Please turn in cash or check (payable to FMCC) to the office by July 31.



"You Can Build It. Christ Can Help" Sermon Rev. Stillwell There is power in a name. When Jessi and I chose Owen's name it drove her mom crazy that we wouldn't tell it to her and she kept guessing. When he was born I think she was as excited to learn his name as she was to meet him. Some friends of ours had some names in mind for their child, but waited until they saw their daughter to choose which name felt right. Just as God entrusted Adam with the power to name the animals of creation, so has God given us the power to name our children and their names hold power over us like nothing else can.

Names have power, and this is never more evident than the name above all names, Jesus. Of course we also have names not given to us by our parents by which we are known. Some are loving nicknames some are titles given to us by our profession. This also was the case with Jesus. He was called Christ out of respect and rabbi or teacher because that is what he did. He was also called Lord, by those who took him as their Lord, but, as he states in this passage from Matthew anyone could call him Jesus, not everyone had the right to call him Lord.

He says, "Not everyone who says to me, "Lord, Lord", will enter the kingdom of heaven, but only one who does the will of my Father in heaven. ²²On that day many will say to me, "Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many deeds of power in your name?" ²³Then I will declare to them, "I never knew you; go away from me, you evildoers."

People have long believed that names had magical powers and invoking a powerful name could make things happen. This is why magicians have magic words for their tricks. Likewise, people believed, and

some still do, that asking God to do something would be more likely to work if they invoked God's name, but Jesus points out that God cannot be controlled like that. There is nothing wrong with saying, Lord, but saying it alone isn't enough. You must mean it. You must understand it. You must practice it. Otherwise you are simply saying it in vain.

Invoking Jesus's name seems to make up for any number of sins such as anger, prejudice, greed, and malice, but people like the name of Jesus so much, you could probably sell just about anything with it, and countless people have. Sometimes as Christians we feel so besieged by people who do not share our faith, we will stand with anyone who uses Jesus' name, but we must always remember that those who have the most power to tarnish Jesus' name are not those who attack it, but those who misuse it.

Jesus' disciples called him Lord, which meant that he had a hold on how they lived their life. They also called him teacher which implies that he taught them something, but we cannot say that someone is our teacher if we do not understand what they say, if we do not know what they say, or worse if we do know what they say and don't follow it.

In that case we are deliberately rejecting their teachings, but how many Christians call him their teacher and yet do this very thing to him? How many people claim Christ as their teacher and then completely miss the point of what he said? How many people know what Christ expects of them and yet still cannot bring themselves to do it?

It is just as true now as then, so Jesus told this parable.

²⁴ 'Everyone then who hears these words of mine and acts on them will be like a wise man who built his house on rock. ²⁵The rain fell, the floods came, and the winds blew and beat on that house, but it did not fall, because it had been founded on rock. ²⁶And everyone who hears these words of mine and does not act on them will be like a foolish man who built his house on sand. ²⁷The rain fell, and the floods came, and the winds blew and beat against that house, and it fell—and great was its fall!'

The meaning of the parable is fairly straightforward, but there is one thing that is important to note. The foundation isn't the name of Jesus Christ. The foundation is living in Jesus Christ.

It is like a man who once looked to buy a house. He looked and looked but he could not be satisfied. He was very picky and every house he looked at was wrong in some way. They were structurally sound but they weren't exactly cosmetically as he wanted them to be. One didn't have enough car spaces in the garage. Another didn't have enough lighting in the kitchen. The carpets weren't exactly how he wanted them, so eventually he decided that what he needed was to build a house to his exact specifications and desires. It cost a bit more to do this, but he cut corners on all the things he could not see, and for a while he was happy.

It was only about six months before he realized or learned that while the house looked nice on the outside with its granite countertops and new plush carpet some important invisible details had been skipped. The pipes were lower quality so there were issues with water pressure and leaks. He called in a plumber and discovered that a lot of things were not done up to code. Not only the pipes but all the things a person does not see but matter the most such as beams and wires were faulty. Today the man's house still looks very good, but it is not very good at its foundation and in its bones and the man knows it every time the wind comes and every time the rain pours, but he must live in the house he has built.

We must live in the house of faith that we build. There's no way for us to cut any corners. We know that the winds will come and the rains will come into our life and we will experience the pain of heartbreak and struggle with the challenges of the storms that come into everyone's life. If our faith is built on Jesus's

name and only on Jesus's name, it will not stand. If we build our faith on his life, his example, his actions, and teachings then the house of our faith may yet stand any number of things that try to assail it. Then and only then will we have earned the right to not only invoke Jesus's name but also to call him Lord.

The Home Depot has a motto that goes, "You can build it. We can help", and if you do not skimp on the right materials they can help you to make a beautiful house or whatever it is you want to build. When it comes to building a house of faith no one can help you more than Christ, he was a carpenter after all, and if you build with the right materials, his teachings, his actions, his example, your house of faith will be beautiful inside and out and strong to boot, but if you try to cut corners and build on only the most alluring of Christ's attributes, his name, then your house of faith might look good on the outside, but it will be empty on the inside.

This is a time of massive change for us as human beings. Yes, this is a time of great personal and human change for most of us. Yes, there are times when it seems that the floods are coming and the ground is shifting beneath our feet, and yes, it is a time in our culture and living when we seek and search, when we look for meaning and ask, "What is the foundation? What is solid and life-giving in the midst of it all?" The love of God. The love of God whom we have found in Christ Jesus our Lord.

As the hymn puts it:

How firm a foundation ye saints of the Lord, is laid in your faith in his excellent word. What more can he say than to you he hath said, to you that for refuge to Jesus hath fled. When through the deep waters I call thee to go, the rivers of woe shall not thee overflow. For I will be with thee, thy troubles to bless and sanctify to thee thy deepest distress. The soul that to Jesus hath fled for repose, I will not, I will not desert to its foes. That word though all hell shall endeavor to shake, I'll never, no never, forsake.


