

Saying Good-Bye and Thank You to Pastor Darwin


Please take time over the next few weeks to thank Pastor Darwin for his love and care for our congregation over the 16 months of his Interim.

Children's Message and Commissioning Hygiene Kits*

Have you ever noticed how many churches there are? There are three other churches just within a block or two of us! Churches are everywhere. Some churches have lots of people and a big building; some are small; some have no building at all. Some church buildings ring church bells; some have nice stainedglass windows like we do. Some worship early in the morning; some worship in the evening. Some churches have communion once a month, some once every three months, and some every week like we do. In some churches, people kneel. In some churches, people stand and dance. There are many different churches just like there are many different people.

And while each church does church differently, today, churches in our neighborhood, across our city, and around the world, are all doing one thing in particular the same. Today is World Communion Sunday. This means that churches around the world are all participating in communion today! Each time we take the bread and the cup, we remember how much God loves us. Nothing can separate us from God's love! And today, on World Communion Sunday, we are also celebrating that though each church does things differently, each of us and all of us need God and God's love. By having communion together around the world, we celebrate our common need for God and we celebrate God's love for all of us. Today we celebrate that we are different and yet we are one big family in God.

Sometimes that one big family of God celebrates together, like on World Communion Sunday. Sometimes that one big family of God works together to help those who need help.

Almost 75 years ago, after World War II, seventeen denominations (big groups of churches) came together "to do in partnership what none of us could hope to do as well alone." The mission: feed the hungry, clothe the naked, heal the sick, comfort the aged, shelter the homeless. They called this partnership Church World Service. More and more churches joined Church World Service. Now there are 37 different big groups of churches in CWS. Our Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) is one of them. We are all very different, but we work together around the world sharing God's love.

Our congregation has decided to show our love and respond by donating money to make hygiene kits for Church World Service to give to people who need them. People in our congregation gave money to purchase supplies for the kits. Linda Reese donated her time and energy to purchase needed supplies and assemble the kits. Today we bless this good work and dedicate these kits to aid the continued work and ministry of Church World Service.

Let us pray:

God of great love who taught us all compassion, we continue to share the blessings that we have received from you with our neighbors.

Who are our neighbors? Those forced from their homes due to natural disasters and wars who need us to recognize them as God's children in need.

What do they need? They often need the basic things that we take for granted: items to maintain their health or items that will allow them to clean their homes.

How will this help? The kits we bless today represent our compassion for our brothers and sisters. With our kits we send our love and our witness to the presence of God's love in our world.

We bear witness. That the hands that made these kits, and the hearts that donated time, talent and treasure desire to be a blessing of God's love in this world.

We send our love. Acknowledging that we first received this love from God and pray that in so sending it God's love will spread far and wide.

This is our prayer. Bless the givers, the kits we made, the work of Church World Service in delivering the kits and the lives of all who receive our kits, with God's great love.

Sermon*

"What Do You Treasure?"

I don't know about you, but I've caught myself on just a few occasions in these months of the pandemic commenting that at least this is one blessing or one benefit of 2020...that's a new experience for me, I think I've always been able to discover blessings in every day. And one of those rather rare blessings of this year strikes me as unusual during a health crisis. The confinement, the denial of our normal lifestyle and usual movements have given us all the opportunity to consider what are the real blessings, the true treasures of our lives.

Such simple things as phone calls from a friend...a bag lunch out of the tailgate of our cars in the parking lot...the routine of a football game...once we have been denied the normalcies and routines of life, we

more easily discover their worth...and amid all of these changes, I've learned that many of the things I formerly treasured aren't nearly as important as I once thought. The apostle Paul writes in this email for today of the importance of discerning what is really and truly important. As he sat in that prison cell in Rome, he talks about what he treasures most as a way of encouraging the members of that church in Philippi to take stock of their own lives and what they value.

Interestingly he starts with a sarcastic remark about a group with whom he previously associated...the strict religious zealots of the law. Those who criticized anyone who didn't keep the letter of the law...and value it above all things, or who didn't practice their faith exactly as they should. He calls them dogs...dogs? What these critics treasured most was their purity...circumcision...marked as superior to those Gentiles who weren't as pure. It's hard for us to put ourselves into that period of time when Christians were seen as a fringe group within Judaism, but that was the situation for this small church, evidently being told by others that they were not good enough...uncircumcised. They were being criticized as not being sufficiently faithful, or insufficiently pious, or just not quite good enough.

You may know of some faithful people who look down upon or criticize others believing they are more worthy or more correct in their way of practicing the Christian faith. Unfortunately, down through history the church has tended to be very exclusive and judgmental...valuing rules and rituals above people. So, in response to these followers of the law who sought to judge others, Paul says...hey, you think you're so good, look at me. If anyone has a reason to feel superior, it's me...best among the Pharisees ... circumcised on the right day...Israelite by birth...tribe of Benjamin...Hebrew parents, no half-blood...a zealot in his practice of faith...persecuted those who weren't quite good enough...blameless before the law. Paul in other words was among the cream of the faithful crop. He had his priorities right and treasured the right things...right?

Well, maybe not. He, in his time of reflection...in that cell, confined to a quarantine, weighed what he treasured most and decided that old life of exclusivity, judging others of being less than worthy was not living what he treasured most of all. He said that now what he treasured most was knowing Christ...of gaining Christ...of not seeking a righteousness that he could wear as a badge of honor, but one that is his through his faith in Christ. A faith that doesn't seek accolades for being purer than others but seeking always of sharing in the sufferings of Christ...of doing for others, of loving those less fortunate. Knowing Christ is to live the life of Christ...of not living to exclude, but to welcome, to seek to love like Christ loves us all.

In this time of partisan divisions, of fear of being with others, and of separating ourselves, I pray this Spirit of Paul shared with those Christians at Philippi will be with all of you here at FMCC...may you treasure the diversity among you, respecting one another knowing that our righteousness is not our own, not granted by our birthright, or by our tenure in the church, but let us treasure most that our righteousness comes through our faith in Jesus Christ.

Paul envisioned a church that would be open to all, Jews and Greeks, slaves and free people, male and female alike...the church for Paul was a place where all are one in Christ Jesus. In a world where people are always seeking to judge and exclude, to divide and segregate...may you treasure most that we all have but one real treasure...knowing and being known by Christ.

We have all received rewards or consolations at some point in our lives. Our collections of trophies, certificates, accomplishments and experiences have accumulated in boxes in the basement, scrap books in the attic, frames on the wall or professional fonts within our resumes. Our accolades have made us

respected by our colleagues, have given us opportunities by our superiors, or have become legendary among our friends. We all can identify with this in one way or another, but what value does this all have?

I am not trying to discredit anything that you have done, for I look back fondly at my memories and victories. We have accumulated prestige in our field of work or maybe even some type of piety within the family of our church. However, none of this should be our main identity. Look at what Paul writes to the Philippians, "If anyone else thinks he has reason for confidence in the flesh, I have more." As Jedi Master Qui-Gon Jinn so eloquently stated, "There's always a bigger fish." Paul goes on to write, "But whatever gain I had, I counted as loss for the sake of Christ. Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord."

Our identities are not our accolades, but Christ. Therefore, let us use our accolades, our talents, our rewards of wealth and experience to further Christ's kingdom on Earth, and become ambassadors of his church. As we start to write a new chapter in the history of Fairhill Manor let us recommit ourselves to Christ Jesus our Lord. Let us offer our wealth of material and experience to God for His glory.

Invitation to Communion*

Fred Craddock was in the estimation of most among the greatest preachers of the 20th century...a Disciple pastor and professor. He not only taught at Phillips Theological Seminary in Enid, OK, but had been educated there as a graduate student. During his years in seminary he served a small country church, miles outside of Enid. One Sunday morning during a horrific thunderstorm, the church canceled services, but forgot that the young Mr. Craddock didn't have a phone. They just assumed he would know not to come. But drive he did, through the pounding rain on dirt roads that were washing out. A few of the men decided that maybe that preacher would try and come in that bad weather, so they made their way to the church...not sure what to do, one of the men reached into his glove compartment and took out a deck of cards.

When Fred Craddock arrived at the church, he went in to find the men seated around the communion table dealing cards. Fred hurried to the front and asked, "What do you think you're doing? " One of the men responded, "Playing poker and waiting for you." "But on this table?" Fred asked. The men looked at him and said, "A table's a table a table." "No" responded Fred, "This isn't just a table."

Oh, this is a table, but when we gather as God's people around it to receive the bread and cup blessed by God...it is much greater than itself. Not just wood, but sanctified for a purpose—set aside to provide a blessing for God's beloved. And here we find more than just ourselves, we are joined by the masses of God's people around the world...and as well, by the crowd of witnesses and saints of this church who have gathered here before us. Come...for this is more than just a table!

Prayer for the Bread & Cup*

Forgiving God, we know that we do not come to this table because we deserve your love, but because we need your love. We do not come to be rewarded for our virtue, but to find forgiveness in your grace. Here we experience the presence of the one who died that we might live. Keep our hearts and minds open to the mystery we experience here. Let us press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus. Amen.
