Children's Message

Rev. Stillwell oring May flowers.

Well now that May is here you know what that means right? They say April showers bring May flowers, and I am here to tell you it is true, because I found the most beautiful flower, and I wanted to share it with you. You cannot believe how big this flower is, and I found it growing along the side of the road. I want to show it to you but I think it would be best if you closed your eyes.

(Rev. Chris goes to the pulpit to get the "flower" which is really an orange traffic cone and shows it to the kids. After they explain to him that this isn't a flower but a construction cone, he continues.)

That's ok because, in addition, to being spring and time for flowers it is also construction season since the weather is nice enough for workers to get out there and fix the roads that need to be repaired. You have probably seen these as well and seen roads under construction, but let me ask you, have you ever considered that you were under construction too? I don't mean that someone has surrounded you with orange cones and they are using equipment to repair you, but I do mean that you are not yet complete. It's true. Think about it. Are you as tall as you will ever be? Is your voice as deep as it will get? Are you done growing and changing? No you are not. This might be obvious to you, but do you know that even when you are fully grown your sprit is still under construction?

No matter how old you get or how big you get there is always something about God you don't know, and every day gives us a lesson to learn. The saddest people are the ones who think they are done growing and have nothing left to learn or improve. We come to church not because we are perfect but because we are not, and we need God to help us. Our faith, like the Western PA highway system is always under construction.

So you are right. This isn't a flower, and the next time you are stopped at a construction site, you might not want to smell one of these, but I hope that you will see it as sign of God's love and care and a reminder that as long as we live we are under construction.

Sermon

"Leopards and Scorpions"

I don't know why it is common to use animals to describe human nature but we do it very often. Phrases like "hungry as a horse", "stubborn as a mule", and "fierce as a lion" permeate our language and conversation. One of the most common comes from the Bible in the book of Jeremiah where the prophet Jeremiah asks referring to those in Israel who had done evil and refused to follow the law, "Can a leopard change its spots?" He asked this to show that some people can never change and now this saying has become so popular that many Christians say it not knowing that it comes from the Bible, and many non-Christians who have never read the Bible know this saying.

Comparing human nature to the animal kingdom is useful, but it always runs the risk that some scientist will come along and disprove a saying. This has happened recently in Borneo where scientists studying the clouded leopard have learned that sometimes, leopards do indeed change their spots. Clouded leopards were first documented in 1821, and it was believed that there was only one species of leopards in that area, but now DNA tests have proved that a second species of leopards with a different marking of spots has developed and the World Wildlife Federation has dubbed this the Borneo clouded leopard. So now that we know that sometimes leopards do change their spots and become a different species, maybe we should turn to a different animal to talk about the ability or inability for a person to change who or what he really is.

Have you heard the old fable of the scorpion and the frog? It goes like this:

The river was wide and swift, and the scorpion stopped to reconsider the situation. He couldn't see any way across. So he ran upriver and then checked downriver, all the while thinking that he might have to turn back. Suddenly, he saw a frog sitting in the rushes by the bank of the stream on the other side of the river. He decided to ask the frog for help getting across the stream. "Hellooo Mr. Frog!" called the scorpion across the water, "Would you be so kind as to give me a ride on your back across the river?"

"Well now, Mr. Scorpion! How do I know that if I try to help you, you won't try to kill me?" asked the frog hesitantly.

"Because," the scorpion replied, "If I try to kill you, then I would die too, for you see I cannot swim!"

Now this seemed to make sense to the frog. But he asked. "What about when I get close to the bank? You could still try to kill me and get back to the shore!"

"This is true," agreed the scorpion, "But then I wouldn't be able to get to the other side of the river!"

"Alright then...how do I know you won't just wait till we get to the other side and THEN kill me?" said the frog.

"Ahh...," crooned the scorpion, "Because you see, once you've taken me to the other side of this river, I will be so grateful for your help, that it would hardly be fair to reward you with death, now would it?!"

So the frog agreed to take the scorpion across the river. Halfway across the river, the frog suddenly felt a sharp sting in his back and, out of the corner of his eye, saw the scorpion remove his stinger from the frog's back. A deadening numbness began to creep into his limbs.

"You fool!" croaked the frog, "Now we shall both die! Why on earth did you do that?" The scorpion shrugged, and said, "What did you expect? I am a scorpion. That is what scorpions do." Then they both sank in to the muddy waters of the swiftly flowing river.

That is an old story, but our passage today from the book of Acts is an even older story about the conversion of Saul. When this occurs and the hateful persecutor of the early church became the church's greatest advocate I expect that many Christians must have wondered if he is a leopard or a scorpion. Saul first comes to the reader's attention when he appeared at the stoning of Stephen. He was a Pharisee from Tarsus who was zealous in his pursuit of the law. He was faithful to Judaism and believed that anyone who blasphemed it would bring the wrath of God upon the nation of Israel, so he did what he saw as his patriotic and religious duty and persecuted the followers of Christ and the movement he referred to as the Way.

When he had seen Stephen's stoning he went out and led a persecution of Christians everywhere which brought him to the road to Damascus where he hoped to find more and bring them back to Jerusalem for punishment. He found a Christian all right. In fact he found Christ, himself, who appeared to him in a flash of light and cried out, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' Paul was blinded but, with the help of his friends, followed Jesus' command to go to Damascus and wait for instructions. There a Christian named Ananias was sent to him. Saul's sight was eventually returned, and then he was baptized.

Afterwards Saul then goes on to preach the word of Christ throughout the lands where he used to persecute it. Saul is a Hebrew name, but as his ministry is predominantly among the gentiles he later goes about referring to himself as Paul, the Roman form of his name, and that is how we have come to know him as the apostle Paul, the writer of much of the New Testament.

So Paul becomes Christian, and not just any Christian, but perhaps the most famous of all. Jesus tells Ananias that Paul "is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel." We know looking back that he did these things, but for Paul's contemporaries it must have been hard to forgive what he did.

This story, then, is among many other things, a story of forgiveness. First, Christ forgave Paul, and then others would have had to as well. When called directly by Christ to help Paul, Ananias understandably was concerned saying to Jesus, "Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; ¹⁴ and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name." Like the frog, Ananias was afraid that Paul was a scorpion, and it took great faith for him to go to see him and lay hands upon him.

Ananias did as Christ commanded because he had faith in him and knew that Christ called his followers to forgive those who had hurt them. We know that Christ calls us to do the same. We pray it every Sunday in the Lord's Prayer, "Forgive our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." One does not come without the other. We know that Christ forgave even those who executed him even as Stephen did, and we know that he forgave even a vile and wicked person like Saul.

That is a pretty high bar for forgiveness, and although we cannot be expected to always reach that mark still we must strive to show love in forgiveness, but we know that we must also be careful for we live in a treacherous world, and there are always people ready to take advantage of our good nature. We all know such people. People who hurt us time and again. People who promise to quit drinking, using drugs, or lying, but they don't. People who make promises and never follow through and when they tell us they mean it this time we want to trust them, to forgive them for what they have done in the past, but we are wary.

So when it comes to conversion, seeing is truly believing. Even after Saul's sight was restored, he was baptized and his sight regained, you can bet that many others were unsure if this leopard had really changed it spots, or, like the scorpion, was simply biding his time to sting. Acts continues, "immediately

he proclaimed Jesus in the synagogues, saying, "He is the Son of God." And all who heard him were amazed and said, "Is not this the man who made havoc in Jerusalem of those who called upon this name? And has he not come here for this purpose, to bring them bound before the chief priests?"

Before Paul could become the apostle to the Gentiles he had to convince many people he was no longer the Saul they knew and feared. I think that Ananias' reaction is instructive for us today. He was chosen to do one of the most significant acts in the history of Christianity and he was chosen by Jesus himself, and still he was skeptical that Paul was a scorpion rather than a leopard who had changed its spots.

Therefore, I think it is perfectly all right for you to be skeptical of scorpions lest you get stung. But as Christians we must also believe that people can be like a leopard and change their spots. If this isn't the case then there isn't much hope for the world or the faith. We must believe that others can change because we know that we ourselves have.

We may never have repented of the types of sins that Paul had to, but that is the point. If Christ's grace is sufficient for even someone like Paul then it is sufficient for each one of us. That doesn't mean that everyone who claims to have changed really has or that we don't sometimes get stung by some of these people, but it does mean that the day that we begin to believe that a person cannot become new, that a leopard cannot change its spots, is the day that we stop believing in the gospel.

We don't have to believe it right away. It took scientists in Borneo a hundred years of studying to determine that the clouded leopard had changed its spots, and when Paul got to Damascus and preached about Jesus there many people didn't know what to make of it, but if someone really has changed over time, their actions will bear it out, and then it will be incumbent upon us to remember to forgive them for their sins just as we would want Christ to forgive ours.

Knowing that he was to follow Christ no matter the consequences, Ananias of Damascus, found Saul of Tarsus in the house as Christ had told him and laid his hands upon him and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit." Upon seeing this feared and hated man for the first time, Ananias called him, "Brother Saul" and those are two of the sweetest words ever recorded in the New Testament.

Not only do those two words remind us of God's tendency to use unlikely people to be instruments of grace, but those sweet words, or any variation of them that you and I are courageous enough to speak in our circles of life, those two sweet words make clear that love is the last thing our enemies might expect to hear from us, but the first thing they need to hear. It was grace, amazing grace, that saved a wretch like Paul and grace that Paul taught in the first chapter of his most famous letter, his letter to the Romans:

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel; it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who has faith, to the Jew first and also to the Greek. ¹⁷For in it the righteousness of God is revealed through faith for faith; as it is written, 'The one who is righteous will live by faith."

It was faith that led to grace which leads to salvation and Paul's doctrine of salvation by faith is the hallmark of our faith so that the promises of God to the Israelites were not contained in Israel or to the Jewish people but have extended to all people across the world.

Paul, of course, is the central figure in the story of Paul's conversion, but I think the person we most need to be like is Ananias. Like him we need to have faith in ourselves and in others. We need to have faith that scorpions can become leopards, that sinners can become saints. If we want the world to change then we need to believe that people can change and believe that if we treat someone like a brother then they may just act like one to us in return.
