And yet, we all know that the work of the Church is needed now more than ever. Here are two ways you can help:


- 1. Make a gift to Disciples Mission Fund. You can make a one-time or recurring gift here.

Have you ever been afraid of something? I know I have! I'm afraid of snakes and germs and a ton of other stuff. I wonder if you've ever been somewhere that was pretty scary. Sometimes even going to the store can be scary; we're surrounded by people we don't know and there are so many aisles that we might get lost. Have you ever been lost in a store? I have and I was really scared. I couldn't find my parents or anybody I knew. It's a very scary feeling being alone or lost. I was really happy when I heard my mom calling for me. I recognized her voice and when I turned around, she was right behind me. I was so happy to see her again!

It's okay to be scared sometimes, but the Bible tells us that God is always with us. How cool is that! The very same God that made all the animals, mountains, plants and even us is always with us. The 23rd Psalm says, "Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me." That valley sounds like a pretty scary place and I don't think I would want to hang out there! But even in the scariest places, God is always there with us and he is protecting us. So whenever you start feeling scared - whether you see a snake or are in a really high building or lost in a store - always look for something that is good and let that remind you that God is always there for you.

Sermon*

"Lingering Fears and Longings for Home"

So, a little word association for this Lord's Day...what comes to mind when you hear the word, COMFORT? I have a feeling that with our experiences of the past two months you've got a quick answer for this. In these fearsome times of uncertainty, the quest has begun for the things that bring us comfort or reassurance. And although the desire is shared, the specifics are so personalized...perhaps that comfy chair or sofa with the afghan to wrap around you...for others, it's foods...mac and cheese, or for Audra, meatloaf...maybe you pictured a certain television show or a movie. I know for many in these video gatherings and work-from-home times, it may be the freedom to wear your pajamas...from the waist down at least.

It's so hard these days with life being so out of order to find some normalcy and calm to bring us comfort. We've largely reverted to a simpler life. Game night at home, jigsaw puzzles, reading those books that you have always intended to read, but didn't have the chance. Or perhaps comfort comes through talking with family and old friends on the phone.

In times of anxiety it is only natural to seek out those things which bring us a sense of calm and peace...a feeling of comfort!

Much of the story of God's relationship with the people of Israel involved God's response to their fears and anxiety by bringing concrete signs of comfort and provisions. Whether the manna and quail in the wilderness or the return of the exiles from Babylon, when Isaiah was granted that most welcome announcement from God to comfort, comfort my people.

And, as if on cue, the lectionary sends along on this the fourth Sunday of the season of Easter, the Good Shepherd Sunday and what I believe to be among the most beloved and comforting scripture texts, the

23rd Psalm. I suppose for many of us this beautiful lyrical passage carries with it some history. For me it brings back memories of Sunday School and memory recitations...of a flannel board (yes, I am dating myself) presentation...for those of you who don't remember the 1960 Pirates, that was a slightly ancient, slowly-animated picture story with the cut-outs of sheep, the water of the stream, a shepherd...and a baby lamb wrapped around the shepherd's neck. I still see that picture in my memory. But for me this passage brings another memory as well...of my Grandparent's home in the mountains near Ohiopyle State Park. And hanging on the wall of the living room above the potbelly stove was a needlepoint of this passage. It had been made by the hands of my Grandmother who I loved so dearly and I remember that she would sit with me and read it and give her commentary of how God loved me and how God would always be with me. That memory remains a powerful presence in my life...as I walk along a stream, as I see the green fields or as I consider what it means when the things that I have relied upon and believed to be dependable in our world, become less sure and dependable. I don't know about you, but in anxious times I find myself reverting to memories that are comforting and trustworthy.

So, imagine my joy, in this fearsome time, to be reminded of these memories in the Psalmist words. Consider the testimony of the psalmist writing of what God provides...not having to want...lounging in the green wonder of a pasture...of walking along the calm waters...to be renewed or restored in your soul...to be led by God in the paths toward righteousness.

This is a wonderful testimony to us of how blessed the writer is in receiving these from God. But then, the direction of the psalm shifts. The testimony that had been directed to us as an audience is now shifted as the psalmist talks not to us, but with God directly. It moves from talking about God in the third person (he or she) to taking with God...a close presence, as if God is standing by the side of the writer...a companion...not above, not removed, but close by. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me, your rod and staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

Although at times I can become so frustrated with the modern technology that has been linking us in these months...our smart phones, Facetime, Zoom, Google Hangout...surely they do remind me of my lack of technological intelligence, but they also satisfy a deep longing that becomes so powerful as we traverse our stay at home times, or as we walk in that valley of death's shadow...it's the comfort of connecting, of belonging...of home!

T. S. Eliot wrote years ago that "The end of all our exploring will be to arrive where we started and to know the place for the first time." Comfort is to feel at home...and to know you belong! I realize that for some the memory of our childhood home is not of a warm and happy time, but the fact that we recoil at the thought of a child not finding love and peace at home merely strengthens that image of home as comfort and peace.

So, the psalmist ends with that image to speak to us in our fears and troubles...of dwelling in the house of the Lord, forever. Isaac Watts sets that promise to music in a most eloquent way when he writes:

"Your sure provisions, gracious God, attend me all my days; O may your house be my abode, and all my work be praise. Here would I find a settled rest, while others go and come; no more a stranger, nor a guest, but like a child at home."

The first story our children hear in the Children Worship & Wonder Sanctuary is the story of "The Good Shepherd," based on our two Scripture passages for today. Before they hear the grand stories of Creation, before they are introduced to Jesus through the stories of his birth, life and death, they meet the Good Shepherd. They feel the safety of his sheepfold. They hear him calling his sheep by name, walking in front of them to show them the way to good, green, grass and clear, cool, still water. They are assured that even in places of danger, the Good Shepherd is with the sheep, showing them the way to pass through, until they are safely home again.

Slowly, the children begin to realize that the sheep have names ... they have our names ... we are the sheep ... I have a Good Shepherd ... I am cared for, I am loved, I am known – by name – I belong. Someone will notice if I am missing.

In today's Children Worship & Wonder story, "The Good Shepherd and the Lord's Supper," when the Good Shepherd leads the sheep from the sheepfold, they follow him to the good, green, grass. And there is a table. The table of the Good Shepherd. A special plate and a special cup are on the table. At this table, the Good Shepherd feeds his sheep.

Can you hear the Good Shepherd calling you – by name? He is calling you from the sheepfold, walking in front of you, leading you to this, his table, where he feeds you. Here we are reminded that the love of the Good Shepherd never ends - the Good Shepherd walks in front of us to show us the way, even through death. Here we are known and loved. Here we belong.
