Sermon	"Gospitality"	Rev. Stillwell
It should not be surprising that so many of Jesus' teachings and parables involve food, because they do give us a great deal to digest. In the story that we have heard from the gospel of Luke, Jesus has been invited to a dinner. At this particular dinner are lawyers and Pharisees, the most powerful people in Israel,		

invited to a dinner. At this particular dinner are lawyers and Pharisees, the most powerful people in Israel, the movers and shakers, the ones who determine who is in and who is out, and Jesus, at least for one evening, is in.

The modern equivalent would be an upscale cocktail party on the upper east side of Manhattan where anyone who is anyone is invited. All the power brokers are there and Jesus, a new curiosity, has also been invited. Jesus is the newest star in town, and he has been invited to this grand soiree where some of the people gathered are there to put him in his place by teaching him who the real important people are, others are there to meet him because they think he is the real thing, while others are just interested in seeing what the excitement is about.

At any rate, Jesus goes to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, and he is greeted by many who watch him closely. Either he will prove himself to be great or condemn himself to be a fake.

As soon as he arrives he is tested when a man who suffers from dropsy (retention of water) asks to be healed. Well, Jesus had already gotten in trouble with the Pharisees for healing on the Sabbath, and he asks those in attendance what they would do. All are silent. Jesus heals the man then points out that if any of their oxen fell down a well they would save it, Sabbath or not. They are silent again. This dinner has already gotten off to a rousing start.

Next the guests all sit down to eat, and now Jesus is watching them. He notices that many place themselves in the seats of honor and he admonishes them saying:

When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host; ⁹and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, "Give this person your place," and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. ¹⁰But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, "Friend, move up higher"; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. ¹¹For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted.

Jesus was invited by his hosts so that he could be judged, but now he was judging his hosts. Jesus saves his best moment for last when he tells the guests the parable of the Great Dinner. A man once gave a great dinner, when it was ready the guest he had invited could not come. So others were invited but there was more room. So the man sent his servants into the street to invite the poor, the crippled, the blind, and the lame.

It is no small coincidence or matter of irony that Jesus goes to a meal, tells a parable of a dinner, and, in the process, gives his guests and us much to chew over and much to digest. It is amazing how much he is able to tell us in only a few words. Of all the morsels there are to learn from what we have heard there are a few that stand out. Perhaps these were the points that inspired the after-dinner conversation, or maybe everyone in the room just stayed quiet at a loss for what to say.

We do not know what his fellow dinner guests learned from his words but here is what we can learn. First, the kingdom will be like a great dinner. We know that the kingdom, like a seed, must be planted and cared for before it will grow, and now we know that once those seeds bear fruit God will invite us to share in the fruits of God's labor.

Therefore, rejoice, for the kingdom will be a place where all are fed, none will ever hunger or go without. It will be like a picnic, family reunion, and Thanksgiving dinner all rolled into one. In other words, the kingdom will be a place where everyone has all that they want and need and the joy will never end.

Second, the kingdom will overturn the values of this world. This world values things that are exclusive, things that are in high demand but in short supply. Jesus should have felt honored to have been invited to a dinner with such high company, but he spoke to them like they were no better than the common person. Right before telling his parable he said to the guests, "all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

So many people spend so much time trying to climb that ladder, but Jesus tells us to look at the bottom of the ladder, those are the ones who will taste God's dinner.

Finally, we learn from this parable that those who were invited will not necessarily taste God's dinner. It is not enough just to be invited. There can be no doubt that many in the audience were insulted and outraged at Jesus' comments. First Jesus says that the lowly will be exalted, and then he insinuates that the keepers of God's law, were invited to feast with God but now will not for they were too busy being righteous to be holy.

It is not enough to merely be invited. In the parable all those who were invited did not come and each had a legitimate excuse. One had bought new land, another new oxen, and another had newly been married. These are all pressing matters that would get anyone excused from any dinner. The point Jesus is making is that those who did come, didn't come because they had nothing else to do. They came because, in comparison to all else that was offered to them, the great dinner was the most appealing.

When we have digested all that Jesus teaches us in this parable we will know that just being invited to eat at God's table will not guarantee that we will. We must accept the invitation, and come to the table of our own free will not out of any sense of obligation. God invites us to take our seat at the Great Dinner, but it is up to us to decide if we will accept the invitation. We must come to the dinner because we want to and not because we feel we have to.

Our regional Minister Thad Alan has a word that he likes to use. He likes to use the word "Gospitality" anytime he describes people being the welcoming people of God because they are following the gospel of Jesus Christ. This is what we're talking about here that Jesus offers to the dinner guests, that the gospel is this thing, this teaching, this lesson, that the kingdom is this place that is open to all in which all who come aren't just guests but they are honored guests, each and every one, in which the host is there not to celebrate himself but to welcome those in.

If we accept the invitation, it then puts upon us an obligation. Those of us who expect to be eating in the kingdom of heaven, then must live the life Jesus calls us to live, but not keeping it to ourselves, because we want it to be exclusive and therefore better, but understanding that it is inclusive and that is what makes it priceless.

This means also not just sharing the gospel in words but inviting those in to know that Gospitality is generosity beyond any meal that we've ever had, because in the end, what we're talking about here is not food. We are talking about love, forgiveness, acceptance and salvation. These are things that are better than anything this world has to offer and are not valued less because they are offered free to all but makes the Gospitality of our Savior that much more amazing. I hope that you will accept the invitation but also that you will pass the invitation on to others to come to taste and to see that God is good and the Gospitality our God offers is wonderful.

Invitation to Communion

I like that we have two kinds of bread on our table each week. The small pieces that are shared in the trays are broken from a large tray of unleavened bread. The larger loaf that the Elders bring forward is, of course, leavened with yeast.

The pieces of unleavened bread remind us of the dangerous, rushed origins of our feast around this Table. When Jesus sat down to the Last Supper with his disciples, they were celebrating the Passover, a particular day within the Festival of Unleavened Bread. Many hundreds of years before that Last Supper, their faith ancestors were enslaved in Egypt. When the night came for the enslaved Israelites to escape, time was short. Their bread had not yet been leavened when the Egyptian people began begging them to leave, fearful of more disastrous plagues. There wasn't time, there wasn't space to carry big fluffy bread. Instead, when they reached the desert wilderness, they baked the dough as it was, into unleavened loaves.

So our unleavened bread reminds us of God's great saving acts, of God's presence always leading us out of slavery and oppression into wholeness and well-being. Our unleavened bread reminds us of Jesus, eating this feast with his disciples the evening before he was crucified. Again, it was a dangerous time, and those that would arrest and crucify him were closing in.

At the same time, our loaf of leavened bread reminds us of the kingdom of God about which Jesus was teaching us. The loaf reminds us how quickly a little bit of leavening - a little bit of love and good news can spread, affecting the whole batch. The loaf also reminds us how the bread, broken and blessed by Jesus, fed all who feasted on it that day. So may this meal nourish us, that we will be yeast in the hands of a mighty God, agents of love and mercy and grace, ready to raise others up, giving them light and love and space to grow in God. And may the love we find in this meal be spread far and wide as we leaven our world.


Closing Hymn
