Coronavirus update: Beginning on May 15, Washington County, along with most of the counties in Southwestern Pennsylvania enters the 'yellow' phase of re-opening. What this practically means for our congregation and our church building is modest, but critical. As Gary Ford mentioned last week in his article in the Manor Minutes, Fairhill Manor will use this time to plan for future re-opening of the building, supplying the necessary cleaning and sanitizing items, and putting into place the best practices for a safe and comfortable re-opening. There will be the opportunity in this phase for cleaning and restructuring our layout to make the building safe for our members and our community to return once again. Some smaller groups will have the opportunity to use specific rooms for their gatherings of less than 25 people. And a protocol will be set in place for the sanitizing of the rooms after each use. Our three task groups of building preparation, worship/sanctuary preparation and communications have begun their work toward an eventual re-opening for us to gather for worship once again. In this 'yellow' phase as we clean, plan, and prepare, I would ask for your prayers for our leaders and for our community as we seek to move through this 'next' normal. Life is constantly changing from one experience that we recognize as normal to another. This coronavirus has forced upon us a most rapid and unwelcome change, but together watching out for one another, we can move carefully and responsibly into the next normal and all the 'next' normals after that as God's faithful people caring for one another. Hello, children of God! Have you ever spent time away from someone you love? Maybe in the past you had a sleepover, or you went on a trip where you weren't in your home. Right now, you might be separated from a lot of people you love – your friends, maybe some family members. We miss the people that we're separated from, don't we? Sometimes even if we can see the people we love, we still can't give them a big hug like we're used to doing. That's hard, isn't it?

Do you have something that reminds you of the loved ones you're missing? Or, if you've gone away from home before, have you ever taken something with you that felt like home? Maybe you have a special blanket or stuffed animal or a photo that does this job, comforting you and reminding you of things and people you love that aren't with you.

Sometimes having a little something with you helps, because it makes you think of what you've left behind at home or the people you are missing, and it reminds you that you'll be together again sometime. Even though you might not see your family or home for a little while, these items give you a little part of them, and bring you peace because you know they still care for you.

Did you know that Jesus did something similar for us? Before he died, Jesus told his disciples that he was going to give them a special helper. Jesus said that he would be leaving, and they wouldn't see him, but that he wasn't leaving them alone. Jesus said he would give them his spirit to comfort them and help them.

That message was not just for the disciples; it's for us, too! The Holy Spirit helps us to pray, guides us, and comforts us. We feel our special comforter, the gift Jesus gave us, when we pray, read our Bibles, and worship together. We are not alone! And do you know when we seem to feel our helper the most? When we are loving each other just like Jesus loves us!

Sermon*

"Another Advocate?"

If nothing else, this coronavirus has given all of us a good scare. So, what do we do in the face of fear? Some may cower and seek to hide away, while others seek for truth and make preparations. I'm not talking about the hoarding runs of March with toilet paper and bleach. I'm referring to how we live our lives and make preparation to be safe and provide for our families.

I read a news item last week that there has been an increase in interest among people to set their lives in order...to get a will created, to set down their advanced directives for medical care. Faced with a threat to our lives, we can take constructive action to plan for the future.

That's the purpose of our text for this Sunday. John in these chapters, set in that same Upper Room, around that same table from which we preserve our most precious and sacred remembrance of the Eucharist, this Gospel writer greatly expands this intimate scene with Jesus' last sermon. Many call it Jesus' Farewell discourse. I call it Jesus' final preparations...calling his family together to tell them personally of his love for them and what he hopes for them and what he has done to prepare.

He builds off his words from last week as he paints a picture of the relationship between himself, God...and his disciples, yes, even us. It's a relationship founded upon, what else, love. The word Jesus uses more than any other word...and interestingly, he uses it most often as a verb...love for Christ is an action...lived out, not a subject of warm emotion. It produces something for the benefit of the one loved. And to Jesus, at least in the Gospel of John, it is 'the' commandment. When he is asked for the greatest commandment, it is love...for God, for the other and for oneself. It's how people will recognize his disciples, he says. In the 15th chapter, he repeats the supreme importance of them loving one another, just as he has loved them. This repetitive teaching is not an accident...as William Sloane Coffin, the great 20th century preacher wrote, "If we fail in love, we fail in all things."

So, pretty clear what Jesus is urging his disciples to do after his death...and even after his ascension to heaven. So, if we want to evaluate our lives as followers of Christ, there is one clear and obvious standard to measure... "In what ways did I share, or perhaps, not share love?"

Ok, so Jesus shares his hopes for us...to love as he loves, but what of the inheritance? How can we ever get along without Jesus present with us? Remember, at the moment these words were shared, the disciples seemed oblivious to the reality that Jesus was to be crucified and to die, but it was, as it is with those we love, critical that Jesus make preparations for those left behind. So, he speaks with them about another advocate?

This word advocate in this passage is an interesting one, parakletos, in Greek has many meanings...comforter, advocate, counselor, helper...all of them good...maybe today we would add partner, supporter, companion...BFF! This word only appears five times in scripture...four of them in this extended passage from John. So, the author is saying to us...heads up, this is important.

So, if this is the other advocate...who was the first? I don't think we need much clarity as we look again at those synonyms for advocate...it could only be Jesus himself. And now in preparing his disciples for their unknown future, he shares the estate by promising an advocate, equal to...no, he says even better than himself, not merely to be nearby, but consider these connections...with you forever, you know him, he will be with you, not orphaned, I am in you and you in me. Earlier Jesus said that with this other advocate we will be able to accomplish more and greater things than did he.

Considering Jesus miracles and wondrous teachings that promise seems a bit overstated...and yet. This other advocate is not limited to one location or working through one person, rather, as a spirit, can be 'in' each of us...if you will, extending that love of God that marks us as Christ's followers. There is no distancing with God...a close relationship of oneness with the Trinity. Not so much imitating Christ, but Christ at work in and through us.

Wow, could it be that with God's Spirit being within each of us and us being called to share God's love through our actions each day...are we perhaps, another advocate—an advocate for one another? Thanks be to God!

Call to Offering*

Jesus promised us that we will have an advocate who will be with us forever. God protects and provides for us. We are God's treasured possession. We are God's children, brothers and sisters of Christ Jesus. We're friends of Jesus. Jesus promised He will never leave us orphaned. He promised to be with us always through the presence of the Holy Spirit.

Jesus said, [15] "If you love me, you will keep my commandments." So, how we live out these commandments of loving God with all we are and loving our neighbors as ourselves, is the proof of our love for Christ. It's not simply saying we love Him. It's doing what He told he told us to do. That's the measuring rod of our faithfulness.

"They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me." We at Fairhill Manor Christian Church have always shown our love for Jesus by the things we do. We are especially doing that now in many ways. Our elders care for our sheep; our trustees care for our building; our outreach workers care for needy people in the area; the Stewardship/Finance ministry cares for our congregational finances, worship leaders and worship participators prepare and listen to audio of worship, participate in Zoom worship meetings, or read our weekly worship services; all members seem to step up and do more or care more; and the pastoral search committee is doing the very important and hard work of seeking our next pastor. Their task is even harder because of covid-19. We are all stepping up "during these trying times."

Now, in this time of considering our offerings please be aware that the General Budget Fund is in an approximately \$1,000 better position than it was a month ago. 21 people are using the online giving platform Givelify, and people are sending their offerings to the church or Brian Shaw. We are to be congratulated for our love of Jesus and each other. Keep up the good work!




