March Madness and Lent By Pastor Darwin

We are nearing that special season...or should I say, seasons. In mid-March, just a few weeks away, we will practice our best attempt at prognostication and select the winners of the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament. It doesn't seem to matter whether you have any talent at basketball...or even an interest. People in offices large and small and, even, small groups of friends are known to make a stab at selecting the winners. Some make their selections after careful study of records, results on neutral courts, past performances of the coaching staff...or perhaps the most scientific category...the color of the uniforms!

It's called March Madness for a reason, this season to end the basketball year. The rush of so many games in a short period. The tremendous interest even among the not-sports minded. It focuses our attention on something safe, non-political and fun. We may be disappointed with our selections, but, if not betting, we don't have much to lose, except our vanity believing we actually can make those predictions. It is generally a time of enjoyment and pleasure.

March also brings another season. One far less popular, although practiced for a much longer period. It is a season with a far more personal and serious nature. It begins on February 26 and is the annual six-weeks of preparation called Lent. It is distinctive within the Christian calendar for its more somber tone and encouragement to practice a selection of spiritual practices, such as, prayer, fasting, self-reflection. For many who practice and observe this Christian season it is a time of self-denial, remembering the sacrifices of Christ for us. Some give up the food items and sources of fun as examples of that self-denial.

The more somber and serious character of Lent generally means we may start the season with all good intentions to be more disciplined in our prayer, Bible reading and, perhaps, even fasting, but like our enthusiasm with our basketball selections as the days pass, we lose interest and daily life makes it harder to keep our commitment. The madness of our schedule and demands of life lead us off course. That's why I would encourage you this year, not to commit to anything overly sacrificial, but I hope you will think seriously about some ways you can change your life during Lent and focus on getting closer to Christ...perhaps not fasting each day, but try it for one day each week...perhaps not giving up things that make you happy, but choose a day each week to do something for someone else that makes them happy, praying for two or three people each day, rather than trying to remember a long list.

Maybe even make a calendar...not with basketball parings, but with an assortment of ways you can make Lent more meaningful to you and prepare you to celebrate that joyous day at Lent's end, Easter. Make Lent not a season of madness, but of spiritual improvement.

I'll be on the journey with you!

Fairhill Family,

It's been 5 years since I first wrote the article below. Perhaps it's time to consider it again?

Children and worship. Those words bring a whole host of feelings and responses to mind, but rarest among them is JOY. If we are the caregiver of a child in worship, we likely spend a majority of the worship time self-consciously wondering what everyone else in the congregation thinks of us because of our child's behavior. We wonder what the secret is to getting our children to sit quietly in worship and not distract those around us. Will we ever be able to relax and enjoy worship again? If we are not the caregiver of a child in worship, we likely spend time wishing that another person's child would stop whatever s/he is doing that is infringing on our worship experience.

I have been in both positions - an observer of other adults with children in their pews and a parent with a child in my pew. I have had all of the thoughts described above (and many more!) at one time or another. One thing I know – worshipping with children is *work*. If I expect to come to worship purely for relaxation and rejuvenation, then I had better leave my child at home with someone else or send him out of the sanctuary so that I can focus.

Our discussions and thoughts about children and worship often center around "what to do with the children." I think the crux of the matter has very little to do with the children themselves and a lot more to do with how the rest of us have learned to worship.

As Robbie Fox Castleman writes, "worship is not a refueling to get us through another week. Worship is not a system of traditions built up over many years of congregational life until everyone feels comfortable. Worship is not a time to unwind, relax, tune out or take a mental vacation. Worship is not an hour of Christian entertainment. It is not what makes us good people, faithful Christians or successful parents. Worship is not designed as a commodity to sell or a storefront window to attract "shoppers" to come on in for a great selection of congregational programs. Worship is the surrender of our souls to a God who is jealous for our attention, time and love."* In other words, worship is primarily about *God*, not about *us*.

Worship that is primarily about God does not come naturally to us. In Scripture we read many very specific instructions that God laid out for the Israelites about how they were to honor, love and worship God. We too have to learn how to *worship* God, not just how to be quiet and good during the worship time. And as those who are learning how to worship, we (all of us, not just parents, grandparents, caregivers) are charged with the sacred task of teaching our children how to worship, not just how to behave and sit quietly.

We know from soccer practice and math homework and piano lessons that children learn best by doing. In the same way, children learn to worship by worshipping. They learn by watching those worshipping with them. They learn through participating, practicing and receiving the grace of those around them who realize that they are "in training."

What if we think of our children as worship apprentices instead of distractions? Ourselves as guiding our children into meaningful encounters with God during the worship service? Ourselves as models for our children as we practice prayer and giving? Won't you join me in teaching our children to worship with JOY this Sunday?
