

Pastoral Prayer and the Lord's Prayer*

Comforting God, come and speak tenderly to us your people this morning. Come and gather us like lambs and carry us for a while. We need your tender care, the warmth of your presence, the strength and security of your arms.

For we long for the time when paths are made straight, when we know where we are going and we can see the road clearly ahead of us - and that highway is safe and it is wide and it is good.

We long for the time when the valleys are lifted up and the hills are made low, when everyone has a fair chance in life, when the haves climb down and the have nots climb up and all of your children share life with each other.

We long for the time when life isn't so much of a rollercoaster, when the highs aren't quite so high and the lows aren't nearly so low, but all is well with all of us somewhere in a balanced middle ground.

God of peace, we celebrate that even though life is fleeting, even though there is so much over which we have no control, even though we often feel far from where we want to be, we can count on you. What you say happens in its time. You are faithful.

And so, we lift our voices from the highest peaks with no fear, "Praise be to you, our God!"

In this time of new beginnings, give us the courage to take the opportunity to turn toward you and start again. Where we have flourished and grown, we give you great thanks. Where we have erred, we ask for your forgiveness. Show us a better way, we pray. Empower us to be messengers of your good news, a leveling influence along the way, as we seek to join you in smoothing out the rough places we come across.

And now, O God of peace, we speak the concerns of our hearts to you, knowing that you comfort and restore and heal.

We pray for all leaders and people of the world that we may live as one human family in peace. Give us the wisdom to order our common life according to your ways of justice and love.

We pray for your church that we may be steadfast and true in following your Son until all are reconciled with you and each other.

We pray for those who are sick or in need, for those who are far from home and safety. Help us to comfort and care for each other. Give us compassion to love our neighbor. Give us patience to care for those in need.

We pray for your creation. Take away from us all laziness and greed that diminishes life and creativity. Teach us to care for your creation together.

We place in your comforting arms now those we have named aloud and those we hold in our hearts....

God of peace, in these dark days we are looking for signs of your coming. Make us ready to walk in the ways of your son Jesus, our Lord and our Savior, the Prince of Peace, who taught us to pray this way...

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil; for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever. Amen.

Children's Message*

I have a hard time remembering what it felt like to be carried. I just remember feeling sad when I got too big for my parents to carry me anymore. I do remember how I felt inside when I rode on top of my dad's shoulders and held on to his forehead, or when I laid my head in my mom's lap. That's the best feeling, isn't it? I felt so safe and loved and comfortable.

Near the end of our Scripture today, we read these words: "God will gather the lambs in God's arms." These words come from the book of Isaiah. At the beginning of this story, an army attacks the Israelites, defeats them in battle, and takes them away from their home in Jerusalem to live and work in a different place called Babylon. God tells the prophet, Isaiah, to comfort the Israelites because they are homesick and sad. The people are so unhappy that they even wonder whether God still loves them.

Isaiah promises the people that God does love them. In fact, God will take care of them just as a shepherd takes care of a lamb – by feeding it nourishing food and holding it close to keep it safe. Isaiah also comforts the people by reminding them that God's promises last forever—far longer than the times when they are sad, afraid, or worried.

We read this scripture during the season of Advent because Advent is a time of waiting and preparing. Sometimes this season of waiting for Christmas feels joyful and exciting. Other times, especially if we have experienced a big change in our lives, such as a move or the loss of a loved one, this season can bring sadness and loneliness. It is so important to remember that it is okay to feel sad. God honors our sadness and comforts us when we need it. As we wait for Jesus to be born, we also remember that God's promise to love and care for us lasts forever.

Dear God, thank you for taking care of us like shepherds take care of their sheep, like loving parents takes care of their children. When we feel afraid, sad, or worried, help us to feel your love and remember that your promises last forever. Teach us how to comfort each another. Amen.

Sermon*

"In Search of the Perfect Christmas"

Today is the second week of advent and things are starting to get serious. Lights are up, presents are being purchased and delivered. Plans for Christmas Eve have begun and baking ingredients have been procured. We are not there yet, not even halfway through advent but now it is starting to feel real, which means that if you want a perfect Christmas you need to get in gear.

After all, there are almost three weeks until Christmas, but, if you wait until the last minute the perfect gift will be hard to buy, the perfect dinner will be hard to prepare, the perfect moment will pass with all

of the busyness we commit ourselves to at this time of year. We are continuously in search of the perfect Christmas, and I think that is why so much of the decorating and shopping begins in November. Every year I add more shows to watch and more music to listen to, and I sometimes find myself getting stressed out thinking when am I going to find the time to watch the Leprechauns Christmas Gold and listen to the Chieftains Christmas album? Sometimes it seems silly to me that we put such a premium on the decorations and the atmosphere, the things that are background dressing to that which is the star that takes center stage every December.

It does seem silly, but then again, I remember that people have been searching for the perfect Christmas ever since even before there was a Christmas. More than 500 years before Christ's birth the people of Israel longed for a Christmas. They longed for a Christ, a messiah, a savior. And what is it that they hoped he would do?

Listen to the words of the prophet Isaiah "Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. ²Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins."

The first words of Isaiah's proclamation are words of comfort. Literally, they are words of comfort. The Israelites wanted to be forgiven their sins and be reconciled to God. They wanted to be free of their exile and return to the comforts of home that they had been missing for 50 or so years. So again, Isaiah says:

¹⁰See, the Lord GOD comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. ¹¹He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

These words are so comforting that it is no wonder the people took comfort in them, and they waited for the messiah to come, and it took five hundred years, and, when he did, it wasn't what they expected at all. If anything, Jesus made a lot more people uncomfortable than comfortable.

So, two thousand years later, when advent comes around, and we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ, we also yearn for the comfort of God with us. And we hear these verses and think of the angels' announcement to the shepherds upon Christ's birth of peace on earth and goodwill to all. Our desire for comfort is also borne out by watching the same movies and shows and hearing the same songs that we find so comforting, and in the hangings of our lights and decorations, many of which we have used for years and hang because of their familiarity. My daughter recently found a string of plastic Christmas candy decorations that we used in my home when I was her age, and it is definitely not my taste today, but I took it home and hung it up, and when I sent a picture of it to my brother he said, "You found Christmas." So, the perfect Christmas is one that is comforting with everything in its right place, but like the bride and groom longing for the perfect wedding it is an illusion.

That's why I keep a melted, deformed Christmas candle on my desk. It is one of the first Christmas decorations I ever owned and I put it up in every apartment I have ever lived back when it was straight. Then I bought my house and had an attic for the first time which I used to keep my decorations including my candles. The next year when I went to retrieve them, I realized what a mistake I had made as all my candles were melted and ruined. I threw them all away, except for one; a tall twisted candle that says Noel, which I put on my desk every advent.

I like it because it reminds me of two things. First, it reminds me to never put candles in the attic. Second, it reminds me of what Christmas is really about. Christmas doesn't come to us when we're perfect and we have things all figured out. It comes to us when we're bent by the stress of life and the weight of the world. It comes to us when we are broken by loss and grief. It comes to us when our hearts have melted and our wills seem soft.

Nothing in this world is perfect. If it were it would not have been in need of a savior to come and redeem it. Jesus Christ came into a broken and hurting world to show us the way to becoming whole and healed. So many of our Christmas decorations are just perfect; perfect ribbons on perfect trees that stand straight and are perfectly lit, which we know is not reality. I keep this candle because it reminds me that life isn't perfect and that's okay, because Jesus Christ is perfect, we don't have to be.

So, I give to you the advice that I give to couples on their wedding day. Just as there is no perfect wedding, there is no perfect Christmas, not even the first one, especially not the first one. With a pregnant teenager riding across the desert on a donkey giving birth in a stable, with King Herod full of murderous rage such that they had to flee to Egypt. It should be clear to us that God went to uncomfortable lengths to comfort the world, and most people missed it or didn't understand it.

Ever since that first Christmas we have been trying to get it right, but part of the problem is that we want too much comfort. The book of Isaiah begins before the destruction of the temple and proclaims what will happen if the people do not remember and return to God, but chapter 40 represents a break in which Isaiah is no longer threatening that the destruction of the temple and the exile will come, now he is speaking as if they have come and Isaiah's tone changes dramatically. What began as chastising a comfortable people turns into comforting an afflicted people.

In a nutshell this is what prophets do. They comfort the afflicted and afflict the comfortable. They prod us to do what is right and warn us what will happen if we don't, and sit with us when things go wrong, so that when Christmas comes around, we don't just think of what we will get but what we can give. We don't just bemoan the state of the world and pray for God to fix it, we ask Christ into our hearts knowing that he will challenge us to do something about it, and we give thanks that God did not wait for us to be perfect to come to us, but came to be with us because of our faults and sins to redeem this imperfect world.

Maybe you have heard the saying, "Do not let the perfect be the enemy of the good". That is never truer than at Christmas. I guarantee you that your Christmas will not be perfect. You won't get everything you want and you'll likely get a few things you don't want, but with Christ in it, no matter what you get, this Christmas will be good.

On a trip to Amish country I stumbled into a Christmas store that had the most startling surprise; an upside down Christmas tree. It was a strange sight but I immediately thought of the benefits. The tree looks different, it fits better into the corners of our rooms, and with the top of the tree at the bottom there is more room for presents.

I also like it because it is the proper message for Christ. When we think of Christ's birth, we like to sentimentalize it with ribbons and bows. We focus on the image of a cute child who "not a sound does he make", but the truth of the matter is that giving birth to a child turns your life upside down.

There are plenty here in this church who can attest to that. It changes everything, upsets the status quo, makes everything new, and this is what the Christ child did. On top of the disruption in the normal life a child is to any new first time parents, remember what his birth did to the lives of Mary and Joseph. Mary was scared and gave birth in a stable. Joseph was shamed and tried to break off the engagement. Their lives were certainly turned upside down.

Yet this is nothing compared to the ways in which the Christ man turned the world upside down. When others wanted vengeance, he called for reconciliation. When supporters demanded violence, he demanded non-violence. When the Pharisees wanted law, he wanted love, and when the people called judgement, he extended mercy.

Here at this table it is easy to remember the results of his birth. Here we remember the result that came of turning the world upside down. Sometimes in the midst 0f the commercialism and materialism of the season it is nice to be reminded of the radical, world changing meaning of Christmas. If you cannot turn your tree upside down, then make sure to come to this table.
