Pastoral Prayer and the Lord's Prayer

Holy God, the tomb has been opened, and we dance into your future. Your life has dawned on us, and we surround you with our praise. You reach out your hand, calling us by name, and leading us into joy.

Merciful God, we welcome the Risen Christ into the locked rooms of our faults and mistakes that we are hesitant to open. When we hesitate to speak a word of hope, please forgive us, and give us a voice. When we find it difficult to love one another, forgive us, and give us fresh compassion. God of hope, we rejoice in the beauty that surrounds us. Help us attend to the gifts you abundantly provide. Hear our prayers of gratitude for the grace and support of loved ones who get us through difficult days; the joy of laughter, play and good fun; moments to be still and quiet and present right where we are. We give you thanks for your creation that awakens with springtime blooms; for opportunities to follow Christ in meaningful service and lives of purpose; and for the companionship we find in this community of faith.

God of good news, on this second Sunday of Easter, we call to mind those who are suffering. Please hear our prayers for those who are exhausted by their lives and carrying heavy loads; those whose fear and anxiety traps them within small places and small lives; those who are overwhelmed or depressed and cannot find their joy; and those who are in need of the power of your resurrection. We raise to you the names of those on our prayer list, those we have named aloud this morning, and those we name to you in the quietness of these moments... Do you have a pet at home? What is your favorite thing about that pet? What kinds of animals do you see around where you live?

Do you like the forest or the beach better? What do you like about that place?

What is your favorite kind of sky? The one with clouds, or the sky at sunset, or the sky with lightning, or the sky at night with a full moon?

What do you like to do most with water? With snow?

What is your favorite color? I wonder where you might see that color in nature.

What is your favorite thing about yourself?

All of the things we've talked about are parts of God's creation – even us. There are so many wonderful things about creation. At the end of the first Scripture we read today (Psalm 150), it says, "Let everything that breathes praise the Lord!" I wonder what it would be like if *everything in all creation* started praising God at the same time. Can you imagine that?

Dear God, together with all of creation, we praise you! Thank you for the wonder and beauty and fun that is all around us. Help us to enjoy all that you have created and to take good care of it for you. Amen.

Second Scripture Reading

John 20:19-31

Today's story comes to us from the Gospel of John, chapter 20. This is the traditional reading for the 2nd Sunday of Easter – the story of Jesus' appearance to and interactions with the disciples, particularly Thomas.

It is Sunday evening. The disciples are gathered with the doors locked. That morning, Mary Magdalene had reported first that the stone, covering the entrance to the tomb where Jesus body was laid, had been removed. Peter and the other disciple had investigated further, confirming that Jesus' body was gone, but the linen cloths in which his body had been wrapped were still in the tomb. Then Mary Magdalene came again, announcing that she had "seen the Lord" – alive and talking to her, calling her by name.

The disciples are still in Jerusalem, in hiding and scared for their lives, their leader having just been tried and executed two days ago on Friday.

Let us hear John 20:19-31.

I wonder what it was like to be one of the disciples behind locked doors that Sunday evening. I wonder if hearing Mary Magdalene say that she had "seen the Lord" made them feel more or less afraid.

I wonder why Jesus didn't knock on the door but instead just came and stood among them. I wonder what it means that Jesus could be touched, seen, and heard, and could also enter rooms like that.

The first thing Jesus said was, "Peace be with you." I wonder what kind of peace Jesus brings to locked places.

Jesus said, "Peace be with you," and then showed them his hands (where he had been nailed to the cross) and his side (that had been pierced to ensure he was dead). I wonder what it means to you that Jesus still had wounds, even after having been raised from the dead.

Jesus said, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Then he breathed on the disciples and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit." We read something like this about breath in two other places in the Bible. In Genesis 2:7, we read that, in the very beginning, "...the LORD God formed a human from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the human became a living being." In Ezekiel 37, we read that God reconstituted a valley full of dry bones into bodies and then breathed life into them. This was to show the house of Israel that even when all is torn apart, dispersed, and seems dead and without hope, God can resurrect them and restore them as a people. I wonder what it means to you that Jesus breathed on the disciples. I wonder what it means to *receive the Holy Spirit* like that.

I wonder what it was like for Thomas to hear the others say, "We have seen the Lord."

Thomas is the Hebrew word for twin. Didymus is the Greek word for twin. Perhaps "twin" is this man's nickname, and his given name was lost to history. Perhaps he is a twin. Perhaps he is just a lot like someone else. I wonder how much we are like this twin. When does it help you to see and to touch in order to believe?

Jesus seemed to know just what Thomas needed from him. I wonder why Jesus came back, just for Thomas. I wonder what it feels like to have Jesus come back just for you.

We don't know if Thomas touched Jesus or not. Thomas's words to Jesus, "My Lord and my God!" are as close as we get to someone saying that Jesus is God in the Gospels. I wonder what Thomas meant when he said, "My Lord and my God!"

I wonder how you feel when you hear Jesus's words, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

I wonder where the Good News is for you in today's story.

Keep sharing your stories. Keep asking questions. Keep listening to the silence. God is speaking in all of it!

Invitation to Communion

It is natural when we are feeling anxious or threatened to hunker down and lock the doors, to become focused on our own security rather than the risky mission to which we are called. One promise from our story today is that Jesus cannot be stopped by our locked doors. Jesus comes to us as he came to the first disciples, right in the midst of our fear, pain, doubt, and confusion. He comes speaking peace, breathing into our anxious lives the breath of the Holy Spirit.

What is more, Jesus *keeps* showing up. As he came back a week later to provide exactly what Thomas needed, so he keeps coming back week after week among his gathered disciples — in the bread and the cup — not wanting any to miss out on the life and peace he gives. May we sense the presence of the Risen Christ among us today and every time we share this meal together. And may he keep sending us out of our safe, locked rooms, into a world that, like us, so desperately needs his gifts of life and love and peace.
