Children's Message\*

Have you ever lined up dominoes so they'll knock each other down? What has to happen first so all the dominoes will fall?

Someone has to provide a starting action that sets the other actions in motion. Without that beginning action, the other actions don't happen either. But when someone starts the action, then one action leads to another and another. We call this process a chain reaction. We can push just one domino, which pushes the next one, which pushes the next one, and so on, forming actions linked together, like a chain!

One of our friends, Ty Dunkle, had to use at least 3 simple machines and 4 chain reactions to pop a balloon for a 7<sup>th</sup> grade industrial technology project at Trinity Middle School. Let's watch how Ty did it. <a href="https://youtu.be/A74VarUQl1A">https://youtu.be/A74VarUQl1A</a> How did he get the action going? What were some things that happened in the chain reaction?

We hear in the Bible about another kind of chain reaction that's been going on for a long, long time. In a letter called 1 John, we read this in chapter 4, verse 19: "we love because God first loved us." The author of this letter reminds us that love is a chain reaction! When someone loves and cares for us, we learn how to love, too. Our love grows when we share it with others. They share the love they receive from us, and the love keeps going like a chain reaction.

I wonder who started the first push setting all of this love in motion. 1 John 4:19 gives us a clue, doesn't it? We love because God first loved us! God set the chain reaction of love going by giving us love as a gift. Because God loves us, we become part of the chain reaction, keeping and growing God's love in the world!

We thank Ty Dunkle for sharing his video with Isaac and me so we could share it with you today. Hey, that's another chain reaction!

Dear God, thank you for loving us and starting the chain reaction of love. Show us how to keep your love going until every person knows you love them and care about them. Amen.

## Sermon\* "What About Him?" Rev. Stillwell

When I was in school there seemed to always be one piece of advice that every teacher had. One that they all read from the same book or were taught in the same course and that was to worry about myself. "Don't worry about what Johnny's doing," they say, "just worry about yourself," or, "Don't worry about what Whitney's grade is worry about your own." Sometimes, whenever I did something wrong, I would look for a classmate that I just knew was worse or had done something worse and I would cite their guilt as my defense. Now whether or not they were as bad as I claimed or whether or not they actually did what I told the teacher they did, it did not make me any less guilty for what I had done. "Let 'em worry about Trent, "the teacher would say, "You worry about yourself."

I am not a teacher but I find myself saying that to my children all the time now. My son makes a mess, and I tell him to clean it up and he says, "What about Charlotte? She helped make it too." Like my teachers told me, I say, "Don't worry about her, worry about yourself." It's like that for anything. "Eat your food. But Charlotte's not eating her's. Worry about yourself."

I use an example from children to discuss the apostle Peter because he so often acts like one, and here in the last section of the Gospel of John he does so again. As we heard last week, Peter is redeemed, but he cannot leave well enough alone. He has just had the largest amount of shame anyone has ever had lifted off his shoulder and what does he do? He turns to John, who is also known as the beloved disciple and says, "What about him?" I love it. Peter has had all the guilt of denying Christ taken away. His role as the

foundation of the church is restored, and he is entrusted with the task of caring for Jesus' sheep, and the first thing he does is to look at John who had followed him and says, "What about him?"

I don't know if they were rivals, but Peter was the rock Jesus would build the church on and John was the beloved. Likewise, Peter was always trying to outdo the other disciples and show he was first in faith. He walked on the water before sinking. He rebuked Christ for saying he would be crucified. He swore he would not deny him. He was the rock, but John was the beloved. Peter and John remind me of the sibling rivalry that existed between Mary and Martha, when Martha who had been working to clean the house was angry that Mary was not helping complained to Christ. Remember what he said? "Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, <sup>42</sup> but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." Here Jesus gently chided Martha and reminded her that Mary was right to focus on her relationship to Christ first. Martha should have worried about Christ and not what her sister was doing.

In the same way Peter's pattern is a constant one of sin and redemption followed by sin. He gets it wrong one way. Christ opens his eyes and he sees the error of his ways, then he gets something else wrong. Here Peter had so much sin forgiven, and instead of focusing on his own redemption turns to Christ and says, "What about him?" "What about that other guy?" "What about my brother, what are you going to do with him?"

To this Jesus replies, 'If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you? Follow me!' In other words, "it is not your concern. Focus on yourself." When I was on a swim team they always taught us not to worry about the other swimmers. If you turned your head to look to see what the other swimmers were doing you would lose valuable time. Coach Brubaker told us to keep our focus by looking straight ahead, "Worry about yourself and doing your best," he said.

Now this can be seen as an admonishment from Christ to Peter but it should also be seen as a grace. After all, dealing with your own sin is enough work, why should we want to be judge and juror of someone else's? Of course Christ told us earlier that we are our brother's keeper, so he is not telling us here that we should not care about others. When they fall we should help them up. When we can guide them or encourage them we should. But, when it comes to sin, the focus must be squarely on us. If we focus too much on what those people are doing, or how awful that person is then, not only may we be blind to our own sin, but we commit another sin as well.

Jesus told his disciples "Judge not lest ye be judged", and I am so thankful for that command even as I admit I have as much difficulty as anyone in following it. It is hard to determine someone's guilt and sentencing. I do not wish that power for myself. Have you ever had jury duty? I did once and it was not a high profile case, but it was important. The problem is that both sides were equally convincing in their argument, and it was hard to prove guilt let alone decide on the sentencing. We as a jury were all over the place. I would not want the power of judgement, which is why I am so glad Jesus tells us not to. But we have such a hard time remembering that lesson. We come to church not because we are perfect but because we know we are not. We are people who are no more holy than others, but we realize that we have sinned and therefore need God's grace to be forgiven. Let that always be the mark of distinction for a Christian.

When it comes to sin, therefore, we still need to be reminded to worry about ourselves. Don't worry about others. Let Christ worry about them. Share the gospel with them of course, but leave it up to Christ to judge their faithfulness to it. Christ tells us and Peter to follow him, but if we stop to look at others in order to judge how well they are following Christ we will certainly fall behind and lose our way. Of all the sins that our Lord condemns, this might be the worst sin, not because of its severity, but for its pervasiveness; for it is the sin which we are quickest to do. This sin isn't one of the biggest, railed against

in the Old Testament like eating shellfish, wearing clothes made from two kinds of fabric, it is not outlawed by the Ten Commandments, it doesn't rank alongside murder, or theft but it comes so easy. So does the sin of envy which also comes from worrying about others and not ourselves. Perhaps there is a bit of envy in Peter's words, "What about him?" Peter was the rock upon which the church would be built. He had just been given the responsibility of feeding the sheep, but now he wants to know what John is going to get. It is a strange answer Jesus gives. 'If it is my will that he remain until I come, what is that to you?" We don't know if that was what Peter was thinking, but, if Peter is like others, he might judge his gift from Christ in comparison to what the other disciples get.

After all, we so often spend time worrying about the other guy. What is someone else getting? Even when we are getting what we want or need, we're peering over, checking to see if someone else is getting more. Does he have a better place in line than I do? Is her piece of cake larger than mine? Is Peter's position lessened if another disciple also gets a good job? Is our gift of eternal life lessened if it is also given to people we don't like?

Peter may also be asking from simple curiosity, which is not in itself a sin, but, if it leads to worrying about things that do not concern us, may also lead us astray. Maybe Peter is just curious about what is going to happen to John, and it is simply something he isn't supposed to know. Maybe he was just curious, but Christ's revelation to John is just for him not for Peter.

We have enough to concern ourselves with and if everyone would focus on examining themselves, and removing the log in their own eye before addressing the speck in someone else's eye then the world would be a much better place, and we would be much better people for it. Here is a case where it is okay even encouraged to be selfish or self-centered. Let us not ask ourselves, "what about him, or what about her, or what about them?" God has given each of us a path to walk and a savior to follow and that should be more than enough to concern us.

When we tried to teach our children how to ride a bike without their training wheels it was mostly successful. One of the ways we helped them is to tell them to look at something in the distance, pick something and focus on it. Sometimes it was a post, and sometimes it was a garbage can, and sometimes it was my wife, but the point was to just keep looking at it, because I noticed that every time that they looked away, the bike would start to wobble and then they would fall down.

As my kids started to get better, I began to test them even to the point where I would start yelling, "Look at that bird over there." "Hey, is that a dog, is that the ice cream truck?" And after a while they would learn to keep looking straight ahead. It is an important lesson to understand that, as long as you look straight ahead, you won't fall. For us on our journey as Christians, you might think of it in the same way

as riding a bike. As long as we continue to focus upon Christ, we won't waver, we won't wobble, and we won't fall down.

Certainly that is easier said than done. There are truths to the faith which are, if not obvious, at least pretty easy to understand, but still difficult to do, and in all the things that we do and all the places we go let Christ be our focus. For we know there are a million things that are vying for our attention, calling our hearts to look away, and be distracted. We know that if we look away too long. We will waver, and we will wobble, and we will fall.

The good news is that when that happens, and it has happened, and it will happen again, Christ will be there to pick us up and to continue to lead us, and to call us to follow. So wherever you are this week, as you come to this table if you are wavering, if you are wobbling, if you have fallen down, or if you are back on track, He is here at this table to lead us and calls us to follow.


