

Sermon

"God's Way or the Long Way"

Whenever we embark on a long trip there are things that we can do to make it go faster. We can listen to the radio, a podcast, or a long audio book. We can play games with the other riders. We can of course drive faster or find a shortcut. One thing that will not shorten your trip even one little bit is complaining. Whether complaining about how long the trip is, how bored or hungry you are, or that your brother is sitting on your side, your trip will not take any less time, and yet we are all tempted to complain when things begin to get difficult.

There comes a point in every trip that my kids begin to complain how long it takes to get there and I threaten to slow down every time they do. It is a helpful tactic. Certainly I have added a few minutes maybe even a half an hour to a trip or two that way, but at least I am not like the Israelites were in the desert long ago.

The Israelites have been complaining ever since their trip started. They had escaped from four hundred plus years of slavery in Egypt thanks to God through Moses, but, just as they are about to escape they see the Egyptian chariots bearing down on them, and they announced to Moses who had risked everything to free them from the yoke of slavery, "Was it because there were no graves in Egypt that you have taken us

away to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us, bringing us out of Egypt? ¹²Is this not the very thing we told you in Egypt, "Let us alone and let us serve the Egyptians"? For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness." (Ex 14:11)

The Israelites, descendants of father Abraham, witnesses of God's amazing power, and freed from their captivity as slaves in another land on the precipice of a new life, cried out in despair and anger towards Moses who they saw as having gotten them into this mess in the first place. After all this, they could not see the power and faith of God.

After they escaped that predicament still they complained. "What will we eat?" they ask. They get hungry and exclaim, "If only we had died by the hand of the Lord in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." (Ex 16:3) God causes Manna to fall from the heavens to eat.

They continue to complain and it culminates in the ultimate transgression when they worship a golden calf while Moses speaks with God on the mountain. Moses spares their life by interceding on their behalf, and still they do not seem to appreciate it much. God has provided bread for them. God provides laws and commandments and a way to worship. After all of that Moses' brother, Aaron, and sister Miriam become jealous because God spoke only to Moses.

The complaining stops for a while just long enough for Moses to take a census of the people thus giving the book of Numbers its name until, predictably they tire of manna every day and again they cry out this time saying, "If only we had meat to eat! ⁵Remember all the free fish we ate in Egypt and the cucumbers, watermelons, leeks, onions, and garlic we had? ⁶But now we've lost our appetite! Everywhere we look there's nothing but manna!" (Nu 11:4-6) Once again God hears the cry of the people, and God provides meat for them to eat by sending quail.

God has thus far provided the Israelites with all they need, and now God is providing the last piece of the puzzle. God has led them to the Promised Land about 38 years before they actually enter because, when the Israelites get to Canaan, the land of Abraham, they send spies to scout out the land and the inhabitants therein. While the scouts, Joshua and Caleb, trust that God will provide a victory the other ten give a fearful report and which creates a fearful frenzy amongst the people so much so that they say. "Would that we had died in the land of Egypt! Or would that we had died in this wilderness! 3Why is the Lord bringing us into this land to fall by the sword? Our wives and our little ones will become booty; would it not be better for us to go back to Egypt?" 4So they said to one another, 'Let us choose a captain, and go back to Egypt.' (Nu 14:3)

This complaint is the final straw for God. This act causes God to declare that none of that generation will see the land to which God was leading them, and as a result the entire nation of Israel had to wander in the desert for 40 years until every member of that generation was dead. When that day finally comes, Moses points out that it should have only taken eleven days to get from Egypt to the Promised Land. It was a bitter reminder that put his speech into proper context, for he gathered them to remind them to trust in God and remember the law when they entered the Promised Land. Failure to do so would certainly make their lives much harder.

If we get nothing else from this story let us remember that complaining won't get you there any faster. How many of us have done something similar? Something comes up in our life which is not what we want and we complain. We don't have to be happy about it, but does complaining change anything? No. How many times could we have gotten through things much quicker, but because of our hard-heartedness and selfishness, we end up prolonging our situation? Instead of seeking forgiveness after we have done

wrong, we maintain a prideful mentality and stay or become further estranged in relationship. In doing so we forfeit the promised land of reconciliation.

Eleven days or 40 years. God leads us in our life every day, and if we go astray there is never a time in which God says, "Well you're stuck now", or "you can't get there from here", and certainly never "You're on your own now." No matter our waywardness, like a GPS, God can recalculate based upon our actions and give us a way back to the righteous path. Sometimes it takes longer to get back, but complaining about it only makes the journey longer.

Eleven days or 40 years. God's way or our way. If we want to get to any promises that God has for us, we need to go the way he wants us to, otherwise, what should take a short while comparatively speaking, may take the better part of our lives. Sometimes the hardships we experience are there to teach us so that when we complain we not only prolong our struggle but miss the point and the lesson as well.

Eleven days or 40 years. The right way or the long way. As Christ taught us to reach out to those who have been marginalized and overlooked by the world let us not rebel by valuing the powerful above the powerless. As the Holy Spirit filled the disciples and gave them the energy to do their work let us not rebel against this Spirit by choosing to neglect this Spirit so that it does not grow in us but rather withers and dies. As God leads us closer and closer to the Promised Land despite temporary setbacks and the losses that we experience on the way, let us not, like the Israelites, be so quick to complain and cry out. If we want to follow God there are two ways to go about doing it; the right way and the long way. The long way might be a nice thing to take on a beautiful day, but it is not something we want to be on in the desert moments of our life when things are difficult, and the Promised Land seems so far. Although many a mess has been made by complaining, it has never freed us from our trouble. We may not like the situation in which we find ourselves, but complaining only prolongs our time experiencing them. Let us give thanks that despite all of our waywardness, stubbornness, and complaining, God still shows the way out of our deserts.

Invitation to Communion Rev. Stillwell

When we read through the Bible there are stories and incidences that are sometimes hard to understand, and I believe that there is nothing wrong with saying that we do not understand why this happened, or why God did something. We do not need to have all the answers, and I believe that we cannot know all the answers concerning the mind of God who is so much greater than we.

One example I can give you is that I do not understand the way God treats Moses in this story. Moses was chosen by God to do incredible things and, while he was hesitant, he did agree to do as God told him, and

I believe he did it well. He does his fair share of complaining to be sure, but to shepherd a nation of people through the desert for 40 years he deserves to be a saint, and yet, when it came time for the Israelites to enter the Promised Land, he is not allowed. He is able to look into it from a mountain top, and some see this as a grace since no one else from his generation got to do even that. Still it doesn't seem right that the one who led them to the Promised Land should not get to enter it.

The traditional understanding is that the reason for this is when the Israelites were crying out for water, God told Moses to strike a rock to get water. Moses did as he was told, except that he struck the rock twice. So a man who killed another man, and who often argued openly with God was not worthy to enter the Promised Land, because his second strike was seen as a lack of faith in God.

As I said I don't get it. All I can do is give thanks that the gospels tell me that God does not judge us so harshly. By the measure with which God judged Moses there is no way that Peter would see the Pearly Gates. Thomas' doubt would have doomed him, but Jesus blesses him. Paul would have stayed Saul, and the scales would have forever stayed on his eyes. When I come to this table I acknowledge how little I understand, but I take comfort in knowing this. Jesus is faithful and his grace is sufficient for all of my transgressions big and small. If that is all that you understand than it will be enough to share in this meal.


Church Office hours:
