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PREFACE

I have decided to capture as much of the 158th Field Artillery's history as possible and this volume is devoted to the decorations and medals, awarded to soldiers of the battalion while participating in World War II, Korean War, Persian Gulf War and the Global War on Terrorism. I have concluded that these citations of deeds, courage, and gallantry under fire; if they are not historically important; must be excellent indicators of the unit's morale while deployed to a hostile area.

The 158th Field Artillery "Book of Merit" is a record of the deeds and dramatic exploits of notable individual achievements of the unit's heroes; past and present; that compose the unit's overall history and forms the background of morale and esprit de corps of the gallantry and valor as we know it, to be archived for the next generation of veterans who will read the history of those who served before them. This book chronicles the citations of deeds of courage, the acts of gallantry under fire, exceptional meritorious conduct in performance of duty and is the written history of the unit's morale and discipline while in service to the United States of America. The book is archived so that these deeds are not lost to time.

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BOOK OF MERIT

The "Book of Merit" is the story of these dramatic exploits of notable individual achievements of the unit's heroes; past and present; that compose the organization's overall history and forms the background of morale and esprit de corps of the gallantry and valor as we know it, to be archived for the next generation of veterans who will read the history of those who served before them.

Merit was to be the new criteria for greatness in the new Continental Army of the American republic. In this new republic there were very few men of genteel birth, especially in an era when only gentlemen who purchased their commissions could become officers. General George Washington recognized this great disparity, promoting many officers from obscurity to general officers. In the 18th century, it was common practice to reward these officers with medals and orders for valorous actions, however regular soldiers who distinguished themselves on the battlefield were rarely recognized. General Washington also recognized this disparity in the rank and file of the enlisted men and noncommissioned officers.

On 17 October 1781, General Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown and it took several months for this news to reach the British government and soon after in April 1982 peace talks began in Paris. On 7 August 1782, from his headquarters in Newburgh, New York General Washington published a General Order which stated:

Honorary Badges of Distinction are to be conferred on the veteran Noncommissioned officers and soldiers of the army, who have served more than three years with bravery, fidelity and good conduct, for this purpose a narrow piece of white cloth of an angular form is to be fixed to the left arm on the uniform coats. Noncommissioned officers and soldiers who have served with equal reputation more than six years are to be distinguished by two pieces of cloth set on parallel to each other in a similar form; should any who are not entitled to these honors have the insolence to assume the badges of them they shall be severely punished. On the other hand, it is expected those gallant men who are thus designated will on all occasions be treated with particular confidence and consideration.

The General ever desirous to cherish virtuous ambition in his soldiers, as well as to foster and encourage every species of Military Merit, directs that whenever any singularly meritorious action is performed, the author of it shall be permitted to wear on his facings over the left breast, the figure of a heart in purple cloth, or silk, edged with narrow lace or binding. Not only instances of unusual gallantry, but also of extraordinary fidelity and essential service in any way shall meet with a due reward. Before this favor can be conferred on any man, the particular fact, or facts, on which it is to be grounded must be set forth to the Commander in chief accompanied with certificates from the Commanding officers of the regiment and brigade to which the Candidate for reward belonged, or other incontestable proofs, and upon granting it, the name and regiment of the person with the action so certified are to be enrolled in the Book of Merit which will be kept at the orderly office. Men who have merited this last distinction to be suffered to pass all guards and sentinels which officers are permitted to do. The road to glory in a patriot army and a free country is thus open to all. This

order is also to have retrospect to the earliest stages of the war, and to be considered as a permanent one.

The first of these awards would be the Badge of Distinction, a tradition that is still carried on today in the form of service stripes or "hash marks". The second of these awards was The Military Badge of Merit awarded for "singularly meritorious service". Wounds were considered merit and in the waning days of the Revolutionary War the badge was awarded to three soldiers.

By 30 November 1782 the preliminary articles of peace were agreed upon which recognized American independence and established borders for the new nation. By 4 February 1783, Great Britain announced a cessation of hostilities. On 3 May 1783 Sergeants Elijah Churchill and William Brown received the first Badges of Merits and certificates at General Washington's Newburgh headquarters. A third soldier; Sergeant Daniel Bissell; received the award on 10 June 1783. On 13 June 1783, General Washington issued the military order for the Continental Army to be furloughed. On 3 September 1783 the "Treaty of Paris" officially ended the war and on 4 November 1783, Washington issued a proclamation officially disbanding the Continental Army. Shortly after the army started to disband; The Book of Merit; which was meant to chronicle the deeds of the new nation's heroes; contained the names of the first three recipients of the Badge of Merit, but during the furloughing and disbanding of the army the book was neglected and disappeared, lost with the passing of time. Historians know the names of the first three recipients of the badge of merit, but they hypotheses as to whether these were the only recipients since there is no known list of exploits that warrant such distinctions.

DECORATIONS AND MEDALS

Military decorations are awarded in recognition of individual heroism, meritorious achievement, or meritorious service. All military medals are known collectively as military decorations yet each one is its own tangible recognition of merit. The terms "decoration" and "medal" are almost always used interchangeably today, and even though a "decoration" may have the word "medal" in its title; it still causes confusion; but there is a significant distinction between them. "Decorations" are awarded for acts of gallantry, meritorious service and usually have unique and distinctive shape such as a cross or star. "Medals" are

medallions and are awarded for achievement, good conduct, participation in campaigns, noncombatant service and normally are round in shape.

Just as all decorations and medals have a hierarchy order of precedence there is a "peacetime and wartime" criteria. The U.S. Army decorations authorized during "wartime" and the order of precedence are as follows:

*This battalion has no Medal of Honor recipients, but the Medal of Honor is used as the gage that is used to measure gallantry.

In "peacetime", military decorations recognize achievements which have significantly contributed to the readiness and or the effectiveness of an organization, or have made notable contributions to the morale or esprit de corps of said organization.



MEDAL OF HONOR



Medal of Honor (MOH): The MOH was established by Joint Resolution of Congress, 12 July 1862 and is awarded by the President in the name of Congress to a person who, while a member of the Army, distinguishes himself or herself conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his or her life above and beyond the call of duty while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States; while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force; or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. The deed performed must have been one of personal bravery or self sacrifice so conspicuous as to clearly distinguish the individual above his comrades and must have involved risk of life. Incontestable proof of the performance of the service will be exacted and each recommendation for the award of this decoration will be considered on the standard of extraordinary merit. DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS



Distinguished Service Cross (DSC): The DSC was established by Act of Congress 9 July 1918 and is awarded to a person who, while serving in any capacity with the Army, distinguished himself or herself by extraordinary heroism not justifying the award of a Medal of Honor; while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States; while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing or foreign force; or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing Armed Force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. The act or acts of heroism must have been so notable and have involved risk of life so extraordinary as to set the individual apart from his or her comrades.

SILVER STAR



Silver Star (SS): The SS was established by Act of Congress 9 July 1918 and is awarded to a person who, while serving in any capacity with the U.S. Army, is cited for gallantry in action against an enemy of the United States while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force, or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in armed conflict against an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. The required gallantry must have been performed with marked distinction.

LEGION OF MERIT



Legion of Merit (LOM): The LOM was established by Act of Congress 20 July 1942 and is awarded to any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or a friendly foreign nation who has distinguished himself or herself by exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services and achievements. The performance must have been such as to merit recognition of key individuals for service rendered in a clearly exceptional manner. Performance of duties normal to the grade, branch, specialty, or assignment, and experience of an individual is not an adequate basis for this award. The LOM is awarded for service not related to actual war, the term "key individuals" applies to a narrower range of positions than in time of war and requires evidence of significant achievement. In

peacetime, service should be in the nature of a special requirement or of an extremely difficult duty performed in an unprecedented and clearly exceptional manner. However, justification of the award may accrue by virtue of exceptionally meritorious service in a succession of important positions.

SOLDIERS MEDAL



Soldier's Medal (SM): The SM was established by Act of Congress 2 July 1926 and is awarded to any person of the Armed Forces of the United States or of a friendly foreign nation who, while serving in any capacity with the Army of the United States, distinguished himself or herself by heroism not involving actual conflict with an enemy. The same degree of heroism is required as for the award of the Distinguished Flying Cross. The performance must have involved personal hazard or danger and the voluntary risk of life under conditions not involving conflict with an armed enemy. Awards will not be made solely on the basis of having saved a life.

BRONZE STAR MEDAL



Bronze Star Medal (BSM): The BSM was established by Executive Order 9419, 4 February 1944 and is awarded to any person who, while serving in any capacity in or with the Army of the United States and distinguished himself or herself by heroic or meritorious achievement or service, not involving participation in aerial flight, in connection with military operations against an armed enemy; or while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. Awards may be made for acts of heroism or to recognize single acts of merit or meritorious service.

PURPLE HEART



Purple Heart (PH): The PH was originally established by General George Washington at Newburgh, NY, on 7 August 1782, during the Revolutionary War. It was reestablished by the President of the United States per War Department General Orders 3, on 22 February 1932. The PH is currently awarded and is clearly an individual decoration, and differs from all other decorations in that an individual is not "recommended" for the decoration; rather, he or she is entitled to it upon meeting specific criteria. The PH is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to any member of an Armed Force of the United States who has been wounded, killed, or who has died or may hereafter die of wounds received.

AIR MEDAL



Air Medal (AM): The AM was established by Executive Order 9158, 11 May 1942 and is awarded to any person who, while serving in any capacity in or with the U.S. Army, will have distinguished himself or herself by meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight. Awards may be made for acts of heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy or while engaged in military operations involving conflict with an opposing armed force in which the United States is not a belligerent party. Awards may be made for single acts of meritorious achievement, involving superior airmanship which was accomplished with distinction beyond that normally expected. Awards for meritorious service may be made for sustained distinction in the performance of duties involving regular and frequent participation in aerial flight for a period of at least 6 months.

ARMY COMMENDATION MEDAL



Army Commendation Medal (ARCOM): The ARCOM was established by War Department Circular 377, 18 December 1945 and is awarded to any member of the Armed Forces of the United States who, while serving in any capacity with the Army distinguishes himself or herself by heroism, meritorious achievement or meritorious service. Awards of the ARCOM may be made for acts of valor performed under circumstances described above which are of lesser degree than required for award of the Bronze Star Medal.

ARMY ACHIEVEMENT MEDAL



Army Achievement Medal (AAM):
The AAM was established by the
Secretary of the Army, 10 April
1981, as announced in AGO 1990—
15 and is awarded to any member
of the Armed Forces of the United
States, who distinguished himself
or herself by meritorious service or
achievement.


PRISONER OF WAR MEDAL



Prisoner of War Medal (POWM):
The criteria for award of the POWM is codified in 10 USC 1128. It is authorized for any person who, while serving in any capacity with the U.S. Armed Forces, was taken prisoner and held captive after 5 April 1917. It is issued to U.S. military personnel who were taken prisoner and held captive while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States.

COMBAT ACTION BADGE



Combat Action Badge (CAB): On 2 May 2005, the Chief of Staff Army approved the creation of the CAB to provide special recognition to soldiers who personally engaged, or are engaged by, the enemy. The CAB is intended to serve as a companion to the Combat Infantryman's Badge (CIB) and Combat Medical Badge (CMB) to recognize the greatly expanded role of non-infantry Soldiers in active, ground combat where the soldier is personally present and under hostile fire while performing satisfactorily in accordance with the prescribed rules of engagement, in an area where hostile fire pay or imminent danger pay is authorized.

Attacking heavily defended concrete fortifications of the Siegfried Line, a rifle company was pinned down in a heavy cross fire from automatic weapons supported by enemy artillery and mortar fire. Under this continuous fire Private Bertuccini and two other members of a forward observer party moved to within one hundred yards of the enemy block house and, even though observed by the enemy, made repairs to their radio that had been damaged by the enemy fire. Then, with the set repaired, the party relayed fire orders to the artillery that succeeded in neutralizing the enemy position. When the attacking infantry flanked the strongpoint, the forward observer party assaulted the block house and captured three enemy officers and seven enlisted men. EXTRAORDINARY HEROISM IN ACTION

CITATION:

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress July 9, 1918, takes pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to Second Lieutenant George T. Robinson, (OSN: 0-1178952), United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy while serving with the 158th Field Artillery Battalion, 45th Infantry Division, in action against enemy forces from 16 to 22 February 1944, he directed continuous field artillery firing missions against the enemy during the vicious German attack to reduce the Anzio beachhead. His observation post was located in a building well in advance of friendly troops and was subjected to constant sniper and artillery fire. On the second day the room from which he was observing was destroyed by three direct hits from German tanks. Unperturbed, he entered an adjoining room and completed his adjustment of fire which forced the tanks to withdraw. The building later was demolished by artillery and mortar fire. That night he established his

observation post in an adjacent house. During the next five days, he conducted firing missions until enemy infantry finally infiltrated into nearby houses and wounded three of his party. After an all night small arms fight with German troops, he barricaded his party in the building and continued to direct artillery fire until he was killed by a sniper. His courage, tenacity of purpose and devotion to duty were responsible for the destruction of large numbers of enemy personnel and considerable equipment. Second Lieutenant Robinson's intrepid actions, personal bravery and zealous devotion to duty at the cost of his life, exemplify the highest traditions of the military forces of the United States and reflect great credit upon himself, the 45th Infantry Division, and the United States Army.

EXTRAORDINARY HEROISM IN ACTION

CITATION:

The President of the United States of America, under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved July 9, 1918, takes pride in presenting the Distinguished Service Cross (Posthumously) to Second Lieutenant (Field Artillery) Charles L. Warner, (OSN: 0-064284), United States Army, for extraordinary heroism in connection with military operations against an armed enemy of the United Nations while serving with serving as a Forward Observer of the 158th Field Artillery Battalion, 45th Infantry Division. Second Lieutenant Warner distinguished himself by extraordinary heroism in action against enemy aggressor forces in the vicinity of Tumyong-dong, Korea, late on the night of 15 June 1952. On that date, Lieutenant Warner was with an infantry company occupying a strategically located hill. Suddenly the company was subjected to an intense artillery barrage followed by a fanatical attack, by a numerically superior hostile force. Despite the fact that he had been wounded early in the action, Lieutenant Warner remained at his post, adjusting artillery fire which inflicted heavy casualties

on the enemy. With wave after wave of screaming enemy troops assaulting the friendly position, Lieutenant Warner's radio was destroyed by enemy fire, but he continued to call in fire directions by using the company's radio and relaying his adjustments through the infantry battalion. Wounded again, he still refused evacuation, but remained throughout the night in a shallow trench, relaying every request for supporting fire. Early the following morning it was discovered that he had received fourteen wounds, and he was ordered to a rear area for medical treatment. As he was being placed on a stretcher for evacuation, a direct hit by an enemy mortar killed him instantly.
