

Our Lord came into the world at a time and place that was very concerned with purity. An entire system of rules and regulations existed to help the people know what they had to do to be pure which was associated with righteous and holiness. All of these rules are recorded in the Torah and had come to be known as the law of the Mosaic Covenant because it was given to Moses on Mt. Sinai, and he came down from the mountain to give it to the Israelites. The law had been carried around with the people in the Ark of the Covenant and, during Jesus' life, were contained in the temple which was the holiest place in all of Israel.

Therefore, you can imagine the controversy Jesus created when he said things to his disciples such as, "What goes into someone's mouth does not defile them, but what comes out of their mouth, that is what defiles them." (Mt 15:11) He said this that they may understand that they should be at least as careful in choosing the words that come out of their mouth as they were about what food was going in as required by the law of Moses.

This is a particularly appropriate verse as the season of Lent begins, which it does on February 22. Lent marks 40 days before Easter and is traditionally a time of preparation for the resurrection in which Christians examine themselves, repent of their sins, and rededicate themselves to following in the footsteps of Christ. One way that they often do this is to fast during Lent by giving up something they like. Often people give up something that goes into their mouths such as, chocolate, pop, or snacks, but this Lent I invite you to give up something that comes out of your mouth; negative words. For the five Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Palm Sunday my sermons will be based on Tim Cameron's book, "The 40-Day Word Fast". This book encourages us to remove certain types of words from our speech in order to grow closer to God and be a source of inspiration rather than a source of destruction.

God wants us to walk in unity, but that unity is hindered when we judge, complain, gossip, or use sarcasm and negative words. This kind of speech brings death to our fellowship so I hope we will fast from these kinds of words. In so doing, we can break chains of the past, restore relationships, and build one another up. Let us go on this journey together so that when Easter comes and we are enjoying all the good chocolate and candy we can also enjoy the fact that what comes out of our mouth is just as sweet.

Board Meeting Notes – January 11, 2023


Stewardship/Finance

- 1. Look at purchasing a battery charging unit for charging rechargeable batteries in an effort to reduce cost and time to replace batteries on the wireless microphones. Quote from Battery Junction \$66.95, free shipping.
- 2. Have completed 99% of the scanning of 2021 financial documents. Expect to finish by early next week.
- 3. Scanning of important Trustee Records.
- 4. Bob O'Korn from Cetera Investments will be attending our Stewardship/Finance Meeting on February 15th to provide a recap of 2022 and what we might expect in 2023.
- 5. We have determined that the Check-In module of the Powerchurch Software that the church uses to tracking their financials can be removed from the annual subscription which will save us \$165.00 this year and moving forward.
- 6. The high level results of our Reese and Fawcett Trust funds show a total negative return of 22.49% and 21.50% respectively compared to a positive return of 8.90% and 7.33% in 2022. This compares to a negative return of the S&P 500 which is a common benchmark of 19.4% but these returns on these investments are net of distributions. Expect further market declines through the Third Quarter of 2023 until inflation cools off.

Personnel Committee

- 1. We will welcome Reverend Barb Bailey to our first meeting in January on the 19th. The addition of her to our committee will provide us with valuable insight.
- 2. We will begin implementing some of the new policies that are in our approved Personnel Committee Policy Manual this month. Some of these items include update Emergency Contact Lists for our employees, having the drug free workplace acknowledgement forms distributed to our employees so that can review and sign-off on them, establishing a Personnel Records filing system to organize employee records even though they are scanned on our electronic records filing system, and distributing the employee handbooks once they are finalized and approved by the Board.
- 3. The early draft of the Employee Handbook which consists of approximately 30 pages is ready for the committee to review. We will begin that process on our meeting on January 19th. The goal is to have it finished in time for the Board Meeting for their review in April.
