

Children's Message Pastor Gena

Who is in your family? Some of us have brothers or sisters, some of us have a mother or a father. Some of us might live with an aunt or uncle or our grandparents. We call these people family. They care for us and we care for them. What else makes a family a family?

Sometimes we call the church a family. Have you ever heard that? Some of us here are related, but we aren't all related. How can we be a family if we aren't related to one another?

One day someone said something like this to Jesus: "Members of your family are standing outside, waiting for you." And Jesus said, "My family members are those who hear God's word and put it into practice" (adaptation of Luke 8:20-21, NIV). We, who listen to God's word and try to do what God says are Jesus' brothers and sisters. That makes us all family, doesn't it? We are all brothers and sisters because of Jesus. And, for a time, Fairhill Manor Christian Church, is our family home.

But just like in every family, things change in our family here at Fairhill Manor. Sometimes people go away and we don't see them anymore. Sometimes new people come. I wonder if you can think of ways that new people come into our family here. Sometimes new babies are born or families adopt a child, and we welcome them and bless them, don't we? They become part of our family. Sometimes new people come when they are older and we welcome them, too - sometimes as new members, which means we make a commitment to care for each other and help each other become more like Jesus.

Sometimes we say good-bye to people in our Fairhill family. Sometimes people die and we say good-bye to them. We remember them and celebrate their life through a special worship service called a funeral. Sometimes people move away and become a part of a new church family – a new home in a different place.

That's what is happening today. Marsha Sams has been a part of our church family for about 5 years now, but it feels like she has been a member of our family for a long time, doesn't it? That's because she has been such an active part of our church family, leading us and giving of her time and her gifts.

Marsha is now moving back to Lexington, Kentucky. She will be worshipping in a new church family called Twin Pines Christian Church. We feel sad because she is leaving us, but we are excited for her because she is beginning a new phase of her life and, in many ways, going home to a place where she has so many friends. We will miss Marsha so much, but we also know that she will bring so much to her new church family, just as she has added so much to our lives...

Sermon "It All Started With a Big Bang"

As I mentioned last week, we all love a good story. Whether that story is a book, film or tv show we love to get caught up in a good story, and a good story usually has a good beginning. It was a dark and stormy night is usually a more gripping beginning than once upon a time, but not as good as "In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light."

The beginning of our journey through the story of the Bible is like the beginning of an action-packed movie. If you miss the opening minutes of a movie with its fast-paced scenes, you will not understand the rest of the story. It is the same with the Bible's grand Story. Right from the very beginning God's story opens with a "big bang."

God says let there be light, and Bang! there was light. In fact, the story starts with a series of bangs. "Let there be a dome" God says, and Bang! there was a dome. Then God said, "Let there be lights in the dome", and Bang! there were lights. God keeps speaking and Bang! there is land, Bang! there are plants. Bang! Bang! and there were swarms of living creatures in the waters and birds that flew above the earth across the dome of the sky, living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind.

So, the Story begins with no prelude or introduction, no preview or rising action. It all begins with a bang when its opening verse, Genesis 1:1, introduces us to the Story's main character: God. There is no explanation who God is, but it is clear that God is the most powerful being in the universe since it was God who made it and all the things in it, and it is also clear that God's actions are not impersonal accidents, but the creative purpose of a personal God.

In the following verses and chapters, the "big bang" of creation is presented poetically and artistically. Days 1, 2, and 3 are places created by God.

Day 1—Light and Dark Day 2—Sky and Water Day 3—Land

Days 4, 5, and 6 are the things that fill those places and for which those places were created.

Day 4—Sun and Moon/stars
Day 5—Birds and Sea creatures

Day 6—Animals and human beings

Finally, creation concludes with the biggest bang of all, God's, which is God's creation of human beings. The story of the Bible is made up of many stories, as I have mentioned and even stories that we think of as singular, such as creation, are really multiple as well. For here the story changes its language and its perspective to tell the story of the making of the first humans, which has caused many scholars to believe that it was a second creation story told by a different group of Hebrew people that was edited together after the Israelites go into exile many years later. This hypothesis, which is called the Documentary Hypothesis, comes into play again later when the Bible gives us two stories of Noah taking the animals on the ark. I don't want to get bogged down in the details, but it is important to see what is all there.

It is in the second creation story that we see the care in which God creates human beings and fills them with the breath of life. From this, we see that God's core passion are the people made in God's own image. All the beauties of creation are secondary to you. This truth is a self-esteem builder, but it also can be a hubris builder as we will see. What makes the Bible such a unique story is that it begins with the happy ending. It begins with such a wonderful place made for our delight. It is a literal Garden of Eden

"All things bright and beautiful, all creatures great and small, all things wise and wonderful, the Lord God made them all."

That is how the old hymn phrases it, and it is a celebration that what God has made is good and good for us. Each day God made something new and at the end, with the work complete, God saw that it was good. Everything in creation was good, God saw to it, and the descriptions of the Garden of Eden were descriptions of a paradise in which no creature lacked for anything.

So, we learn from the very beginning of the Bible that God is good all the time, and all the time God is good, and God is good to us, by creating a creation that is good, and yet we know that not everything in creation is good. Hurricanes and tornados, yellow jackets and ticks, disease and virus are all part of this creation which sometimes seems to be at war with us.

So, on the one hand we have our hymn that sings of the goodness of God's creation, and on the other hand we have our experience which says that not all things are so good. What do we make of this? There are two things we should make of this I think, and the first is that all things are bright and beautiful to God who made them as God saw fit. So, things that are ugly to us are so, because they are not like us, but God created them for a reason.

The other point to make is that not all things in the world are due to God. Human sin creates things or perverts God's creation so that what was once bright and beautiful can become sullied and stained. Likewise, we hear in our story that all was in harmony when God deemed it good, and so much of what we see in the world today that we would not call good is a result of human beings acting against the way God intended.

This hymn is about creation before the fall. In that garden of Eden all was good. All was bright and beautiful. Terrible things like cancer, flesh eating bacteria, kidney stones did not exist. Nothing was spoiled so there were no polluted creeks and streams, no smog filled air, no landfills or mountains filled with toxic waste.

It is true that God is good all the time and all the time God is good, but much of the time humans are not, and that brings us back to our story. The Bible Story continues with the "big bang" of the Fall, when Adam and Eve, who were created with the freedom and power to choose, chose poorly. A snake, later identified with the devil but not stated so in the story, convinces them to eat from the forbidden "tree of the knowledge of good and evil" and, when this happens God's vision to be with people was ruined. They are kicked out of the garden, and that is the end of the first part of our story. So strange to think of it like that. Usually if a story has two parts, they are closely equal in length and if I said God's story has two parts you would probably assume I was referring to the Old and New Testament, but really the story of the Bible is the story of how human beings have fallen short of the world God intended for them through their sin, and the rest of the story is God's persistent attempt to win us back by saving us even from ourselves. This God will do with the law and kings, judges and prophets, even God's own self in the form of a man, but first . . . God uses a boat.

Flash forward several generations and we see that the world has been overcome by sin like a weed that destroys a garden, and God decides to try again. God chooses Noah to build the ark and God does a "do over" of the human race after the judgment of flood waters. The flood erased the wicked human race, but it did not erase sin, itself, so problems still exist, and God's work to rebuild paradise has just begun but our part of the story ends today with God giving his first sign, his first promise, when he says to Noah:

¹³I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth. ¹⁷God said to Noah, ¹⁸This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth.

God has now made a covenant with all living flesh, which is to say that there are still many problems, and there will still be many struggles, but God is in this with the people for the long haul. Let that be our joy today. As often as we sin and fall short, God has been with us, and while we sometimes give up on God or ourselves, God never gives up on us. Today our story came in with a bang and went out with a bow which is not how we usually think of it or expect things to go, but stay with us each week as we continue to tell the story of the Bible and I assure you; it will not be the last time something unexpected happens.
