Sermon "Safe At Home"

I am baseball fan and a Pirates fan which means I haven't had a whole lot to cheer about these past forty years or so. Every year I hope that this year might be a good year, because when it is good it is great. I remember the years at the end of the 1980's when they won the division three years in a row. I remember the excitement of wining the wildcard card game against the reds 10 years ago, but one of my favorite baseball memories was when the MLB All Star Game came to town in 2006. I remember that downtown Pittsburgh was just bedlam. People from all over gathered to see the best of the best, knock home runs into the river, to celebrate the memory of Roberto Clemente, and to indulge in America's pastime.

Few sports capture our imagination the way baseball does. There's something universally appealing and poetic about a game whose main purpose is coming "home". The batter is part of a team, a family, but at the plate, he is all alone. He has the cheers and support of his friends but in the end he succeeds or fails on his own. Then when he gets a hit, he travels the field, in enemy territory always afraid of getting thrown out. He gets by because of the oasis of hospitality that he finds on each base, and because of the help he

gets from friends that he meets along the way and his base coaches. Finally, if all goes well the prodigal son returns to home, and everyone cheers.

How much is that like life? You go out into the world to succeed or fail on your own merits supported by the love of your family and friends who cheer you on. You face each challenge hoping not to succumb to the difficulties life throws your way. With the help of others you succeed. Whenever you come home people might not get on their feet and cheer, but they're just as happy to see you safe at home.

With baseball being such an iconic sport perhaps if the 23 Psalm had been written today by an American it might read, "The Lord is my base coach, I will not be thrown out coming home," but of course it wasn't. The twenty third Psalm is quite possibly the most famous and well known six verses of scripture ever written. Its comforting words evoking God as a shepherd guiding each of us, God's sheep, into bucolic fields and keeping us safe from harm are read in many of life's difficult situations. Its brevity makes it an easy passage to remember.

In those days the shepherd was just about the most common job available, but it was also just about the most important job available as well. A person's wealth then was often measured by how much livestock they had. We read that Job was wealthy not because he had much money but because he had 7,000 sheep

The shepherd, therefore, was entrusted with keeping his master's wealth intact. This was a lot harder than managing a portfolio or handling investments. The shepherd had to care for the sheep, to guide them, and to bring them safely home each day.

Because of this, Psalm 23 is often read when we go to our final home. When we die it is the perfect passage to illustrate that feeling of going to our eternal resting place; the home that God has prepared for us. Because of this it is probably read in funeral homes more than in churches, but as powerful as this psalm is for crossing over into death the power of this psalm actually is even greater in life.

If the Lord is our shepherd than we shall not want, we will lie down in green pastures. We will be led beside still waters. We will be led in right paths, and no matter how dark or daunting life becomes we shall fear no evil.

We will feel this peace and comfort because we will know that the Lord prepares a table before us even in the presence of our enemies. And because of this goodness and mercy shall follow us all the days of our life, and we shall dwell in the house of the Lord our whole life long.

Clearly then this is a passage about this life even if it also has implications for the next. Look at these last two sentences: goodness and mercy will follow me all the *days of my life*. I shall dwell in the house of the lord my *whole life long*.

Even in the darkest times we will dwell in the house of the lord. Even in most frightening or uncertain moments we will dwell in the house of the lord. Even when we are weak, alone, and lost, still we dwell in the house of the Lord.

Think of that, sheep go wherever the shepherd leads them knowing that his rod will keep them safe and his staff will keep them from being lost. If God is our shepherd then life placed in God's trust is like being home even in the darkest, farthest places.

It's like carrying a bit of home with you wherever you go. When I lived in Puerto Rico it was the farthest from home I had ever been. The culture was very different and often left me feeling lost, but I knew that one day I would go home. The knowledge that I would eventually return to the comforts of home, turned what could have been a strange and alien land into a wonderful and exciting adventure, because I knew that no matter how far I traveled, all roads eventually led to home.

As the Israelites wandered for forty years in the desert the Lord provided all that they needed, water for their thirst, manna from Heaven and quails for their hunger. Though it was long and difficult and although they encountered many troubles along the way, still the Lord led them home to the Promised Land.

Just like the All Star game. During that game the National League took the lead when Carlos Beltran hit a single and then took second when the throw was sent to home base. Then, on the next pitch, after getting a signal from his base coach who was his only companion and guide on his journey, he stole third. After surviving the danger of striking out, grounding out, flying out, and getting thrown out, he had gone as far as he could possibly go from home and was now only 90ft away. He was so close and yet so far. With the all nine of his enemies focused on him alone in enemy territory he strayed slowly and cautiously from the oasis of safety that was third base, and, when the catcher could not corral a wild pitch, he stole home. After crossing the threshold of home he was greeted with cheers and celebration from his teammates and the fans. He had come home.

And we can be home as well. Whether we travel one thousand miles from home or none at all, God calls us home. For each of us must go out into the world on our own to stand or fall on our own character, yet we are never alone. For the Lord, like a shepherd leads us home and when we get there a feast awaits us. Yet, because we know this it is as if we carry a little piece of home with us wherever we go.

We know that if we get lost God will put us back on track. We know that if we hunger God will provide a feast. We know that if we feel alone God will give us the signals that will keep us safe.

If the Lord is our shepherd or our base coach we will fear no evil, no darkness, no predator or enemy, no wild pitch or fastball, in fact, if we know that if we let the Lord guide us no matter where we travel in life we will inevitably find our way to the home that God has prepared for us, how can we fear anything in this life?

Don't save this psalm for funerals only read this psalm anytime you find yourself worried afraid, or just a little homesick. Heed its words and you will always be safe.

In hearing the 23rd Psalm read, the phrase I usually hear the clearest is the phrase my cup runs over. I don't usually read the KJV of the Bible, but it is hard to not say my cup runneth over even though I would not say runneth in any other situation.

I may be drawn to that phrase because I am thirsty and enjoy drinking maybe more than I enjoy eating, but I think what is most special about it is that it is a symbol for abundance and blessing. It is the idea that we are given so much by a God who loves us so dearly we cannot contain it all, and we should not.

When we have more than we need we are called to give back and share with those who have less. To me a cup that runneth over is a metaphor for grace which Paul described in his letter to Timothy "is not limited or scarce; it overflows abundantly to those who believe."

We come to this table to celebrate God's grace and we are called to leave this table and share it. Like Phillip teaching the eunuch about the gospel, we are sent from this table to share the goodness of God's grace to a world in need of forgiveness. We are not to stay at home enjoying the table that God has prepared and the cup that runneth over. Rather we are to go out into the world to share the cup of forgiveness and bring others back to the table.
