McCabe Hall • Milwaukee, Wisconsin



McCabe Hall is named for the Rev. James McCabe, the Marquette president who in 1909 made the bold decision to accept females. Marquette was the first Catholic university to do so. McCabe has eight floors with a total of 91 double and triple rooms, which include separate living rooms, bedrooms, kitchens and private bathrooms.

McCabe pays homage to the building's original architecture. Constructed in the late 1920s, the building includes plaster details, archways, high ceilings, terrazzo flooring and woodwork detailing. That is not to mention the modern features, such as a marble front desk countertop and a series of flat-screen televisions that line the first floor lobby.

McCabe is LEED certified meaning it is designed to be energy efficient and environmentally conscious. All of the building's lights are fluorescent, mattresses do not have springs, toilets use less water and the building's construction materials include 35 percent or more of recycled content. The building is also fully handicap-accessible.
