"O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here, until the Son of God appear."

This is the first line of the great Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come Emmanuel", which we will begin singing this Sunday, and it perfectly encapsulates the longing desire Israel had for centuries that God would send a messiah to save them. It marks the change in our relationship to God where before, people went up to the mountain or to the temple to meet God, but now God has come to us, face to face, to meet us wherever we are. Now on the other side of that great event, we still long for God to come to us and help us.

This is good, since we remember that what God has done in the past God will do in the future. It is also good because this desire for God to come to us strikes at the heart of what was so special about Jesus Christ also perfectly described in another hymn, "O Come all Ye Faithful," which sings in its refrain, "O come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord."


These two hymns tell both sides of Christmas, which are that God came to us, making it easier for us to go to God. During this time of Advent we will gather to ask in songs, words, and prayers for God to come and change our lives, help those in need, comfort the lonely, fix the world, bring peace on Earth, but we know that God has already come in the form of Christ, and he has given us what we need already. I believe God always, but in this time especially, is calling us to change ourselves, help those in need, comfort those who are lonely, and to be the change we want to see in the world.

Ours is a relational God, who wants to have a true relationship with us. Too often we do not want the give and take that comes with being in a relationship. We simply want God to come and do the things we do not want to do or believe that we cannot do for ourselves, but Advent reminds us that God came to us in the form of Jesus Christ to show us the way; the way to peace, hope, joy, and love. God has already answered our call, now we must ask ourselves will we answer God's call? Come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord.
