# Pastoral Prayer and the Lord's Prayer

Steady and comforting God, with you, every transition and new start is a reminder of your goodness, for you are always creating fresh, amazing things in us and through us. Though we are sad about summer's ending, we are grateful for this school year. Especially this one. After all we've faced, overcome, and released within the past year of COVID-19, we come to this year changed, with new levels of gratitude, hope, and connection carved in us.

God our teacher, who helps us to understand the world around us, thank you for the privilege of education. We have come to recognize the gift of learning and the gift of teaching in ways we may not have appreciated before.

God who came as a child to show us how to be fully human, to show us how to be your children. You have given us minds that grow and develop in unique ways, at unique speeds, and we are astounded by that miracle.

We celebrate the beginning of this school year and ask for your blessings upon us - the children, the educators, and the families who support them.

We pray as and for students of all ages, abilities, and backgrounds. We pray for our hearts and all they hold—excitement and nervousness, disappointment and hope. We give you all our loves and fears. We pray for steady self-esteem and deepening resilience.

We pray for our minds, that they will expand in wonder and celebration, learning not just from the books studied but from the people beside us. Open our minds with a willingness to be changed in unexpected ways, and settle our thoughts in peaceful places.

# Sermon "Jesus the Gardener"

There is so much in life we cannot control, and this so often frustrates us. When I was a kid, we got a Pac-Man video game, and I had such a hard time getting him to go the way I wanted him to go and I got so mad that I couldn't use the controller to control the game that I threw it down. When I became a father I would play Pac Man with my son, and I could now move him with ease but, I saw the frustration build up in my son when he could not, which made him want to quit. He may hold the controller, but he could not control what he holds.

I wish I could say that I am able to control. One of the disappointing truths of life is that when we grow up we cannot do everything or control everything we wanted to when we were young. We can control more, but we also become aware of how many more things that we cannot control in this world, and we are aware of how many things do not come with a controller to help us.

As we have been discussing, for many years I have tried my hand at a garden with mixed success at best. Tomatoes and peppers we can grow, but nothing much else. The thing that grew the best in our garden was the pumpkins which we did not plant. Every fall we dispose of our Halloween pumpkins by smashing them and composting them in our garden, and every year a new, unplanted plant springs up. We've gotten one or two pumpkins before, but last year we had a dozen.

The things that grew the best were the things that we did the least to control. Of course we did plant the seed in a manner of speaking, and we watered them, but everything else, we purchased, planted in a specific area which we thought would be optimal, staked the plants, and protected them. The more we tried to control the more we realized how little control we truly have and if that is true for pumpkin seeds, how much more for the seeds of the gospel?

Whether or not you have ever tried your hand at a garden, we as Christians are all called to sow the seeds of faith which is why Jesus told many parables comparing the word of God to seeds sown in the word. It should be clear from these that we are to go about sowing seeds of faith and letting God water them. One person who did this better than most was the apostle, Paul, who spread those seeds throughout the Middle East causing many churches to grow. Even in unexpected places like Rome, the capitol of the empire that crucified Jesus, or prison, which is where Paul sat as he wrote this letter to one of his churches in Philippi. Paul preached the word everywhere he went and now he notices that some of those seeds have taken root in an unlikely way. He says:

"I want you to know, beloved, that what has happened to me has actually helped to spread the gospel, <sup>13</sup>so that it has become known throughout the whole imperial guard and to everyone else that my imprisonment is for Christ; <sup>14</sup>and most of the brothers and sisters, having been made confident in the Lord by my imprisonment, dare to speak the word with greater boldness and without fear."

Paul's fellow prisoners and even his guards were able to hear the gospel and many became followers of it, but Paul could not control what they did with it. He goes on to write that some proclaim Christ from envy and rivalry, but others from goodwill.

"<sup>16</sup>These proclaim Christ out of love, knowing that I have been put here for the defense of the gospel; <sup>17</sup>the others proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely but intending to increase my suffering in my imprisonment. <sup>18</sup>What does it matter? Just this, that Christ is proclaimed in every way, whether out of false motives or true; and in that I rejoice."

This is not what Paul intended. You can imagine that he did not expect to be in prison. He expected to go to the synagogues in every community and preach the gospel and receive the harvest of righteous souls, but God sent him places he would never have otherwise gone, and spoke to people he would never have otherwise known, and because he has kept his spirit strong and shown love to those who have imprisoned him the seeds of faith were sown, and Paul has reaped an unintended harvest of converts. Although they do not sow the seeds of the gospel in the best way, still it is good that they sow at all, because it is God who is ultimately in control of their growing, and sowing the seeds is the only thing anyone can control. This he tells the Philippians, when he says:

"This is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight <sup>10</sup>to help you to determine what is best, so that on the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, <sup>11</sup>having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God."

He wants their love to overflow because you never know who they will touch or how, and the same is true for us. If it were up to us we would preach in nice places to nice people when we wanted to, but God places us in all manner of places and circumstances, and asks only that we sow the seeds of faith wherever and to whomever, and we do this by speaking of Jesus Christ, sharing his love, and showing how his love has affected us. That is the one thing we can control. So long as we show love and faith, we cannot predict who will be touched or how the seeds of faith will grow, only that God will make them grow. If we imagine Paul's ministry like a garden it would look like this -- tomatoes doing well but squash not so well, zucchini thought dead but coming back, cabbage planted in one area now in another, all while the beans are springing up somewhere else he never imagined. The same is true for us. You never know what you will harvest when you sow seeds of faith, and if you try to control them too much, they won't grow, but if we cast them out and trust God then we will reap a harvest. It will not be the one we always intend or expect, but it will always be wondrous.

This is true because Jesus is the true gardener. He never called himself the gardener but by calling himself the true vine and God the vine dresser he is in effect calling God the gardener and those who have seen Jesus have seen the gardener. He also uses the imagery of seeds in his parables over and over. There are many metaphors Christ could have used that no longer would make sense to us today. There are many metaphors Christ could use that would make sense to us today but which would not make sense to his audience 2000 years ago and probably will not make sense to people 2000 years from now, but gardening, planting, eating these images are with us always, they transcend culture and time. I have never seen a fig tree never held a mustard seed, but I know what Jesus has been trying to teach me, because I came to the garden and I found him waiting for me there.
