christmas, and she asks him if he is suffering from a phobia. She runs down the list of familiar and unfamiliar fears and then she gets to Pantaphobia. "What's that?" Charlie asks. "The fear of everything," Lucy responds. "That's it!" Charlie exclaims, and knocks Lucy over with the force of his excitement.

I hope none of you have pantaphobia. I don't know how one would live in a world fearing everything, but we all must learn to deal with fear of something or another in our life. Our world is a world in which fear not only exists but thrives and human beings respond to fear instinctually. In some ways fear is a gift. It is part of our survival designed to tip us off to the things that endanger us so that we may take precautions and defend against them.

On the other hand fear is detrimental, because too much of it can paralyze us and keep us from being truly free. Every person has a fear. In fact, every person has many fears, and the first step in conquering fear is acknowledging it.

So why are you so afraid? Are you afraid of losing your job or that you do not have enough money to live on or retire with? Do you fear that crime is everywhere or terrorism lurks and your personal safety is at issue? Do you dread the state of the world and worry that everything is getting unavoidably worse?

If so then you have probably been watching or reading the news, and, while it is important to stay informed, we should always take what the news media shows us with a grain of salt. It is not the whole picture. Barry Glassner has an excellent book entitled "The Culture of Fear" in which he examines the way in which television news stoked people's fears to increase its ratings. At the time of its publication, 1999, violent crime was at an all-time low, but images and reports of it on the news were at an all-time high.

When I worked in talk radio, I learned how the game worked. Each show the host would scan the wires for one story that showed to him that the world was going to Hell and would go to Hell unless we listened to him and did what he told us. People only listened, he told me, if he could whip them into a fury. And whip them he did.

Maybe world events isn't what gets you nervous. Maybe your fear is more personal. Are you afraid of making the wrong choice? Choosing the wrong job or mate, or the wrong time to have kids or get married or retire are fears that loom large in most minds.

Maybe the fear you have is more immediate. Are you concerned that you won't fit in or be with the right crowd? If so then you have probably been watching commercials. Advertisements often work to make us fearful that if we do not have the item they are selling, then we will be outcast and lead miserable lives. Some are more subtle than others in conveying this message but they all prey on our fears in order to open our wallets.

But perhaps all of the above fears are small compared to what you are afraid of. Have you gone straight to the biggest fear of all? Are you afraid of God? If this describes you then you have probably been watching TV evangelists or had a bad experience with a church that used fear to inspire commitment. If so, as the great psychologist, Lucy Van Pelt says, "You're not alone."

The Bible often uses the phrase "the fear of God" as something we all should have, and to some degree, I would agree, but fearing God can easily get in the way of us loving God, and that is a dangerous thing. A lot of preachers use the fear of God to draw crowds and raise funds, but God is not the one to fear. God is not the enemy. Fear is the enemy, and God is here to help take away our fear.

That's why Jesus, just after having called his disciples, calms the storm on the sea and asks a question of his disciples that should appear obvious. After their boat is rocked by a storm he calms the storm, looks at his disciples, and says, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?"

We call this passage the calming of the storm, but in my mind Jesus calmed two storms that day. He calmed the physical storm on the Sea of Galilee that threatened to sink the disciples' boat, and he also calmed the spiritual storm in the heart of his disciples that threatened to sink their hope. They gave up everything to follow a man who claimed to be the son of God which was a blasphemous thing to claim, and they had to wonder if God was not exacting a terrible revenge for their audacity.

Perhaps they thought that God was recreating the story of Jonah and a fish awaited them under the sea with open mouth, but one command from Christ and their fears, physical and spiritual, were alleviated.

So when Jesus says, "Why are you so afraid?" he appears to be pointing back to the storm and to the disciples reaction to it, but he does not say was or were but are, for the disciples are still afraid, only now they were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

First, they were afraid that Jesus wouldn't use his power. They were afraid that he did not care if they drowned. Then, they were afraid at the awesomeness of his power that even the wind and the waves were at his command. First, they were afraid that they did not get what they wanted and then they were afraid when they did. It reminds me of a quote by the character, Dean Moriarity, from Jack Kerouac's novel "On the Road," that one has stuck with me all my life, because it is so true. He says, "Nothing frightens people more than what they want the most."

Remember asking someone out and how afraid you were that they might say no, but then one day someone says "yes", and you think, "well now what?" Now the stakes have been raised, now the pressure is really on. Ever get a job you had long desired, and then as soon as you do it's, "oh I hope I don't screw this up?" How about holding your child in your arms for the first time and being so filled with joy and fear at the same time you think you'll explode? Nothing frightens people more than what they want the most. That is why people often run away from happy homes, from loving spouses, from success, even from their Lord and savior.

Don't make that mistake. There is no sin in being afraid, but do not let fear get in the way of what you really want. It is no sin when the storms of life rage in your soul, but do not compound the storm by being afraid to go to the one who can calm them. When fear trouble's your heart you can go to him. When sadness forms a sea that spills over as tears across your face Jesus is the one to whom you should go. When your soul is filled with darkness turn to the son of God for a ray of light.

The test of any faith is not do you believe it when the waters are still, but do you believe it and hold on to it like an anchor when the storms come up. It was easy for the disciples to believe in Christ when the sun shone, but when it got dark, not only did they still believe in him, they cried out to him. Let that lesson not be lost on us.

Augustin once wrote:

Lo! What is the cause, stouthearted man, that thy heart is disturbed? That ship in which Christ is asleep is the heart in which Christ is asleep. . So then the tempest beats furiously against thine heart; beware of shipwreck, awake up Christ . . . Christ dwells in thee by faith. Present faith, is Christ present, waking faith, is Christ awake; slumbering faith, is Christ asleep. Arise and bestir thyself; say, "Lord, we perish." . . . Let thy faith awake, and Christ begins to speak to thee.

This is true because Jesus Christ is the anchor of the soul. Those who pray persistently are like sailors who have cast anchor on a rock. As they pull on the anchor, they think they are pulling the rock to themselves, but they are really pulling themselves to the rock.

It is vital, therefore, that we attach ourselves to something that is anchored well, and that is Jesus Christ. Our friends will fail us. Our children and parents will let us down. Our spouses won't be as perfect as we had hoped. Our jobs and churches might not be as together as we thought they were. But Jesus is immovable. The author of Hebrews attests to this when he wrote referring to Jesus Christ, "We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul."

Let us not imagine that we must be fearless to be fistful, for that is an impossible standard as long as we are living in this world, rather let us not allow our fear to master us. Anchor yourself in love divine and he will take care of our fear so that people may know that we are Christians, not because we are fearless, but because we have worry, yet we have still more hope, we are anxious and yet joyful, we have fear from time to time, yet fear never has us.

If we can say this then of all the things we may fear, we will never need fear fear, itself. When that happens then the peace that Christ left with his disciples after his resurrection will also be with us.

I once worked with a campus ministry group who had a t shirt which stated simply, "A Ship in the harbor is safe, but that is not what ships are for" The ship that the shirt refers to is the ship of our faith and the message of that shirt is "Our faith is made by tests and made for tests." How can our faith grow if it does not come into contact with new ideas and different ways of looking at things? We take all that we experience into account, we agree with some things we hear and disagree with others. We sift through the experiences of life and keep what helps us grow and leave behind what holds us back, but always we must be willing to take a risk or else our faith stays in the port safe, but unused; secure, but never knowing the adventures and wonder that we are missing.

If Jesus has stayed on the shore of the Galilee he and his disciples would have been safe, but that is not why Christ had come. In following Christ's example we too must not cling too close to the shore of life.

We must always, no matter how young or old, reach for the opportunity to grow in our faith through study, through questions, inquiries, even doubt and uncertainty, for no faith can be certain unless we have sailed it through the abyss of fear and doubt and come through to tell the story.

But even if we try to keep our ship of faith safe in the harbor storms will find us. Sometimes we experience tragedy and unimaginable loss. We may lose a friend, a loved one, or a job. We may lose our health or our wealth and where is our faith then? We may try to keep it secure in the harbor, but what we eventually discover is that even in the harbor storms and tsunamis can find us.

So let us anchor our faith in the one who commands even the winds and the water, and they obey him. Let us place or lives on the one who is secure. Let us anchor our faith on the rock of ages, not so that we can always be safe and secure, taking no risks, and trying nothing new. Rather let us do so knowing that no matter where the sprit blows us, Christ will be with us and we will make it through the storms of our lives.
