Come with your mud and open our eyes until your ways become visible to us and our lives give you glory.

And then give us the courage to embrace and trust the transformation you are working in us – and in others. Give us words to tell widely the story of how you help us to see with clarity, with insight - how you center us in times of trial and turmoil.

O God who sees, We know your faithfulness in our lives, And so we bring before you the lives of others, The cares of this world, Entrusting all things to you.

Bring healing to those who are ill in mind, body or spirit.

Be with those who are afraid, overwhelmed, confused.

Be with those who are lonely and with those who can find no time and space for themselves.

We pray for those who are living in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, for those who are living in the midst of war, hunger, and natural disaster.

Show us how you want us to help each other, how to stand in solidarity with those who are struggling, how to reach out for help when we need it. May generosity overflow from our own hands and resources until all your children have what they need.

When rules and routines are suspended, help us to find you. When we aren't in the Sanctuary, help us to find you. When we can't be together, help us to find you. Show us where you are.

Calm our fears. Bless us with meaningful interactions and purposeful days. Shower us with your grace as we adjust and learn.

All of this we pray in the name of Jesus, the Light of the World, the one who enables us to see, Amen.

Scripture Text* John 9:1-41 Jim Ulery

Sermon Reflections "Closed Minds and Opened Eyes" Rev. Collins

This is the third week of this Lenten season and we find ourselves once again reading of an encounter of Jesus with a single person. Two weeks ago, we shared the meeting of Jesus with Nicodemus in the darkness; last week we talked of the accidental (perhaps) meeting of Jesus with the Samaritan woman at the well; and today we find Jesus once again coming upon a single man with a need. He is blind and has been since birth but do notice that the man is an innocent caught in a revelatory miracle. He doesn't ask Jesus for a healing...Jesus recognizes his need and making a mudpack

covers his eyes for him to cleanse them in the pool of Siloam. Once the man assents to Jesus request to wash the mud off in the pool...the blind man is given sight.

I say this man is an innocent because he didn't request anything from Jesus. He seems oblivious to who Jesus really is. He is merely at the well...perhaps waiting to ritually cleanse himself so he can approach the nearby Temple. Little does he know that Jesus' disciples make of him an example of their own misguided belief that anyone with any misfortune or physical ailment are victims of their own sin or the failures of their family. You may remember this was the very same belief that Job's friends had of his misfortune...he must have done something to deserve his suffering.

Have you ever noticed that we oftentimes become victims of a closed mind...whether our own or those we associate with? It surely is commonly found these days in our partisan environment. If you believe this way, you're wrong. No question...no way to discuss...no possibility of my being wrong. So, for those disciples the man was an obvious sinner and deserved his blindness. Closed minds.

And when Jesus heals him and opens his eyes to see...to see that Jesus was someone special. Notice that at the beginning he's uncertain as to who exactly Jesus was...a healer for sure...but something more? And then this poor man, now given the beauty of sight must contend with another group of closed-minded people...the Pharisees. Their minds about Jesus were made up. He was a troublemaker. A threat to their leadership and understanding of faithfulness. So, in their partisan way of thinking they question the man as being blind. They disbelieve him and then seek to threaten his parents and his faith...and the unlikely status of Jesus as a person sent by God. Their minds were closed...and nothing that the formerly blind man could say would change it. The Pharisees minds were set and nothing that they saw could adjust their beliefs that Jesus was not of them and must be eliminated.

As for the man now given physical sight...his beliefs were somewhat uncertain. He knew he could see; he knew it was Jesus who gave him that sight, but as to his belief in God's messiah, the Son of Man...well, that was not so clear. His eyes were opened to really see Jesus before him, and in turn, his mind was open to belief.

It was a revelatory miracle showing the true presence of Jesus despite others being blinded to Christ. In these days of heightened anxiety and fears, I wonder...will we be open to see Christ's presence in the midst of troubling news and modified ways of living or will we, like the disciples and the Pharisees, close our minds to that which is different and unfamiliar?

Gracious God, who guided the Israelites through the darkness of the wilderness and who brought our ancestors through world wars, plagues and pestilence, open our eyes and our minds to see your presence in the world around us. Bring your light, O God, into our darkness. Reveal your love in our time of need. Embrace us, enfold us, hold us ever closer to you! In Christ's name. Amen.

Service at the Lord's Table

(We invite you to prepare a roll of bread or a cracker with a glass of juice or a beverage. Place it on the table before you and your family and share it after repeating the following prayer offered by Rita Puskarich, our Elder, and the Words of Institution.)

From what was a rather small gathering in that Upper Room, Jesus took what was most readily available to him in the bread and cup of the Passover table and offered it to generations of the church to remind us of God's everlasting love and presence in our midst. The Givelify App provides an extended pipeline for us to continue to provide our gifts to church and will track our donations for us to review at any time and any place. If you wish, you can still provide your donations by check and mail them to the church. However, this tool that God has given us allows us to continue to fund our church during this time of uncertainty in the most safe and secure way possible. Using the Givelify App to make your donations will also result in less effort that is needed by our Financial Secretary and those who assist him which is important during this critical time of uncertainty.

We hope and pray that in two weeks we can again worship together in our church home and celebrate the passing of this critical time period. In the meantime, stay healthy and safe. Remember to place your fears in God's hands as we pray together.


