

Sermon*

"Back to Work"

Everyone loves to take a vacation. Well, most people do anyway, and even if you don't go anywhere it is nice to take a break from your work. My family is beginning to plan for something in the summer, and we want to go everywhere, but wherever we do go I always add at least a day to my vacation so that when I come home I have some time to recover. I need a day to unpack, and put away, and clean the car, and tend to the yard that has been neglected for a week, but more than anything I need that buffer to prepare myself to get back to work.

It is not that work is so hard, it's just that in order for a vacation to be restful I need to be able to turn my mind off of work, and if I know I have to go back the next day, then the last day of my vacation is not too enjoyable. It is like the Sunday afternoon of my childhood, when I knew that every passing hour brought me closer to returning to school and the homework I put off all weekend needed finishing.

Like a computer, humans need to be turned off and turned back on sometimes in order to work their best. I take vacation, and then I take some time to put my vacation away, so to speak, and some time to prepare for my return so that when I go back to work I am refreshed and ready. What doesn't work is when I am

forced to take a break when I do not want to take one. Last year when we suspended service and I spent a Palm Sunday and Easter weekend at home instead of in the sanctuary was maybe the worst couple weeks of my life, and when someone said to me that she felt like people were taking a vacation I got just about as angry as I have ever gotten. Believe me there was nothing I would rather have been doing than being so busy that I wondered how I would get it all in as is usually the case during Holy week.

Because I hate a forced vacation I feel like I have a better understanding of what the Disciples were going through at the end of the gospels now than I did before. The reason I say this is because it strikes me how much time has passed in our story today. When we read John, the entire post resurrection story is told in only in a couple dozen verses, but it takes place over the course of more than a week.

Jesus appears to Mary Easter morning and the disciples minus Thomas that evening. Then a week later he appears to all disciples including Thomas, and now he appears again to the disciples who have returned to their home, the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias, where it all began when Jesus makes his third appearance to the disciples.

What strikes me is that they have been through Hell, but then received the stunning news that Christ had risen from the dead, and then they saw him themselves and received the Holy Spirit, and then . . . nothing. Nothing for a week, and Jesus returns, and then still nothing. So what do they do during this forced sabbatical? They do the only thing they know how to do. They go back home and back to their work that they did before they followed Jesus. They go fishing.

For some of us a story that ends with the characters going fishing is a story with a happy ending, but the story is not over. Now it has returned to its beginning as we remember that Peter started out as a fisherman. He lived with his wife in Capernaum, where they shared a house with his mother-in-law and his brother Andrew. He and Andrew had their own boat and were in business with a couple of partners named James and John, Zebedee's sons. The first time Jesus laid eyes on him, he took one good look and said, "So you're Simon, the son of John" (John 1:42), and then said that from then on he'd call him Cephas, which is Aramaic for Peter, which is Greek for rock.

As Frederick Buechner says, "Now a rock isn't the prettiest thing in creation or the fanciest or the smartest, and if it gets rolling in the wrong direction, watch out, but there's no nonsense about a rock, and once it settles down, it's pretty much there to stay. There's not a lot you can do to change a rock or crack it or get under its skin, and, barring earthquakes, you can depend on it about as much as you can depend on anything. So Jesus called him the Rock, and it stuck with him the rest of his life. Peter the Rock."

Once this happened Jesus told Peter that he would no longer fish for fish. Instead he could fish for men. But here Peter is, back where he started, fishing for fish, and not even finding any of those. It could possibly make a person wonder what it was all for. I myself wonder why Jesus makes the disciples wait, but I have to think there are lessons in the waiting.

Much like we do at Advent, I think the disciples are being prepared for the next chapter in the story as they wait. I think that Jesus' multiple appearances help them to believe that what they are seeing isn't just an illusion or a hallucination. I think they need time to come to grips with all that has happened, and they need some time to think about what it means before this final scene in John's gospel.

I think Jesus waits until they are ready and, as always, Jesus likes to make an entrance. So he appears at the shore, and they do not know him. While they have fished all night but caught nothing he suggests they try a specific spot and, having nothing to lose, they do and catch a lot of fish, and then it is John who recognizes who it is and it is Peter who wants to be the first to greet him.

When Peter and the other disciples and their fish get there, they see a fire of burning coals there with fish on it, and some bread...Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast." None of the disciples dared to ask him, "Who are you?" They knew it was the Lord. Jesus came, took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. What's the big, burning question here? What do the 153 fish symbolize?

No, the big question here is: where did the fire and bread come from? The answer is simple and powerful. Jesus had provided it. What the disciples had tried and failed all night to do, Jesus accomplished by simply willing it to happen. The disciples had great need to realize that in the coming weeks and years, when they would be rejected and hated for their message, when they would be tempted to doubt the power of the Word, when they would face danger, poverty and hunger – that no matter what the problem seemed to be, Jesus could and would provide. The book of Acts tells us that Jesus kept this promise. When the disciples were placed on trial for their preaching – Jesus gave them the words to say. When they needed proof that their message came from heaven – Jesus gave them the power to perform miracles as validation. And, when they ventured off into regions unknown to preach the Gospel – Jesus provided open hearts and believers who loved their Lord and provided for his apostles. The Risen Lord showed his disciples with this powerful miracle that they could trust him to provide.

But he does one thing more. He lets them help. The disciples have so little to offer but when they realize who he is he says, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught," as if they did this without his help. They bring the fish so that they can have a meal, the most important meal of their life since the last meal that they had with him, and we will talk about this meal next week, but for now it is enough to say that the waiting is over, the vacation has ended. It is time for the disciples, to leave fishing forever and get back to work, and the same is true for us.

Whether you still work a job or you are retired it is time to get back to work, and the work of the Christian is to proclaim the good news, Christ is Risen! As you prepare yourself to get back to work remember this. There is nothing more difficult for us to do than to trust that Jesus will provide what we need when we need it. Too often we are consumed with worry about our lives, what we will eat or drink; or about our bodies, what we will wear even though Jesus tells us not to worry and reassures us that God knows that you need them. Too often we wait until we have exhausted all of our energy and resources before we finally turn to Jesus and lay our problems into his hands.

When you find yourself worrying, agonizing, stressed out remember that it is as easy for Jesus to satisfy your needs today as it was for his disciples then. How can you be sure? What if you've worked all night or all your life and have an empty net? You can be sure because Jesus has already taken care of your greatest need: he has taken away your sins of doubt and worry and has given you the riches of his grace.

You can be sure because Jesus has already done the one thing we haven't done – he trusted God above all things – and he did it perfectly. Instead of worrying, instead of growing frustrated, instead of exhausting all of your resources before turning to Jesus; ask this question that Paul asked. If God did not spare God's own son, but gave him up for us all – how will God not also, graciously give us all things? (Romans 8:32) It is time for us to get back to the work of loving, forgiving, helping, praying, and preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ, but we can give thanks that we do not need to prepare ourselves for this work, for Paul tells us again in Ephesians "we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do". (Ephesians 2:10)

So we who are God's handiwork can get back to work, doing good works in the name of the one who has risen from the dead and who gives us all we need to do this work. Thanks be to God who calls us to participate in the work of building the Kingdom while at the same time gives us all the help we will ever need.

This is a pretty common problem for adults who become so single-minded on where they are going they get tunnel vision and often do not notice what is around them.

This is also something that happens to us as Christians, and I think it is a very big problem. As Christians we look to Heaven as our goal and we can be so fixated on the goal that we lose sight of all else, but I do not think God put us on this earth just so we can die. It is important for us to get to our goal to reach our destination, but I do think that there are things that we are meant to see and learn along the way, and if we miss them we will get to our destination and realize that we have missed our journey.

A person who was raised Jewish but no longer practices the faith is often referred to as a non-observant Jew. There are also a lot of non-observant Christians and it is not because they are not practicing their faith, it is because they are practicing their faith in such a way that they are not noticing all the things that God wants to show them.

When we come to this table we remember that this is what happened to the disciples who were so obsessed with getting to Jerusalem that they forgot, ignored or didn't notice when Jesus told them what would happen there. As we share this meal let us learn from their mistake and ask Christ to open our eyes to what he is doing around us. Let us find some time to be still and rest in God awhile. Let us find time to be fully observant Christians.
