SAMUEL HAYCRAFT, JR.--FRUIT GROWER

When Samuel Haycraft wrote Abraham Lincoln on May 31, 1860, he stated among other things that "My great hobby for a few years past has been the cultivation of fruit which I have thoroughly studied and enjoy with much relish."⁽¹⁾ This was no idle statement, and, likely, his interest in fruit growing led to the organization of the Kentucky State Pomological and Horticultural Society, in Elizabethtown on October 12th, 1865, at which time he was elected corresponding secretary.

The president of this society was Lawrence Young of Louisville, with three vice presidents namely: Z.R. Huggins of Glasgow, Dr. B. R. Young of Elizabethtown, and A.D. Offutt of Georgetown. Charles E. Nourse was named recording secretary and Alfred Brown was chosen as treasurer, both men were Elizabethtown residents. There was also an executive committee of seven members, of which two members, Lawrence Young and Dr. B.R. Young, were office holders.

About fifty members and guests met in the Masonic Hall in Elizabethtown at 10:00 A.M. They had as their main purpose to request the State Legislature to more effectively enact laws to protect orchards and fruit gardens. However, it appears from the TRANSACTIONS⁽²⁾ of the society that no one was able to specify concrete steps that might legally be taken by the Legislature to promote fruit growing.

Special committees met and discussed general cultivation, nomenclature, and miscellaneous topics. Perhaps, one of the most pleasant tasks was to determine the twelve best varieties of apple, peach and pear trees and to enumerate the merits of each. Then there was a committee on grapes and one on insects. In selecting the best varieties of apples, the committee had to consider twenty-four varieties and to recommend fifteen for general cultivation.

In making a selection of the best apples, there was considerable humor and friendliness exhibited by the committee members. There was some controversy relative to the apple known as Pryor's Red. J.W. Walker of Jefferson County suggested the Small Romanite as a substitute; David L. Adair of Hancock County suggested the White Pippin, stating that it was a long keeper and a fine bearer. Newton Craig of Scott County "through compliment to his friend Mr. Walker would vote for the Small Romanite-that perhaps Mr. Walker supposed the war was not over and wanted ammunition-the Small Romanite would answer very well as grape-shot." Eventually, the Little Romanite was adopted on the list in lieu of Pryor's Red.

The same procedures applied to pears, peaches, grapes, seedlings and new varieties. Fifty-three plates of fruit were exhibited for the members, along with vegetables, wheat, rye and bouquets of flowers arranged by the ladies. (Continued on page 41)

COURT ORDER BOOK, HARDIN COUNTY, KY. 1796 (25 OCTOBER)

At a Court held for Hardin County on Tuesday the 25th day of October 1796 Present Robert Hodgins Robert Mosley & Stephen Rawlings Gent Justices

An Inventory of the Estate of John Ewin was returned and was ordered to be recorded

A deed for one thousand acres of Land from Thomas Crow and Nancy his wife to John Crow was Exhibited in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

Ordered that Joseph Ball infant orphan be bound apprentice to Josiah Dodge to learn the art and mastery of a Kilnyards maker and black smith trade and with him to serve for the space of five years &c

The persons appointed to inspect the Courthouse made their report that said house was built according to contract and thereupon it was received by the Court and it is ordered that John Crutcher be discharged from his obligation

Ichabod Radley is appointed Constable in the room of Andrew Fairleigh who together with Aaron Rawlings his security entered into and acknowledged their bond conditioned as the Law directs for the faithful performance of said office and thereupon took the oath of a Constable

A deed from Bartholomew and Peter Tardiview for twelve hundred acres of Land to Eli Williams was produced in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be Recorded

A Deed from Jacob Vanmatre & Lettis his wife to Barnlo Harris was acknowledged and ordered to be recorded Said Lettis being Examined as the Law directs relinquished her right of Dower

A list of non residence sworn to Sam Haycraft & Co to Cer (Sic.)

Ordered that David May & Joseph Kirkpatrick do examine State and Settle the administration of the Estate of John Larue Decd and make report thereof to the next Court

A deed from John Paul and Sally his wife to Abigail Barnet was acknowledged by the said John and was ordered to be recorded

Ordered that the Auditor of publick accts settle with Samuel Haycraft Gent Sheriff for surplus of Land Tax for 1793

Information being given to the Court that Michael Miller was infirm and entirely incapable of Laboring and destitute of property therefore it is Considered by the Court that Thomas Redman be allowed fifty shillings per month for keeping and furnishing him with every necessary request to his Care and that money be levied for that purpose

On the motion of Atkinson Hill who is proprietor of Land on one side of the Rolling fork of Salt River at Shackles falls and is desirous of building a water Grist Mill thereon and prays that one acre of land may be Condemned for the abutments of his mill dam it is Ordered that the Commonwealths writ of Adquaddaminum Issue to the Sheriff of this County commanding him to summon twelve good and lawful men of his County to meet on the ground the day of next and then to enquire agreeable to the acts of Assembly in that Case made and provide with such inquisition so made return to the first day of next Court

John Crutcher appellant against John McMahan appelee upon an appeal from a Magistrates judgment Continued till next Court

An obstinate list was produced in Court by George Helm Gent Commissioner of Tax ordered that each & every of the said persons be summoned to appear here at the next Court to answer the Complaint Exhibited against them by the said Commissioner

Bladin Ashby and Stephen Rawlings are allowed six shillings each and John Crutcher 6/ for attending do as Clerk Samuel Haycraft ditto as Sheriff

The Court proceeded to Lay & assess the County Levy which is as follows

The persons appointed to view a Road from the Courthouse to Mr Hodgins old mill made their report as follows Beginning at said Mill runing along the old road to the present Crossing of Middle Creek Thence with the old road toward Stephen Rawlings to the dividing ridge Thence a straight Course to intersect a road from the new Mill to the Courthouse and with the same to the Courthouse

Ordered that the said Road so Laid off be Established

Ordered that George Helm Gent Commissioner of Tax be allowed twenty pounds for taking the list for the present year

Ordered that Isom Enlow be appointed overseer of the Road from Mr. Hodgin old mill to Middle Creek and that all Tithables on the little south fork of Nolin and down the main Creek to Chs Millers and those on the main fork to Philips's and up Kirkpatrick's and Winchester's forks to the Heads do assist him in Clearing and keeping said Road in repair

Ordered that John Vertrees & Bladin Ashby be allowed 6/ each for sitting with the Sheriff

Ordered that John Vertrees be appointed overseer of the residue of said Road and all the Tithables that assisted Aaron Rawlings do assist him in Clearing & keeping said road in repair

Ordered that Court be adjourned till Court in Course

In connection with the grape exhibit were six bottles and one demijohn of wine which were declared "fine and highly appreciated by the society and particularly by the ladies". No one knew what happened to the Catawba brandy. Perhaps "the male sex got hold of it and it disappeared". Someone heard a man "suppose to be a judge say it was very good and strong enough".

There was also an exhibit of wines consisting of the following:

- Six bottles Catawba by Newton Craig of Scott County
- Six bottles Catawba by Mrs. Short of Hardin County
- Six bottles Wine by Mrs. R.L. Wintersmith
- One bottle Angelico Wine of California by Mrs. C.D. Poston
- One bottle California Port by same
- One demijohn Catawba Brandy by Newton Craig of Scott County

This particular exhibit of Newton Craig's was likely the one that so mysteriously disappeared.

The sorghum molasses exhibit was praised by the committee. There were four entries and all judged excellent because "the taste was fine and clear, and none of that sickly farewell that marked the article some years ago".

Even the bouquets of three participants, namely Mrs. Lizzie Robinson, Mrs. Sue Stone and Mrs. Eliza Slaughter, along with a wreath of roses by Miss Mollie Wintersmith and a geranium by Mrs. Eliza Vertrees, were duly noted and appreciated.

H. Taylor of Hawesville, Kentucky wrote Haycraft on September 22, 1865, relative to the society and in regard to his wine production from his grape crop, he stated that "I have no wine on hand save 10 barrels currant wine made last year. Had to sell all my Catawba to keep the negro soldiers from stealing or wasting it." This man likely felt the sting of some type of military authority for a period of time during or following the Civil War.

Dr. J.A. Warder of North Bend, Ohio, wrote Haycraft on October 6, 1865, that he would be unable to attend the Elizabethtown meeting because he had just returned from a "pleasant meeting of the Indiana Society" at Fort Wayne, Indiana, where he had a good time. However, he did attend the second session held at Elizabethtown in September, 1866, and "added much to the interest and benefit of the society".

These letters and other correspondence appear in the publications of both the first session and second session of the TRANSACTIONS OF THE KENTUCKY STATE POMOLOGICAL AND HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.³

The second session of the society met in the Masonic Hall in Elizabethtown on October 12, 1866 at 10:00 A.M. Haycraft was reelected corresponding secretary and resolutions were drawn expressive of the sad feelings of the society on the death of their former recording secretary Charles Nourse, Esq. of Elizabethtown. The newly elected recording secretary was Stephen W.D. Stone of Elizabethtown. (To be concluded in next issue.)
