Children's Message\*

On a hot day, an electric fan can really help keep us cool. How does it do that? It blows air. Let's turn on this fan. Do you see any air coming out of this fan? So, if we can't see the air, how do we know the fan is working?

We can't see the air coming out, but we can see the air blowing the red streamers I've tied on the fan. That's one way we know the fan is working.

Another way we know the fan is working is that we can feel the air from the fan blowing against our skin. We can't see the air but we can feel it.

We can also tell the fan is working because we can hear the sound of the air and the rattling of the streamers as they blow. We can't see the air, but we can hear it.

Today we are celebrating a very special day called Pentecost. On that day, Jesus' followers were all gathered in one place, and God sent the Holy Spirit so they could teach others about Jesus. But they couldn't see the Holy Spirit. So I wonder how they knew the Holy Spirit was there?

Just like we can see these red ribbons on our fan, moving because of the air, Jesus' followers knew the Holy Spirit was there with them because they saw what looked like flames of fire that came and rested on each of their heads.

Just like we can hear the air coming out of the fan, they could hear something that sounded like a mighty rushing wind.

Just like we can feel the air moving against our skin, they could feel the power of the Holy Spirit. All of a sudden they were able to speak in languages they didn't even know so they could tell everyone about Jesus – even people who spoke different languages from them.

I wonder if we can still see and hear and feel the Holy Spirit today. When we see someone helping another person, maybe even someone very different from them, we know the Holy Spirit is there. We can see the Holy Spirit. When we hear someone comforting or encouraging another person who is hurting or sad, we know the Holy Spirit is there. We can hear the Holy Spirit. When we get a feeling that we should go talk to someone or include someone who is left out, we know the Holy Spirit is working in us, guiding us in how to love others and love God. We can feel the Holy Spirit.

Dear God, thank you for sending your Holy Spirit to be our teacher and guide. Help us to see, hear and feel your Spirit more clearly every day so that we might love more like you. Amen.

## Sermon\*

# The Spirit of Love and Truth

Words are special things. We don't think of them too often like this, but stop for a moment and think of how marvelous the gift of speech is. Animals communicate with a basic type of speech, but they can only communicate the most basic of things, when they want to mate or when there is danger. Cavemen communicated with a series of grunts and, as a result, they were not much better at communicating than animals. So words are special.

The words of the Bible existed for centuries before they were written down in the form of stories that were told again and again and passed down from generation to generation. Wisdom, learning, and tradition, therefore, were not possible until words were created. With all that said, however, some words are more special than others. Love, hope, God, these words mean so much more than ordinary words, but even ordinary words can sometimes take on new meaning or be made special by who says them. Words spoken by your boss can have more meaning than words spoken by your neighbor. Words spoken by your children, are infinitely more special to you than words spoken by a stranger.

Words may be most special, however, when they come from mothers. There is something about mothers which transform words. "It's all right" never had the healing, soothing effect for me when it came from my father as it did from my mother.

Undoubtedly mothers have been blessed with a special language that soothes and calms like no other, but if you are not a mother you also can speak a language that is special. This is possible because God has made it possible for the Holy Spirit to transform our words and give them more meaning than we could ever intend.

This is vital because words, today, in our culture, have lost their value. There are radio stations dedicated to nothing but talk, political talk, sports talk, just talk. Occasionally there is an important story that demands a lot of attention, but mostly the radio personalities are just filling time. The same is true with the television news channels. Their need to find news to cover 24/7 leads to some petty unnewsworthy topics getting lots of words.

Of course cell phones make it easier to talk, and text messaging makes it so that words are barely necessary. Have you ever been talking to someone who was texting someone else? When words can be reduced to a series of abbreviations such LOL and BRB, words have indeed become cheap. So cheap, in fact, that we often don't hear.

The Bible tells the story of the tower of Babel in which the inability to communicate or be heard caused confusion and enmity throughout the world that lasts to this day. The NRSV says that God confuses their language so that "they will not understand" but another translation has it "so that they would not listen to each other. Would not hear." Often we misunderstand one another not because our words are different but because the overuse of words causes us to not listen and consequently to not hear.

This is the problem and today we celebrate the solution, for the reversal of the Tower of Babel is found in the book of Acts on the day of Pentecost after Jesus ascended into heaven. Having told his disciples to wait for the Holy Spirit in the city of Jerusalem, Peter and the apostles receive the Spirit and it causes the people there to proclaim, "in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power."

That day people had come from all over the empire and they spoke many languages. You can imagine it was a confusing and chaotic scene, and so another language would seem to have made things worse, but the language of the Spirit spoken by the apostle, Peter, brought them all together. The Holy Spirit in Acts provides a new language that everyone can understand, but I don't think of that as new words, but merely a way of speaking in which communication cuts through the language barrier.

The Hebrew word, "Yada" is a word that means boring or empty talk. Perhaps you've heard the expressions. "Yada Yada". A person uses it when telling a story but doesn't want to list every detail. "When I wake up I take a shower, eat breakfast, brush my teeth, yada yada, and then I am on my way," would be an examples of how this idiom is used. So many conversations are like that. Speech about God is like that as well. Our words our clumsy, so much sound and fury signifying nothing more than yada yada unless the Holy Spirit is present.

When people speak of things they have in common they understand each other and say things like, "Now you're talking my language," even if we've been speaking the same language the whole time. Most commonly, however, the language that everyone understands is rarely expressed in words, but in smiles, hugs, and handshakes. When you want to comfort a friend who has lost a loved one a comforting spirit is manifested better in a comforting presence and acts of generosity than in even the most eloquent of words. Sometimes the best word of encouragement is a smile, the best word of comfort is a pat on the shoulder, the best word of love is an embrace, the best word of grace is disagreeing with someone and yet still praying with them.

On the day of Pentecost when thousands gathered from many countries speaking many languages they understood one another because the apostles spoke God's language, a language that wasn't made up of

words only a select few could understand, but words everyone could understand no matter their language because they told the story of God's love for them all poured out in Christ Jesus.

If we, too, want to speak a holy language then our language has to be one of love. One cannot claim to speak in the spirit if they do not speak in love, but that is only one side of this holy language. To speak in the Spirit one must also speak in the truth. The two things I look for in a friend is love and honesty. Nothing can undermine your message more than using words that are untruthful, because then how can anyone believe you?

If we are dishonest in our everyday life, or if we believe and follow people who are dishonest, why would anyone believe us? We teach this truth to our children when we tell them of the boy who cried wolf and in that story the boy was being intentionally dishonest, but what if he really thought there was a wolf but was simply wrong? Every time he saw a dog he mistook for a wolf and cried out in genuine fear rather than malice?

In this example the boy is much more sympathetic but the effect is the same. Whether he is lying or just wrong, when the wolf is really there no one will believe him.

This is important because if we succumb to believing things that are not true, like gossip, or disinformation, or conspiracy theories we will look foolish. And when we speak up about Jesus Christ and how he could make a difference in someone's life, they will rightfully ask themselves, "Why should I believe you?"

So let us be careful. Careful about what we believe, what we say, how we say it. Whatever your words, in whatever language they are spoken, if they are spoken with the love of Christ in mind, and if they are spoken by someone whom others have reason to believe is truthful and trustworthy then the Spirit will find a way to make those words heard and understood. May the language you speak whatever the accent, whatever the grammar, whatever the vocabulary, be filled with love for Christ and Christ's truth you will surely be speaking a holy language.

### **Invitation to Communion\***

Few things can divide people more than language and we do spend a lot of time arguing over words. Whether we argue over the meaning of words, or the use of words, whether or not it is ok to use one word or another, the arguments are even worse when discussing the word of God.

There are two things we would do well to remember. The first is that while the Bible contains the word of God, the Bible itself tells us in the gospel of John that the word of God is Jesus Christ, himself, the Word

made flesh. That is the wonderful word of life. And Jesus saved us not through any word he spoke, but through the love that he showed us by laying his life down for us while we were still sinners and by the truth of who he was, God in the flesh. In short, Jesus was the word of God and that was a word of love and truth.

So as disciples we confess that all followers of the Word are welcome at this table and that leads us to the second thing we must remember. Whatever language you speak, whatever Bible translation you read, whatever your interpretations you have of the words in that Bible, the word of God calls us to love one another as he loved us, to love our enemies as our neighbor and our neighbors as ourselves.

No other word in any language has ever been so wonderful to hear and so hard to follow, so, as we come to this table, let us give thanks for the word that is above all words, that unites us in a language of love that cuts through every worldly barrier, let us confess the ways in which we have not fully spoken this word to others, and let us call upon the spirit to help us so that as we leave this table the words we speak will be the words of love which are the Word of God.

The General Board, at its meeting on May 12, 2021, approved and is recommending to the congregation a change to "Article IV, Section E. Election of Honorary Officers," of the Constitution.

Proposed revision to constitution:

Current Article IV, Section E Election of Honorary Officers

The names of prospective honorary officers will be submitted to the elders. The elders will make a recommendation to the general board. The general board will then make a recommendation to the congregation for approval.

## Suggested revision:

Fairhill Manor Christian Church has four categories of honorary offices. They are Elder Emeritus, Deacon Emeritus, Trustee Emeritus and Disciple Emeritus. For each office, it is suggested but not required, the nominee shall have served a minimum two full terms in the office for which they are nominated and have fulfilled the duties of that office above and beyond expectations. For elders a minimum of two terms or six years; deacon, a minimum of two terms or six years; trustee a minimum of two terms or ten years; disciple a total of ten years of service is required but that service can be in any combination of offices and/or positions. Any member of the congregation can nominate a person for any honorary office.

The following steps are required for someone to become an honorary officer:

- 1. A nomination will be made in writing, recommending an individual for a specific honorary office.
- 2. The nomination shall include the name of the nominee and the nominator, terms/years of service and the reasons why the nominator believes the nominee should receive this honorary status.
- 3. The nomination will then be submitted to the elders.
- 4. If additional information is needed, the elders may request a meeting with the nominator to discuss the nomination.
- 5. The elders will then make a recommendation to the general board.
- 6. The general board will then make a recommendation to the congregation.
- 7. The nominee shall be notified of their honorary selection.
- 8. The congregation will then make the final decision on the nomination.
- 9. Upon approval, the nominee shall be honored, at a Sunday service, where formal recognition shall include the presentation of a certificate naming the nominee to their particular office as well as a lapel pin.
