

We are glad to belong to Jesus, our Good Shepherd. We are grateful that he continually intercedes for us, his sheep. Help our trust in Jesus to grow as we know him more deeply and follow the sound of his voice more closely.

Children's Message* Pastor Gena

You might want to have a candle, a way to light the candle, and something with which to snuff the candle for today's story. Make sure you have an adult right with you the whole time. That's important so you can stay safe.

Let's hear part of our Children Worship & Wonder story for today, "Ascension." That's a big word. Listen for what it might mean as I tell today's story. Ascension.

Today is the seventh and last Sunday of the season of Easter, when we celebrate the mystery that Jesus died and that God made him alive again.

Today is also Ascension Sunday, when we celebrate another mystery – the mystery that Jesus went away so that he could be with us always – in every place and every time.

The Christ candle helps us remember the mystery of Easter. When there is no light, we say "Christ has died" and we cup our hands around the candle and move them down the candle. But Jesus is alive! God raised Jesus from the dead. So, we move our hands up the candle, light the candle, and say, "Christ is risen!"

Jesus was alive again. One day he said to his friends, "Stay in Jerusalem. God will send you another special gift, the gift of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit will give you power, power to tell everyone about me and about the kingdom of God. I am going away. You won't see me anymore. But I will be with you always. And I will come again."

And then Jesus disappeared... into a cloud. To remember this part of the story, we put our snuffer over the flame to put it out, catching the smoke, and slowly lift the snuffer up into the air, releasing a cloud of smoke.

Hmm. This is the mystery of Ascension. Jesus went away, but somehow, he is still with us.

We slowly lower the snuffer and we look at the Christ candle and we say, "Christ will come again."

Let's do that one more time. We point to the wick which is not lit and we say "Christ has died," moving our cupped hands down the candle. But we remember God raised Jesus from the dead, so we move our hands up the candle, light it, and say, "Christ is risen!" Then we remember that Jesus disappeared into a cloud, and we snuff the candle and release a cloud of smoke up into the air. We remember the good news that "Christ will come again" as we slowly bring the snuffer back down.

This is the mystery of Easter. Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Dear God,
Thank you for Jesus.
Thank you for his Ascension,
For his leaving us so that he could be with us always,
In every place and every time.
Help us to feel him near.
Amen.

Sermon*

"Jesus' Straight-up Answer"

Her name was Dorothy. A lovely lady retired after nearly 20 years as a bank president's personal secretary. She was not a particularly memorable woman for most, but my visit with her that early September day of 1975 was the most meaningful class I've ever taken on prayer in my life. Seated at her kitchen table with coffee and a sweet roll, Dorothy convened the class. After some conversation of her adjustments to her husband's death, I offered to pray with her...then class began in earnest...she said, "I'll appreciate your prayer very much, but after you're finished, I want to pray for you." That stopped me short. I'm the minister, I pray for the sick, the grieving, the ones in need. That's my job, my calling...you pray for me?

Gratefully, I didn't express my hesitations out loud, but I think she still recognized my reluctance and continued with an explanation. She said that her Mother had told her early in her life that prayer was not a mere recitation of requests or pleas, but the true conversation of love. And it was a gift offered by God to be shared with people who cared about each other and God. So, she told me, it was important to her that

she also participate in the conversation. I thought about explaining that I was not really in need of any prayer at that time...but thankfully, I remained quiet and acquiesced to her prayer...and it was a true

blessing. To be with someone whose focus of prayer was solely upon you, to hear your name and the expressions of another's hopes for you...that is moving and powerful. I had mentally believed that praying for someone else was moving and meaningful. I hoped so with every prayer I offered for others...but I didn't really recognize the power of prayer until that day in Professor Dorothy's kitchen.

That's where Jesus' disciples found themselves in this passage from John. Not out on a mountain somewhere with Jesus praying at a distance, beyond where they could hear. No, John says this was in the familiar setting where Jesus broke the bread and shared the cup, where he had washed their feet and talked of the importance of them caring for one another. At the table where he had given that extended sermon on loving one another, of the close relationship between God and Jesus, of his preparations for them after he died, of how they were linked to him like the branches of a grapevine, of the Spirit coming to be with them...here in that very close and intimate occasion Jesus ends this scene with a prayer. Note in John, there is no Lord's prayer, so in effect this is the Jesus Prayer in John's Gospel. And he prays for...them...in their presence. Dorothy may have very well been channeling Jesus in her kitchen prayer with me.

Think of that, what would that mean for you...not the general prayer that we just recited, as we do each Sunday...but Jesus praying in your presence a prayer for you. How do you think that would impact your life and the way you consider the challenges and joys you encounter? It is astonishing to me to think of Jesus praying for me...for you...for us.

He prayed that God would protect you...and to confirm that we are, in Christ, truly joined as one. And buried within this lengthy prayer is a remarkable revelation...the answer to a question that we ask from the depths of our hearts and are usually left with partial answers only...what is eternal life? We may recite the answers of greeting cards or poets, of prophets or our own appetites and desires...you know heaven is golden streets, flowing streams, maybe puffy clouds or endless golf courses with sunny skies, perhaps like a daily spa or sun-drenched beaches... But lying in the beginning of today's text, like the golden Easter egg waiting to be found in the grass, Jesus gives the straight-forward response to this perennial question.

And this is eternal life...no skirting the subject, no passing it off as a truth that must await death...no, Jesus says that eternal life is to know God and to know Jesus Christ. That's eternal life. It's that simple? As John reminded us last Sunday, it is summed up in being in a relationship with the Trinity—a relationship of love that starts even now...not awaiting death.

Eternal life is ours through that relationship in Christ...we are living here and now. We taste it at the Table, we sense it in the love and concern of others...eternal life began when you accepted Christ and became one with God. It's not in a creed or belief system, it's not going through the motions...it's knowing God. That's Jesus' prayer for you and me.

I suppose the closet description we have for this understanding of eternal life are those occasions when we are caught up in the moment or experience. When you are so intensely experiencing joy that you are oblivious to anything else...whether getting picked for the starting team, or winning a prize, or on your wedding day...or the birth of your child, or grandchild...it is the experience of being so special in the moment that nothing else matters. That's how Jesus describes our relationship with God...that's eternal life. And, yes, it's ours now! Think of that!

Call to Offering*

Good Morning:

Over the past 2 months we have experienced a pandemic of great proportions, something of which none of us has ever experienced. We have seen our church services, the important activities of our ministries and fellowship activities significantly impacted and we all miss those activities and the great experiences we have all come to love over the years. The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted the ability to receive the normal level of donations that are necessary to operate our church and the important outreach programs that depend on our contributions. However, the expense requirements for our church have not changed. As a result, the Stewardship/Finance Ministry during the month of April decided inquire about the possibility of applying for a Payroll Protection Program Loan which is better known as a PPP Loan. The program is part of a suite of tools that are designed to help small businesses including non-profit organizations to financially navigate through the COVID-19 Pandemic. It falls under Coronavirus, Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act better known as the (CARES) Act that was signed into law back on March 27th.

The application for the loan was prepared by Brian Shaw and he should be thanked for his efforts in preparing the application and providing the necessary information to obtain the loan. The loan process is supported by the Small Business Administration and was applied through Washington Financial which is the bank that holds our bank accounts to operate the church. The loan was approved on Thursday, May 14th in the amount of \$24,510 with the loan proceeds being deposited into the General Fund.

The loan does have requirements in that it can only be used for certain expenses. These include payroll costs which include salaries, wages, and commissions which are below \$100,000 per employee; leave benefits; health care benefits; retirement benefits; and state and local payroll taxes. It can also be used to pay for interest on debt obligations that occurred before February 15, 2020 which falls under the roof loan, we have with the Disciples Church Extension Fund. The loan proceeds can also be used for utilities as well; but at least 75% of the proceeds must be used for payroll and the proceeds must be used over an 8-week period after the loan is approved. The use of the funds must be tracked to make sure they are applied to qualifying expenses. If all the funds are used under the required guidelines the loan is 100% forgivable. It is the priority of the Stewardship/Finance Ministry to ensure that those requirements are met and the all the funds are allocated and accounted for properly. The key element of this loan is that it is designed to help keep our minister, our associate pastor and our support staff employed all of which are vital to our congregation.

The approval of this loan is great news for Fairhill Manor Christian Church, its ministries and the outreach group's it supports. Let me make it clear that the receipt of the proceeds of this loan does not discount the importance of the generous giving we receive from our congregation, nor does it relieve us of the commitment we made last fall during the Stewardship Campaign. There are other important expenditures that will go on despite the pandemic. These expenditures include the cost to maintain the church property and office management expenditures, and our budgeted outreach expenditures. This important group of expenses comprise 20% of our total budget. We also have anticipated expenditures that will be incurred by our Pastoral Search Committee for the search for a new pastor which could be more than the \$5,000 we have in the budget. The other uncertainty of course is the possible return of the virus in the fall which could be worse than the first wave we have already experienced. The return of the virus could further stress our funds availability. Therefore, the loan is also an insurance policy should a return of the virus occur.

With that in mind we ask that you maintain your level of commitment as much as you can and to utilize the Givelify App which is the most safe and efficient way you can provide your gifts to Fairhill Manor Christian Church. May God bless each and every one of you as we continue through this journey together.




