"BATTLE OF VINEGAR HILL"

It was more of a skirmish, like hundreds of others during the Civil War, rather than a battle. It is even doubtful if a record of the action will be found in the official records of the war. For the citizens then living on the Louisville and Nashville Turnpike where the road from Sonora to Hodgenville crossed it on that late September day, it was a scene of great excitement. For many years they recalled that day when cannon smoke swirled about and cannon balls were rolling across yards and knocking down small trees.

The last week of September, 1862, found the main portions of Buell's Union and Bragg's Confederate armies concentrating at Louisville and Bardstown, respectively. When Bragg entered the state, it was soon thought that he was intent on capturing Louisville. Buell entered the race for Louisville with a large Union force.

When the large armies moved across country, various units sometimes moved on roads that ran somewhat parallel. Thus it was that some of Bragg's units were moving north on the turnpike while others were using the road (now 31 E Glasgow to Bardstown) some miles to the east. Bragg had delayed his march toward Louisville long enough to capture 4200 Union soldiers at the Munfordville garrison on September 17th. This delay enabled Buell to win the race to Louisville.

Buell's rear guards numbering several hundred troops, traveling up the turnpike, overtook the rear guards of Bragg's army near the location of the Sonora road about noon, September 29, 1862, and the "battle" ensued. The Confederates planted their cannon on a hill just above the Sonora road while the Union's six guns were about a mile to the south. The Confederate artillery was to delay the pursuers long enough to allow the main Rebel force to join their main army in the Bardstown area.

ELIZABETHTOWN CITY COUNCIL MINUTES 1805, 1806

At a board of Trustees began and held for Elizabeth Town on Saturday the 13th day of April 1805 at the clerks office in said town Present Robert Huston James Percifull & Benjamin Helm Gents

Robert Huston is appointed president Protempor

Agreeable to an order pafsed on the 8th day of February last directing the clerk to advertise the sale of Lotts in this town The same was advertised Agreeable to law and this day sundry Lotts were sold to the highest bidder (To wit) No thirty four was sold to Garrad Bowlin for sixteen dollars Lott No 35, 37 & 15 was sold to Samuel Bush for fifty eight dollars Lotts No 36, 14 & 11 was sold to George Helm for forty four dollars & fifty cents Lott No 30 was sold to James Percifull for fifteen dollars and fifty cents Lott No 13 was sold to David Vance for twenty two dollars Lott No 16 was sold to Daniel Waide for sixteen dollars Lott No 33 was sold to Christopher Bush for eleven dollars Lott No 38 was sold to Isaac Bush for one dollar Which lotts were sold at twelve months credit bond and security taken to the Trustees for the benefit of the heirs of Andrew Hynes Decd

Ordered that this board be adjourned

Ordered that the clerk advertise the selling of Lotts in this Town on the second Saturday in March next

An interchangable conveyance from the Trustees to Benjamin Helm and from Benjamin Helm to the Trustees was this day acknowledged

A deed from the Trustees to Joseph Chalfin for Lott No 4 was acknowledged

Ordered that James Percifull be and he is hereby appointed Surveyor of the streets in said Town

Ordered that this board of Trustees meet for the future on the first Saturday of every month

Order that the board be adjourned until the meeting in course

COURT ORDER BOOK, HARDIN COUNTY, KY. 1796

At a Court held for Hardin County on Tuesday the 26th day of January 1796 Present John Vertrees Bladin Ashby & Robert Mosley Gent Justices

A deed from William Pollard & Robert Rolston to James Steel for thirty one thousand acres of land was produced in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be Recorded

A deed from John Cochy Owens to Samuel Evans for Ten thousand acres of Land was produced in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

A deed from William Johnson & wife to Mathew Franklin Boone & Co. for one undivided moiety of 37310 acres of Land was produced in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

A deed from Philip Philips to William McClung for 230 acres of Land was proved by the Oaths of John Rowan Ben. Helm & James Crutcher subscribing witnesses thereto & was ordered to be recorded

A deed from John Hendly to John Neighfong(?) for 800 acres of Land was proved by the Oaths of Jacob(sic) Sheets and Michael Nufong two of the Subscribing witnesses thereto & was ordered to Lay for further proof

A deed from Henry Banks & Richard Claybourne to James Frenchard was Exhibited in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

Peter Atherton against Wm Burney attachment & proceedings thereon on the Motion of the said Burney by his attorney was ordered to be quashed

Articles of agreement (annexed to the plan & certain privileges of a Town) between James Frenchard of the first part Colborn Berrel & Henry Sewarite of the second part and David Barbier of the 3d part were Exhibited in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

A letter of attorney from Colborn Barrel & Henry Sewarite to David Barbier was exhibited in Court duly authenticated and was ordered to be recorded

A letter of attorney from William Glen to John Breckinridge was acknowledged & ordered to be recorded

A deed from Robert Baird & Nancy his wife to William McClung for 700 acres of land was proven by the Oaths of Benjamin Helm Samuel Haycraft & John Crutcher subscribing witnesses thereto and was ordered to be recorded

The Court proceeded to Rate the several Taverns as followeth (to wit)

The Tavern Keepers at Hartford are allowed to sell Whiskey at one shilling per half pint. The several Tavern keepers in said County are allowed to sell agreeably to the above rates but no higher

On the Motion of Benum Shaw Judgment is granted him against Jonathan Bozarth for 36E & all legal costs for failing to return his Execution against Philip Philips

Ordered that John Vertrees and Bladin Ashby do settle with the Sheriff on the fifth day of February next and return a true statement thereof to the Court

Ordered that Daniel Linder Thomas Gilliland John Glen Nicholas Roof Thomas McIntire or any three of them being first sworn do view and lay off a road the most convenient way from Isaac Morisons to Jacob Vanmeters Mill and from thence to Intersect the Road leading from Wm Hodgin's new Mill to Philip Philip's lane & make report to the next Court

Robert Barnett's ear mark is as follows a Crop & an under-bit in the right Ear and two Slits in the left

The persons appointed to view and lay off a road from the Courthouse to Hartford made the following report (to wit) Beginning at the Town of Hartford passing Barnets old station leaving the same on the right hand, thence crossing a run near an old Mill passing along a ridge near Halls Creek Thence passing Chris Jackson junior Thence passing Chris Jackson Senior Thence passing the head of Cain Run to Carry Creek thence to the lick on Browns Creek thence down to the first run that Empties in below the lick Thence up the same to a point about one hundred yards above a Spring Thence crossing the ridge to Short Creek & up the same to the lick Thence to the present crossing of little Clifty Thence leaving the old road as near on a straight line as will answer to Cross big Clifty about two miles below the present crossing Thence to the mouth of Poplar Camp run Thence to Captain Isaac Morrison's Thence to the Gap at the White oak Spring Thence to Jacob Vanmatrees Meadow Thence along the lower side of Wm Hanley's field Thence crossing the Creek at Enlows Cabbin Thence a straight to the Courthouse

On consideration whereof it is ordered that the Road so laid off be Established

A Bill of sale from Joseph Barnet to Robert Baird was proved by the Oath of Ben Helm and was ordered recorded

Ordered that George Helm Gent be appointed Commifsoner of Tax for the present Year

Ordered that Court be adjourned till Court in Course

TIDBIT

During the Civil War it was possible to cross picket lines by obtaining a pass from President Lincoln. This was done in 1864 by Mrs. Henry M. Showers of Elizabethtown in order to visit her husband, Henry M. Showers in Atlanta, Ga. The pass is in the possession of her great granddaughter, Mrs. Charles Goff of Sarasota, Fla. It reads "No. 30 Office Provost Marshal, Martinsburg, Va.

April 30, 1864

Guards and pickets will pass Mrs. Henry Showers and 2 children on B & O Railroad. Good for one day. Description, Age 36, Height 5ft. 3in.

Complexion faire, eyes blue, hair black.

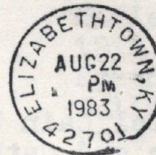

The artillery fight lasted about half an hour and did little damage to the troops. The cavalry detachments attached to the two forces engaged in hand to hand fighting. This is said to have resulted in seven Confederate deaths and several wounded on each side. It is believed that the dead soldiers were buried near Dorsey's Branch, which crossed the road about halfway between the two forces. A short time later, the Confederates drew off and continued to Bardstown. The Federals followed but did not overtake them again and eventually joined Buell's main force in Louisville.
